Enclosed is the final report on the dispersement of the Grant-in-aide funds awarded to Arrowsmith Amateur Radio Club. The purpose of the Grand-in-aide was to replace the aging Motorola Micor repeaters located on Mt Cokely with two Daniels/Codan repeaters and to upgrade the existing antenna towers.

As of September 28th, 2014 the new Daniels/Codan repeater system went on line and is performed better than our expectations.

During the upgrades we installed two new towers, guy wires and coaxial lead wire along with new cement bases for each of these towers. The total installation was performed by a dedicated group of volunteers from our membership for a total of 1120 man/hours in 14 trips up to the site located at an elevation of 1188 metres.

We have budgeted the replacement of the batteries and solar panels for some time in the spring of 2015, thus completing the updates to all our repeaters. None of this would have been posible withouth the "grand-in-aid" program the Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District runs each year.



Program Details

The Alberni Valley Rescue Squad is a volunteer non-profit society that has performed ground and inland water Search and Rescue operations in the Central Vancouver Island area since 1956.

The Squad is composed of approximately 45 local and enthusiastic men and women who are trained to participate in routine wilderness search and rescue operations. Specialized teams have been formed in Rope Rescue, Tracking and Swift Water Rescue. All members must maintain a First Aid qualification and weekly training is conducted between the months of September and June.

Request

The Alberni Valley Rescue Squad provides unpaid professional swift water rescue services to the ACRD. In 2015 the AVRS will have to re-certify the entire swift water rescue team. This is required every three years to meet Provincial standards. This recertification involves two courses: Swift water Rescue Technician & Advanced Swift water Rescue Technician. The AVRS hosts these courses locally so that members can train on local features likely to be the scene of a rescue (I.e Stamp Falls). Each of these courses costs in excess of \$3000.

- 1. Equipment for the new rescue vehicle including necessary antennas to ensure longer range capabilities and emergency vehicle lighting;
- 2. Additional equipment required to return the SAR building to its full functionality including incident command furniture and equipment storage/organizing systems;
- 3. And a new SAR managers' callout system that will replace the outdated and expiring pager system.

Amount of Grant Requested

We are requesting \$6,000 from the Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District.

Who will it serve?

The target population benefiting from WISAR Society activities consists of the residents of the region and visitors. The resident population of the Clayoquot Sound Region is approximately 6,000 spread between the villages of Tofino, Ucluelet, Toquaht, Opitsit, Ahousaht, Hot Springs (Hesquiaht) and a number of small settlements, float homes, etc. Tourist numbers in the region vary widely but can be as high as 20 000 on a peak summer day. Other visitors to the region include mushroom pickers who range through forested areas. Many tourists travel by kayak but may become lost on land requiring the searching of exposed coastal shoreline. Some tourists stop to walk along the rapids of the fast flowing Kennedy River (beside Highway 4 between Port Alberni and Tofino), increasing the need for a fast response to a river incident. Highway 4 is a relatively high hazard highway and we have been involved in a number of response tasks to search for missing travelers and to respond to motor vehicle accidents.

WISAR has received support from a wide range of agencies in the region including municipal governments, RCMP, Coastguard, forest companies, National Parks and others.

In addition to its core area WISAR also provides mutual support to other agencies from Nootka Island to Port Renfrew and the Port Alberni area. We have been included as a resource in a number of recent industrial safety plans in the region. We are an important resource in the West Coast communities.




Figure #1: Shows the Westcoast Inland Search and Rescue Society Operational Area.

How many will be directly involved?

Certified WISAR Membership actively able to respond immediately to emergency callouts is currently 30. These members provide substantial in-kind contributions in terms of training time, operational callouts and participation in other emergency planning and management activities in the region. We provide the basic Ground Search and Rescue course once every two years typically and plan to do so again in the fall and winter of 2015/16.

The trained individuals in the WISAR Society represent an important resource for search and rescue operations in particular but for all emergency management related activities including disaster response. WISAR has provided support and active membership to the Emergency Management Committees in both Tofino, Ucluelet, and the Area C emergency management committee when requested.

What is the economic benefit to the area?

1. Prevention of Loss of Life:

The climate on the West Coast of Vancouver Island receives over 3 metres of rain per year, and is inhospitable to anyone who is lost or injured. The Society can increase its chances of finding someone in the crucial first few hours or days as it provides more adequately trained and equipped volunteers. Loss of life has obvious impacts to the owner, but also affects family, friends, and is disruptive to the economy of a community.

2. Mitigation of Injuries:

The earlier someone is found, the less severe his or her injuries are likely to be. Serious injuries put a drain on health care resources and cause economic hardship. One or two cases of advanced hypothermia could cost the taxpayer more money than is requested in this proposal.

3. Reduced Cost to Taxpayer:

Volunteer searchers do work that would otherwise have to be done by public servants or private companies. In the past, searches in Clayoquot Sound have been carried out by groups from other areas. This has resulted in higher travel and support costs compared with a locally based group.

4. A Safety Resource for Industry in the Region

We are increasingly being asked to provide details of our capabilities to groups writing safety plans for operations in remote areas of the region. We can be an important adjunct to other resources for difficult and technical evacuations.

5. Value to Tourism Economies:

Having local search and rescue capability makes the West Coast of Vancouver Island a safer place to visit. This may give a competitive advantage to British Columbia over other rugged travel destinations. Clayoquot Sound is in a UNESCO Biosphere Reserve and it is expected that the level of tourism, including wilderness based tourism, will increase in the coming years.

Overview of Attached Financial Statements

Summary financial statements for 2013 are attached – the financials for 2014 have not been completed yet.

A key feature of the WISAR organization is that with the donation of relatively small amounts of money from local governments and organizations we have been able to leverage very large in-kind contributions and grant funding from external agencies. While we have been able to get provincial and federal grant funding this would not be possible without the monies that we receive from local governments.

Grants from the Regional District of Alberni Clayoquot have allowed us to address targeted projects including the acquisition of safety equipment for road searches and training and equipment for shoreline search and rescue activities as well as critical help to complete our SAR building.

Society Background

The Westcoast Inland Search and Rescue (WISAR) Society is based in the communities of Tofino and Ucluelet and provides Ground and Inland Water Search and Rescue services to local police authorities (RCMP and National Park Wardens) for Clayoquot Sound, and parts of Barkley Sound. The Society currently has 30 volunteer members with a new intake just being trained.

The geography of the WISAR operational area includes hundreds of kilometers of coastline in the traditional territories of several First Nations. In the course of various SAR responses, WISAR interacts with more than 16 other agencies: two RCMP detachments; several neighboring GSAR Groups; two volunteer fire departments, national and provincial parks; Canadian Coast Guard and Coast Guard Auxiliary; BC Ambulance Service; emergency coordinators in two municipalities and five First Nations Bands; and the Department of National Defense.

Project Description

The project for WISAR for 2015 is to continue to build ourselves back up to full capacity after the fire of August 2013. This includes re-equipping and fitting the building in Tofino, and continuing to outfit our newly acquired command vehicle. The last component of the project is to implement a new SAR managers' callout system that will replace the outdated and expiring pager system.

We are asking for the Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District for a Grant in Aid of \$6,000 to be split between:

- 1. Equipment for the new rescue vehicle including necessary antennas to ensure longer range capabilities and emergency vehicle lighting;
- 2. Additional equipment required to return the SAR building to its full functionality including incident command furniture and equipment storage/organizing systems;
- 3. And a new SAR managers' callout system that will replace the outdated and expiring pager system.

Please find attached our application for a Grant-In-Aid for 2015. The Westcoast Inland Search and Rescue Society (WISAR) would like to thank you for your donations in previous years. Donations like yours have allowed us to continue to develop our capacity to provide an effective emergency response service to our communities.

Over the last twelve years WISAR has grown to be a significant participant in the emergency management community on the west coast. However 2013 was a hard year for us with a fire largely gutting our building in Tofino in August. This destroyed or de-rated a lot of our equipment including out truck and boat and much of our technical rescue gear. All is not lost however and with our insurance coverage, a grant from the Province, and donations from corporations we ended 2014 in better shape than we were before.

In particular we treated this situation as an opportunity to get grant funding from the province and corporate donations for a new rescue truck. In 2014 we acquired an F550 custom setup SAR command vehicle.

While we received most of the necessary funding for the new command vehicle and the re-build of the building through insurance coverage and a provincial grant, there is still a lot of work to be done and funds needed to get our hall and command vehicle to full functionality and operational capability. We are asking for the Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District for a Grant in Aid of \$6,000 to be split between:

- 1. Equipment for the new rescue vehicle including necessary antennas to ensure longer range capabilities and emergency vehicle lighting;
- 2. Additional equipment required to return the SAR building to its full functionality including incident command furniture and equipment storage/organizing systems;
- 3. And a new SAR managers' callout system that will replace the outdated and expiring pager system.

While continuing to build our capacity we still respond regularly to emergency tasks in our region. We are also maintaining our trained and certified membership with regular exercises and training programs to maintain readiness and maintain and continually increase the level of skills in the team.

Alberni Clayoquot Regional District Grant in Aid Annual Report 2014

As our fiscal year runs through March 31, 2015 all funds have not yet been allocated. The portion that has been spent augmented our staffing and program delivery costs. The remaining amount will be further utilized as such for our last quarter.

In the Alberni Clayoquot Regional District the Victim Services Program has assisted over **800 people** during the year: up over 100 from last year. Workers continue to provide emotional and crisis support, practical assistance and justice system information to clients but have struggled to do so with insufficient funds. We are still unable to maintain our staff hours due to funding and have been running on approximately 10 hours a week less than needed. Limited office hours are maintained during the week but we are not able to consistently attend after hour crisis calls. We worry that we have missed offering service to numerous clients this year.

Workers provided court orientation and attended court with over 80 victims and witnesses.

Victim Services staff partnered with RCMP members to present information on elder abuse and domestic violence at multiple events. We have partnered with Citizens on Patrol and provided property crime information packages to the residents of the Alberni Valley. We organize the monthly community domestic violence meetings and also brought in provincial trainers to strengthen those community protocols.

3. Port Alberni Victim Services provided support and referrals to over 800 victims of crime and trauma in the Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District in 2014: an increase of over 100 from last year. Crime affects people financially, emotionally and physically. Victim services workers strive to help victims of crime and trauma in our community to deal with these needs.

Workers and volunteers provide in person and telephone support to any victim of crime or trauma in need of assistance. This service may take the form of emotional crisis support at the scene of a crime or traumatic incident, practical assistance as needs arise in the days and weeks following an incident and ongoing court support as the file goes through the justice system. We provide a unique service as we are able to provide up to date police and court information that can assist with a victim's safety plans and sense of empowerment within the justice system.

5. Workers and volunteers also provide community education at public events around violence, elder abuse, grieving and home security

Through these services we are able to

- lessen the impact of crime and trauma on victims and their families and to assist in their recovery;
- increase victim safety and to help reduce the risk of further victimization,
- increase victims' level of participation in, and sense of empowerment under, the criminal justice system;
- support and therefore increase the effectiveness of victims acting as witnesses in court proceedings.

Supporting victims contributes to a healthier more productive community.



Strawberry Isle Marine Research Society (SIMRS) is a registered charity based in Clayoquot Sound on the west coast of Vancouver Island, British Columbia. The purposes of the Society are to:

Since 1991, we have been working closely with the marine community recording marine and terrestrial wildlife sightings and observations from whale watching operators, water taxis, tour boats, fish farms, airlines, tug boats and waterfront residents. The information reported is entered into a species specific database that allows us to efficiently collect in-depth and immeasurable fine-scale information. This comprehensive and systematic approach to monitoring has enabled us to identify important feeding or mating grounds, roosting grounds throughout Clayoquot Sound. Twenty-one years of monitoring has yielded valuable information on population dynamics and distribution of 5 cetacia (marine mammals), 2 carnivores, 2 pinipedia (otters), 2 birds, 2 reptiles, 9 fish species that frequent the marine and near-shore terrestrial environments in Clayoquot Sound. It has also improved response time for entangled whales and allowed for marine mammal mortality necropsies. The information is entered into a database connected through a network system to the Department of Fisheries and Oceans, Parks Canada, and Pacific the Biological Station. Strawberry Isle acts as an information collection center for receiving, distributing and forwarding information on the marine environment to the proper authority while keeping the community involved and up-to-date on our monitoring efforts.

The database is connected to a data management networking system that allows the information to flow directly to the Department of Fisheries and Oceans, Pacific the Biological Station and Parks Canada.

Dear Mayors, Directors, and Corporate Secretary:

West Coast Aquatic is proud to contribute towards the economic and environmental health of the region by:

- · Creating employment within ACRD communities
- Hosting and supporting local events
- · Procuring local goods and services
- · Contributing to the local tax base
- Producing decision support tools for use by local government staff and directors
- Advancing the area's ecological and recreational values
- Raising the profile of the ACRD area internationally.

We acknowledge the value of the grants-in-aid that the ACRD makes available. As with our past grants received, our priority is to create tangible benefits for the communities, and leverage additional funds to expand those benefits. As a demonstration of our commitment to sustainable development, we would like to highlight some of the strong returns on investment created for the ACRD in this past year:

- For every \$1 you invested in WCA, we brought \$55 dollars into this region.
- We employed 5 permanent and 5 temporary residents of the region.
- We developed a Marine Spatial Plan built upon over 200 map layers that will assist local, regional, provincial and national decision makers with the management of marine resources in the WCVI area.
- We facilitated the development of two regional salmon risk assessments that will guide future stewardship projects.
- We were successfully awarded a contract that brought \$250k of economic capacity to communities in the region.



As part of our grant-in-aid application for 2015-2016, we would like to familiarize you with our intended products over the next year, as well as review how the grant in aid was used last year.

The Year in Review: 2014-2015

This past year, WCA put the ACRD's investment towards numerous strategic initiatives. A few highlights include:

- We drafted Marine Spatial Plans for Barkley Sound and Clayoquot Sound that contain the most comprehensive collection of data available on the ecological values and human uses in the WCVI area. The plan is adaptive in nature, and provides recommendations on which uses are best situated in which areas. A Google Earth tool has been developed to enable governments and First Nations to access this data in an interactive way, thus informing and helping to streamline their decision making process.
- We convened, facilitated, and administered the Barkley Sound Salmon Initiative and:
 - Finalized BC's first local integrated salmon management strategy, which was collaboratively developed by First Nations, government and fishing sector representatives
 - Drafted a risk assessment for Barkley Chinook
 - Raised over \$265,000 cash, and leveraged an additional \$433,000 for salmon related projects. This translated into significant local spending and employment.
- We convened, facilitated, and administered the Clayoquot Salmon Round Table and:
 - Drafted a risk assessment for Clayoquot Chinook
 - Undertook important assessment work in the area.
- We delivered economic development services resulting in:
 - Capacity projects involving the participation of 7 ACRD communities
 - Development of products including feasibility studies, business plans, assets inventories, strategies, and market research which will form the foundation of new economic activity in the coming year
 - The leveraging of \$34,950 additional confirmed funds and \$340,000 pending funds that will help implement community projects.
- We submitted proposals and raised funds for tangible projects such youth mentoring, plankton assessments, and habitat restoration work.
- We have provided work and training to Nuu-chah-nulth youth and university students.

The Year Ahead: 2015-2016

In 2015-2016 we will continue to implement the direction you set out in the Coastal Strategy, focusing on the themes of collaborative governance, ecosystem approach, access to resources and stewardship, through activities including:



- Facilitating and coordinating the Barkley and Clayoquot wild salmon initiatives.
- Hosting events to explore expanded opportunities for collaborative governance.
- Harmonizing the Marine Spatial Plan with government advisory processes.
- Implementing the Marine Spatial Plan by making an Adaptive Planning Tool (and associated data layers) available to decision makers.
- Confirming the values in identified ecologically sensitive areas, working towards protection measures for ESAs, and developing associated restoration Master Plans.
- Exploring support for, and interest in, the development of an outer shore marine plan.
- Expanding the roundtables beyond salmon to other species of interest.
- Identifying gaps in the economy, and facilitating economic development projects.
- Developing a stewardship centre in Port Alberni that will provide education to tourists and locals, and promote other local attractions and businesses.

These activities, and the Coastal Strategy, fill an important role in the community: we are an internationally unique organization that includes diverse governments, communities, and businesses working together around a coastal ecosystem approach.

The ACRD is a core member and funder within WCA's Terms of Reference. For several years we requested and received \$52,000 per year from the ACRD. Local government's investment has been of key importance in enabling us to leverage other funding. We use the grant-in-aid to cover part of our core costs and meet diversification requirements of funding sources.

In order to be mindful of your many budget demands, we are requesting \$17,000 for this fiscal year, which is the same as we received last year. Your contribution is especially significant this year as we will again have a reduction in our expected non-government revenue by 50% from previous years and will be focusing on fundraising and business development. For each dollar that local communities invest, we will continue to help you show strong returns and benefits to communities.

We wish to thank you for your continued support for West Coast Aquatic and our shared vision of making the west coast the best coast. By supporting this work, you will be recognized at home and abroad as leaders in creating ocean health and wealth for your communities.

3. Please describe the services and benefits that your organization provides to the Alberni-Clayoquot region.

Our mandate is to promote events, attractions and services available within the Alberni Valley and to deliver first class travel counseling to visitors and locals alike.

The Alberni Valley Chamber of Commerce is the focal point and destination for visitors and tourists to our community. Our Visitor Centre is a fully sanctioned Destination BC information center, offering professional travel counseling and information to visitors, potential investors, and newcomers to the community.

We meet and greet our guests and provide travel and general information on points of interest, places to visit, and things to do. We reach our visitors via their stops at our Visitor Info Centre or we go to them through our highly successful Ambassador Program, or through our Mobile Visitor Centre.

Mobile Visitor Centre

In 2014 we launched our Mobile Visitor Centre (MVC). The MVC goes to several areas of interest throughout the Alberni Clayoquot Regional District, including regional areas such as Sproat Lake, China Creek and Stamp Falls. The Mobile Visitor Centre is also in attendance at local community events, including minor hockey tournaments, the Toy Run, Salmon Festival, Thunder in the Valley and more. As of this writing we have our MVC scheduled to attend the Senior Men's Curling Championship in February and no doubt it will be at other planned events through the balance of the Winter/Spring months. Our MVC is simply another way to locate the Visitor so that we; the community, can provide information to them.

Volunteer Ambassador Program

Our Ambassador Program is comprised of a pool of volunteers that actively greet visitors to our community. They frequent such places as Cathedral Grove, McLean Mill, Steam Train and the MV Frances Barkley. These venues see an abundance of travelers, who are keen to learn more about the Alberni Valley. Our Ambassadors can also be seen at local community events, such as Canada Day, Sunset Market, the Toy Run, Salmon Festival etc., and of course they are often seen in our MVC.

Our Ambassador program is one of a kind within the Visitor Centre network. We are very fortunate to have a team of upwards of 50 people who readily jump into action for the good of the community. Our Ambassadors are happy to take shifts where scheduled to do so. Through their commitment and pride of our community, they recommend hotels, motels, B & B's, restaurants, retail stores, tourism operations and things to do and see within the Alberni Valley to the travelling public.

small business owner. Annual Business Excellence Awards are held in April, which recognize deserving individuals and business organizations in the community. The "Shop Alberni" campaign rewards shoppers for shopping locally and benefits the businesses involved. The Chamber of Commerce has many other ongoing projects, each of which are directly related to business development, growth, education and transition.

5. Please describe how the services provided by your organization fill a need in the community.

Visitors to the community have no way of knowing what is available unless an organization takes a pro- active approach to telling them. That is why we developed the Ambassador program and the Mobile Visitor Centre.

The Mobile Visitor Centre was developed in 2014 after consultation with other areas whom were doing similar things. We felt that it was a priority to find a way to reach outside of the Visitor Centre building to reach as many visitors as we could.

The MVC was purchased, cleaned, painted (manually – inside) and decaled. We mounted a visitor rack inside the van and within it we carry a number of local materials for distribution.

We believe that the MVC is a very good feature of our overall Visitor Centre operations. It has resulted in a higher reach of visitors and that would reasonably translate to more awareness of the Alberni Valley along with increased sales to our business community. Our goal for 2015 is to continue with the MVC and increase the number of days of availability to reach out to our visitors. It should be noted that our Visitor Stats do NOT include the MVC numbers for much of 2014 as it wasn't until later in the year that we were informed of the option to include them. As well, our Ambassador counts have never been recorded for Destination BC.

The downside is that the MVC is not attractive as it should be. It has several dents, some rust spots and the wheels need to be replaced. As it is an older vehicle, it requires additional ongoing repairs and maintenance. We received quotes last year in excess of \$5000.00 for limited body work on the vehicle.

Our other programs noted above (Ambassador Volunteers, Adventure Map, Sunset Market etc.) each provide additional business opportunities for the community at large. On any given day between May and September, we'll have between 6-8 Ambassadors out there promoting the Alberni Valley. Our map development demonstrates via the visual content that indeed there are ladies' fashion stores throughout the community (as example) and of course the reader can locate the many other venues such as the recreation center properties, boat launches etc. Our Sunset Market is positioned to grow and develop in one of the most beautiful settings within our region. Strategically located it features unique opportunities to get people to stop who

might otherwise continue onto Highway 4. With music, an overall vibrancy along with many vendors we know that people are paying attention.

In order to continue with our growth and daily operational needs for the Visitor Services at large along with the many newly added features over the past 18 months we are seeking support from the ACRD.

We have applied to the City of Port Ablerni for continuance of our Fee for Service Contract at the same level of funding provided to our organization in 2014, \$84,000. We are the licensed agent for Destination BC for local Visitor Services. With that contract we receive annual funding of \$23021.

Adventure Map

Through our VC we also developed the very successful Adventure Map that helps promote our Business and Event community through fun style graphics. Our Map is distributed widely, at no charge for visitors, and it includes more than 120 clearly identified destinations throughout the Alberni Valley. This style of map is a common feature in communities around the world and through it we are able to visually demonstrate that there are many things to see and do in the area. For example, when the map was distributed during the Thanksgiving Day Weekend at the Multiplex we were able to send people to Stamp Falls to see the fish migration and others pointed out that they had no idea that we had a Bowling Alley.

The Sunset Market

The Sunset Market is another very successful initiative that was started by the AVCOC. The AVCOC now partners with the Hupacasath First Nation and hosts the Sunset Market every Wednesday at Victoria Quay from June – August. The Victoria Quay location is a desirable venue as it has the ability to attract residents, visitors and people travelling en route to the West Coast. The vendors vary from artisans, crafters, jewelers, non-profits and general retailers. Food and entertainment are also part of the Market.

Tourism Tofino

We expanded our reach by partnering with Tourism Tofino. This enhanced the interaction between the staff, the ambassadors and the visitors, thus enabling us to develop a better rapport with our visitors; translating to additional opportunities for our small businesses.

Fam Tours (Familiarization)

Fam Tours are a common practice in tourist focused areas including the communities of Tofino, Ucluelet, Parksville and others. We started with a Fam Tour program in 2013 and for 2014 we expanded it to include a visit to some of the key spots in Tofino/Ucluelet. The costs of this was undertaken by the Chamber as we felt it important to ensure that our staff were adequately informed of the 'hot spots' within those markets as well as our own. In this area we ensure that our staff are well versed in all of the accommodation locations as well as the tourist sites including Lady Rose Marine, McLean Mill and others. In 2014 we sent our staff to the local restaurants so that they could better understand the cuisine options available in each. Overall, Fam Tours are critical to the goals of exceptional service.

Business Support

As well we support and promote our members and the business community at large. We are tasked with improving the business climate in the Alberni Valley. Dinner meetings are held monthly and provide networking and training opportunities for the

EIGHTH AVENUE SCHOOL BACKPACK ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE

Our backpack program organized very simply and functions smoothly with the help of several key people.

Lisa Gunther, our principal, and her staff select the families who would benefit from our support.

We are an independent program under Cathy Cross the Alberni Valley Community School, a non-profit organization. She receives and dispenses our funding for the food.

Olive O'Dwyer and Linda Taylor, the program coordinators, raise funds, shop for food and distribute the supplies in bags to families every Thursday afternoon.

We try to operate as simply, efficiently and effectively as we can.

Each week we receive salvageable goods from Costco through Wes Brick at the Shelter. We always receive buns and often other baked goods. We will also receive a variety of vegetables and fruits that changes each week. Sometimes we augment what we receive by buying carrots, onions, potatoes, oranges etc.


We receive \$200 in non-perishable goods each month from the St. Vincent de Paul.

The increased use of our program has risen from 12 families at the beginning to 27 families requiring a need for more fundraising. It costs us approximately \$10-12 per bag per week including the goods received. An extra 7 families this year has raised our requirements by \$280 per month. Thus we need \$10 000 to \$12 000 per year to operate our program including the foods from Costco and St Vincent de Paul. With our increased demand it requires that we need to fund raise for approximately \$6500 per year.

The funds we receive are very important to us and 100% of what we bring in goes to food for our hungry students. What we take in goes in revenue goes directly to expenditures on our children. We have no overhead and all help is by volunteers.

In addition to local service groups we have applied to the Children's Health Network and the Vancouver Sun Adopt a School Program.

Once a year we meet to discuss our program. We discuss what is working well, what needs improving, our finances and growth.

Application to Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District

Please describe the service and benefits that your organization provides to the Alberni-Clayoquot Region:

During times of significant events such as earthquakes, tsunami, wildfires and extreme weather conditions the established communications infrastructures could be overwhelmed causing it to fail or even destroyed. The first line of defense during and after these events is communications; through the use of personal equipment and the club's radio repeater systems, amateur radio operators are able to provide the backup communications with in the affected areas and beyond.

AARC has been providing this service since 1977 by establishing a network of radio repeaters strategically located to give the best range and coverage.

In the event of an emergency, communications is vital to all areas and AARC has been able to provide a backup communications service for the past 36 years through community involvement and generous support from the Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District, Island Timberlands, Port Alberni Multicultural Society, Port Alberni Fall Fair Society, Port Alberni Salmon Festival and Rotary Club of Port Alberni Arrowsmith. Through our supporters donations AARC can provide a service that otherwise would not be available.

AARC also operates a fully functional amateur radio station at the Emergency Operation Center were our capabilities have extended to the use of digital modes; allowing us to provide an entry to the Internet over High Frequency Radio using a digital mode called Pactor. This allows up to send and receive emails even when the Internet Service infrastructure is no longer available.

Attachment B

Pease describe how the service provided by your organization fills a need in the community:

Arrowsmith Amateur Radio Club provides radio communications when and where required to authorities in the event of disaster, whether in the local area or in other areas of Vancouver Island. AARC is part of a dedicated team, which includes Emergency Operations Centers, EMBC, Canadian Red Cross and other emergency operations in Tofino, Ucluelet, and Port Alberni.

AARC also has mutual aid agreements with other mid-island amateur radio groups to volunteer and help with tests and exercises and in event of a declared emergency.

- Provide communication in support of response operations;
- Provide back-up communications;
- Coordinate radio frequencies used;
- Establish and coordinate a message control center;
- Establish static and mobile communication post as required

Grant-in-Aid Purpose

A brief report outlining what the Grant-in-Aid would be used for.

The Grant-in-Aid would be used to purchase a 16 X 8.5 foot cargo trailer which would be outfit with amateur and commercial radios and antennas allowing us to provide communication with all interagencies involved.

AARC has researched the need for a mobile Emcom trailer and we have found that other amateur radio groups throughout BC have outfitted a similar trailer and it has been a huge asset for their communities. For example Prince George; (http://www.pgarc.org/index.html) and even our neighbouring municipality of Parksville (http://mirahams.yolasite.com/emergency-response.php) As well as Victoria, Burnaby and many other clubs throughout BC.

The Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District encompasses a large area and not all areas have amateur radio operators and/or who have the needed equipment to enable them to communicate outside of their area. As well the added use of a mobile communications unit would be an asset to the district if our own EOC were not functional due to failure of the building it is located in. If the building was damaged having mobile communications capabilities would be a huge asset.

The funding would be used to purchase a 16X8.5 foot cargo trailer from Kit Equipment, Parksville BC at a cost as follows;

Over the years AARC has been collecting equipment to outfit an Emcom trailer and we feel the timing to put this plan into operation is now. Every year that passes the threat of a large scale seismic event increases, with this in mind we must plan in advance to be prepared for when it happen.

By adding a mobile Emergency Communications (EMCOM) trailer it will increase our abilities to cover areas that do not have amateur operators with the equipment or skill level to provide communications in an emergency.

Arrowsmith Amateur Radio Club has a 35 member strong dedicated and skilled amateur radio operators who can be TASKED to an area where communications are needed.

After years of research and advice from other amateur radio clubs, municipalities and regional districts we came to the conclusion that a trailer would increase our ability to provide communications to affected areas. A trailer could be towed to a location by a regular size pickup truck, which a large number of our members already own. Once dispatch the trailer could be setup and in operation within minutes, as it will be outfitted with identical equipment that the EOC radio room has.

3. Please describe the services and benefits that your organization provides to the Alberni-Clayoquot:

Cherry Creek Community Recreation Commission sponsors an annual Halloween event for the community, complete with refreshments, a costume parade, prizes for each child, a bonfire and a fireworks display. We also coordinate and sponsor an annual "Christmas in the Country" craft fair. We provide a space for the many talented crafters and also organize the kitchen in order to provide lunch for the shoppers. Also, on our schedule of community events this year is a Canada Day Celebration.

We have opened our doors and offer space to several youth groups including:

- Alberni District 4-H Council
- 2308 Army Cadets including a Vancouver Island wide first aid competition
- Army and Navy Cadets Band
- Girl Guides
- Sparks

Other groups that use Cherry Creek Community Hall include:

- Rock and Gem Club

- SPCA for their annual fund raiser
- Special Olympics
- Kuu-Us Crisis Services

The hall also provides rental facilities for such things as weddings, memorial teas, family reunions and family special occasions (birthdays, anniversaries and Christmas).

We also maintain and provide services for a double tennis court and a large playground area complete with an array of various playground equipment, including a basketball court. This is used by not only young families with their children but also grandparents and their grandchildren. This playground is used year round. In addition, we maintain a large field that has a softball field. This used by children and families. Dog owners are often seen here walking and training their dogs. The field is also used for an annual Cherry Creek Volunteer Fireman's family weekend.

5. Please describe how the services provided by your organization fill a need in the community:

Cherry Creek Community Hall has been the heart of the Cherry Creek Community for over fifty years. With the closure of Cherry Creek School, this central facility has been

needed more than ever for its residents. However, Cherry Creek Hall does not only serve the residents of Cherry Creek, but all of the residents of the Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District and the City of Port Alberni with its many events and sponsorship of youth groups and community groups.

Cherry Creek Community Hall is a designated reception centre and is part of the Alberni Valley Emergency Program. The hall is located adjacent to the Cherry Creek Fire Hall to assist in any kind of disaster. Cherry Creek Community Hall is set up to provide all reception centre needs including but not limited to registration, group lodging and feeding.

Cherry Creek Community Hall is a central venue used for special community meetings and all candidates meetings.

Cherry Creek Community Recreation Commission provides a space for many youth groups to hold their weekly meetings and annual events. It is also a facility that is available for non-profit organizations to hold fundraisers, meetings, banquets and their annual general meetings.

6. Please list all other grants received and/or applied for from other Governments or Service Organizations:

Cherry Creek Community Recreation Commission applied to the Gaming Policy and Enforcement Branch – Licensing and Grants Division for a gaming grant to assist in operating costs. However, we will not hear of the results of our application until April. The gaming grant assists with operating costs and does not include any monies for capital projects.

8. (c) A brief report outlining what the Grant-in-Aid would be used for:

Cherry Creek Community Hall is over fifty years old. The roof over the main hall was replaced a few years ago. The roof over the banquet room was replaced in 2014. There is now a need to replace the roof covering the gym area of Cherry Creek Hall.

We are requesting a one-time grant-in-aid of \$20,000 to replace this portion of the roof.

We are able to cover general operating costs of the hall through hall rentals, fund raising activities and gaming grant; however, we do not have extra funds available for capital projects.

The Cherry Creek Community Recreation Commission Board is working towards sustainability. Our goal is to have sufficient rental income and fundraising to cover annual operating expenses. In order to achieve this goal, we are actively marketing and promoting hall rentals through a variety of avenues. However, it may take some time to see the results of our marketing efforts.

Cherry Creek Community Recreation Commission is run by a board that volunteers many hours in order to continue offering community services and to sponsor our youth groups and non-profit organizations. We have spent countless hours in the maintenance of Cherry Creek Hall. We continue to do smaller capital repairs as funds become available.

Cherry Creek Recreation Commission Summary of 2014 Grant-in-Aid

Cherry Creek Community Recreation Commission was awarded \$20,000 as a grant-inaid from the Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District. The monies received were designated to be used to replace the roof over the banquet room of Cherry Creek Hall.


The application was in the amount of \$20,000 was based on a quote that we received from a roofing contractor. However, in order to do our due diligence we put the job out for tender to three local contractors. The lowest bid received was for the amount of \$12,148.00.

As a result of replacing the roof, we discovered issues with our electrical lights and wiring. We had to replace wiring and purchase new light fixtures in the banquet room area.

The total amount spent was \$15,136.38, leaving a balance of \$4,863.62. (Please see attached a summary of monies spent.) This amount will be used towards the replacement of the roof above the gym area of Cherry Creek Hall.

Please note that a financial statement for the reporting period of April 1, 2014 – March 31, 2015 will be submitted to ACRD upon completion of our year end financial statements.

1 Website

Needs design changes to facilitate easy access and use and to highlight critical local air quality dynamics and information. Ongoing need to streamline and update information.

2. Woodstove Exchange

The ACRD is currently without an Environmental Manager. Any assistance necessary to help make their woodstove exchange a success should be offered.

3. Airshed Management

In lieu of a full airshed management plan, next steps should be identified to move the process forward. (i.e. continue with emissions inventory, invite First Nations to the table etc.)

4. Airshed Monitoring

A number of monitoring projects need review and reporting out including:


- the 2013 large route nephelometer study (reporting especially to Cherry Creek, a hot spot),
- the MAML sampling conducted at the City Firehall
- the requested Catalyst SO2 monitoring
- 5. On the Ground Coordination of Air Quality Advisories and Protocols

A number of extended air quality advisories have been called for Port Alberni. To be effective, they require the coordination of monitoring, surveillance, airshed dynamics, public education, health impacts, and protective bylaw measures. Work needs to be done to streamline:

- Process for identifying possible point sources causing the advisory
- Process for requesting smoke reduction/cessation
- Process for getting the advisory warning out to the public (signage etc)
- Process for post advisory review/lessons learned
- general public education regarding inversion conditions, venting index, and pollution prevention
- 6. Assist ACRD with regional air quality initiatives including:
 - Request to establish alternatives to burning (2011)
 - Request to establish burning guidelines/bylaws for outdoor and indoor burning (2011).
- 7. Assist the City with air quality initiatives including:
 - Request that the city ban backyard burning (2011)

We hold the contracts from the Ministry of Justice that relate to violence prevention and support for the area reaching from Bamfield to the whole of the valley excluding the cities of Ucluelet and Tofino. This includes the Community Based Victim Services Program, the Children Who Witness Abuse program, the Stopping the Violence Counselling (STV) Program and the STV Outreach program. We also hold the contract with the Ministry of Children and Family Development to provide the Sexual Abuse Intervention Program for children to age of majority and for this program we take the referrals from the west coast if requested as well. We hold contracts with VIHA in regard to Aboriginal Health in the delivery of abuse prevention programs for children and we have Gaming funding for our Drop-In/Resource Centre on 3rd Avenue which is a hub for people needing resources, safety, referral, crisis support and general services like telephone, computer, bathroom, coffee and company. We run the Transition House for women and their children fleeing abuse and work closely with the Domestic Violence Policing Unit. This program is funded by BC Housing and we own the building that is Transition House. As well, we send staff to Anacla, near Bamfield with the RCMP, in a preventative and supportive counselling role.

We are filling needs in all of the programs above, most programs have waiting lists of referrals from School # 70, MCFD, Mental Health, police, probation, USMA, and many self-referrals.

We address the violence and prevention in the valley directly case by case with families, women, children and men and the results of same on both the individuals and society. We provide programs that house, help, support, advocate, educate and enrich a broad spectrum of all levels of the social fabric.

We are continually finding new ways and pilot programs to assist people –often with no or little funding except donations. After direct service, our focus is prevention.

Outline of Grant-In-Aid Usage ACAWS Social Enterprise Plan

Preamble

Given Alberni Community and Women's Services (ACAWS) is wholly dependent upon contracts and donations to provide the wide range of well-used social services.

And,

The contracts that are government based are constantly under review and time constraints and often not flexible enough to provide distinct immediate programming.

And,

The Board of Directors committed in their 2014 strategic plan to seek other revenue streams that were self-sufficient and self-directed.

Therefore,

The agency is pursuing a social enterprise that will help fund the agency in a sustaining way and provide social value to the district while opening an avenue that allows citizens to support ACAWS while receiving direct benefit in the form of product or skills.

Definition of Social Enterprise

"Social enterprises are owned by nonprofit organizations, and are directly involved in the production and/or selling of goods and services for the blended purpose of generating income and achieving social, cultural, and/or environmental aims. Social enterprises are one more tool for non-profits to use to meet their mission to contribute to healthy communities."

Social Enterprise Council of Canada

What we are doing – The VISION

ACAWS has committed to and is exploring opening a retail outlet "VALLEY LOCALS"* storefront in our building using space that we hitherto did not have access to. This social enterprise would provide a venue for only locally made and produced products that extend the market for valley only products throughout the week, not just on Saturday. Both Farmer's Markets are supportive of giving growers and producers and place where their products are accessible. (attached letter of support) Donors can provide support to us and our programs by gifting locally produced food as well. (plant a row for us!) We are promoting the "Help Us Help You Help Us" philosophy. We will be offering educational sessions monthly about growing and producing your own food by local producers, selling supplies to do so, and providing resources on sustainable food. As well, we will be selling bulk chemical free products like soap and cleaning supplies that customers can either make themselves and add scent or just buy bulk with their own containers. There will be a living wall of salad makings and eventually a whole range of offerings that are in support of both our local economy and production.

There are many levels to the community outcomes of this plan:

- 1. Social enterprise profit fed directly into needed future and existing social programs.
- 2. Venue for local sellers and a place to wholesale products for year round exposure to new markets. Promotion of agriculture in region.
- 3. Third Avenue storefront location drawing business to uptown and offering local produce to an underserved market.
- 4. Education to the public on food sustainability ideas in a real and hands on way. Support the exchange of skills and products for green, sustainable and locally grown good food that creates healthier families and community
- 5. Skill development of some of our Drop In clients in various partnerships with the training and employment centres in town by offering basic skills related to back end functions.
- 6. Support local farmers, small businesses, and companies that make products that cause little impact on our health and environment.
- 7. Cost Savings in difficult times and skill teaching to public, e.g. how to live on less

What we will do with the Grant-In-Aid

Partnerships- create and support the opportunity to develop partnerships throughout the regional district and work with the agriculture team to identify who we should be partnering with on many fronts. We also need to find the appropriate groups in business and tourist realms that have spin off partnership opportunities that benefit the whole region.

Marketing – provide the support to thoroughly explore the marketing options of agriculture in the district and how it can be married to the "Valley Locals" concept. Support the creative avenues with tying both ACRD and municipality's concepts into ours for marketing of the whole valley and region, so we are in sync with larger efforts to promote the region and the food sustainable movement already in play.

Stakeholder Relations- Explore how we fit into the regional plan and if we should be in exchange with west coast initiatives of which we are unaware. Ensure we are moving forward in consort with regional plans for two, five, ten years forward. Who are those players and how are we related to them in this endeavour.

What we will NOT do with the Grant-In-Aid

We will not be using the grant for hard business start-up costs like renovation of space, furnishings, hardware, advertising costs or facility expenses or management costs.

How it fits with the objectives of the ACRD

We appear to fall under two of the five objectives of your agricultural plan. To wit:

- 1. Realizing improvements for Farmers Markets to provide a secure, year-round venue with increased products and vendors.
- 2. Develop local marketing opportunities in the Alberni Valley, the West Coast, and Vancouver Island.

Alberni Valley Gleaning Project - Overview and Budget, 2015

The Alberni Valley Gleaning Project was created and has been run largely through the efforts of volunteers for the past three years. It has grown substantially and a corresponding increase in capital, for both program management and for equipment, is required for the program to continue.

The project is on track to becoming a major community service, demand for which is increasing exponentially. Harvests in 2014 more than tripled the average of the first two years. Significant community interest and support have been generated through the outreach done by newspaper articles, promotion at a booth at the Alberni District Fall Fair and Farmers' Markets and word of mouth. A project goal for 2015 is to deliver a survey to the public, either formally or informally (likely at the Fall Fair) to determine the potential amount of fruit which could be harvested in the Alberni Valley. It is estimated that the amount could run as high or higher than 30-40,000 pounds annually.

The project aims to increase it's own revenue going forward. Planned initiatives include the increase in sales of a portion of the fruit to local restaurants and the public. 2015 will be the second year that the Alberni Valley hosts a mobile fruit press, which will enable the project to quickly and easily create a simple and desirable value-added product. In addition, the feasibility of revenue generating activities such as pruning workshops, community canning demonstrations and Crowd-Funding will be investigated.

2014 was a year of change and growth for Alberni Valley Transition Towns Society. The year began with the addition of new and motivated members and they assisted in spearheading a drive to a more formal and extroverted approach in the community.

The Food Group continued to be the main source of funding and forged ahead with steps to get the Food Hub up and running according to the mandated Community Food Action Initiative through the Vancouver Island Health Authority. Members continued work towards getting more gardens on school campuses, growing the fruit gleaning project and improving the local food directory and map. They also worked to build interface relationships with the City and with the ACRD by taking up the cause of the Agricultural Development Plan (once that position became available), the Canada Day parade, hosting a variety of displays at the Fall Fair and providing guidance to the ACRD and assisting with the Family Farm Tour.

There was some activity in other AVTTS groups as well. The Alberni Low Energy Housing Society never did resurrect itself and may have become moribund, but there are moves afoot to set out a different plan with a different group of people. The Education/Hearts and Minds Group continued to present films monthly on a variety of topics, with heavy emphasis on local food and climate issues, and the Energy group hosted presentations on BioChar and Energy Technologies as they relate to our situation here in the Valley.

After significant community outreach, our final meeting in November saw many new faces. Newer members used an organizational chart to bring some order to the look of the Society, and the Food Group hired a coordinator (Sarah Thomas) to assume many of what had been volunteer duties and manage the CFAI project (including establishing the Community Food Security Round Table). A membership drive brought new revenue in the form of paid memberships to the budget.

Two prominent members of AVTTS were candidates for City Council, one elected. The physical door-knocking of Charles Thomas' campaign put a face on much of what we do, and Chris Alemany's online presence accomplished some of the same through a different channel. That Council has seen fit to create a committee tasked with food security and climate change policies could likely be ascribed to the work of Charles and Chris in bringing these issues to the fore. These drives for public office seem to signal an injection of new energy in AVTTS, a direct result of new people bringing their ideas and perspectives to the group.

We can only hope that the inertia generated in 2014 continues into future plans and prospects and that the newer contingent figure prominently in the leadership of AVTTS in the coming year.

Alberni Valley Bear Smart is a bear stewardship committee that works in partnership with government, stakeholders and local residents to reduce conflict with bears.

In 2012, Alberni Valley Bear Smart assisted with initiation of a fruit tree-harvesting program. Members of Alberni Valley Transition Towns Society have worked tirelessly to manage this program and it has developed into a significant community asset.

The program has helped us to effectively manage the second highest bear attractant in the community which is our fruit trees. We expect that we have generations of bears coming to the very same fruit trees in our neighborhoods each season, knowing exactly when each fruit tree ripens! Although for some residents there is a high level of tolerance for bears in their fruit trees, our fear is that one day we may have human-bear conflict that results in the death or significant injury of a human. We know that each year Conservation Officers need to kill bears because they have become human-habituated and food-conditioned to eating fruit from residential fruit trees.




Distibution of Edible Fruit



Recent Projects

The fall saw significant energy and activity. Hundreds of packets of seeds were distributed at the Canada Day Parade. The Gleaning Project, in collaboration with Eden Tree Farm, finished up a successful season that saw nearly 10 000 lbs of fruit picked. Through partnership with Ozzie's Cycle a carbon tax survey saw nearly 770 responses, education and movie nights raised discussion on issues ranging from the uses of hemp to globalization of our food system and the seed lending library at the Port Alberni branch of the Vancouver Island Regional Library saw the first seeds lent out!

Current Projects include continued development of the Food Hub and strategic planning around a Community Food Action Framework as well supporting Heather Shobe to continue development of school gardens. A proposal is active for a level pedestrian crossing for Roger creek that would increase the accessibility of the area. A local food buyers guide is underway and together with the Port Alberni Branch of the Vancouver Island Public Library the seed library continues to grow and the official launch will be February 4th.

Lots of other project ideas have come up and been tossed around including affordable housing, energy efficiency and green technologies. Feel free to come, swing by a meeting and see what it's all about. There's always room for another group or project idea!

A Roger Creek Crossing?

Peddling to the future

The first City Council meeting of the New Year heard a delegation from Transition Towns and the Alberni Environmental Coalition proposing a cycling/pedestrian bridge across Roger Creek. The history of this project goes back to 2008 when a fund was created by Alberni Environmental Coalition which allowed Alberni residents to donate their "\$100 Gordon Campbell carbon tax dividends" towards the construction of the bridge. Although the campaign initially raised over \$4000, the effort was stalled by the 2008 financial meltdown later that year.

Now the plan for a bridge has been resurrected. Hopes are high that City Council will respond by placing the Roger Creek cycling/pedestrian bridge as a line item in the next City budget process. This would allow council to make a decision on whether to go ahead with studies and planning so funding could be applied for through provincial and federal sources.

The cycling/pedestrian bridge would have a number of benefits for our community.

 It would provide a focal point to draw our community together in a common purpose as we work to raise the money to finance it and organize its construction. It would give us something to celebrate and take great pride in. AGM January 21, 7pm Char's Landing

- 2. The bridge would be a major benefit to the health of our citizens as they use it to walk or cycle from one side of the Roger Creek ravine to the other rather than driving their cars. The Roger Creek ravine itself is one of the most naturally beautiful gems in our community and the bridge would open this vista up to all who use it.
- It would encourage commerce locally by opening up a new avenue of access between North Port and South Port for shopping in the Johnson Road corridor and the Downtown and Central Port areas.
- 4. The bridge would create a convenient access from North Port to the new High School, Echo Recreation Area and North Island College as well as from South Port to the Pacific Coast University and the north side malls.
- 5. A unique and specially constructed bridge would be a draw for tourists to our community and would be a great addition to the network of trails which the community has been developing over the past several years. It could be one more thing to put our community on the map.
- A pedestrian and cycling bridge would be an important asset to our community in our efforts to decrease our carbon footprint by encouraging us to get out of our cars more often.

A New Coordinator!



Sarah Thomas was hired for a 4 month contract from now until mid April 2015 to undertake strategic planning and coordination of Transition Towns and continue work to development the food hub. Sarah having grown up in Port Alberni completed her Master's in Community and Regional Planning from the University of British Columbia in the Spring. Sarah's position is intended to drive community engagement around issues of food security and help define the role of the food hub in the Alberni

Clayoquot Regional District. Her first task will be to continue work that began last year to develop a community food action framework building off of the work of the food hub on the community food assessment and the work of the Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District (ACRD) on the ACRD Agriculture Plan.

residents. Thanks to Ozzies' Cycle for generously donating a mountain bike for a draw prize, well over 700 surveys were collected throughout last summer to raise awareness and gauge people's interest in a Carbon Tax. The results were surprising with over 91% of respondents believing that Climate Change is an urgent problem and 77% of respondents supporting the current BC carbon tax which has been seen to be effective in reducing greenhouse gas emissions over the past 5 years. Further than that 68% said they would support a carbon tax which increased by approximately 2.5 cents/litre each year for the next 15 years if the money collected by the tax was used to subsidize and promote renewable energy for transportation, homes, and industry.

Survey comments clustered around themes of Energy technologies, transportation, waste, food, governance and education. People felt that more public education was needed around climate change and people outlined many actions that could be taken now to minimize our collective "carbon footprint". Suggestions ranged from growing food and better utilising the resources available to us to bulk purchasing renewable energy technologies and minimizing waste. The most common comment was about promoting cycling in and around the city and making "more bike friendly roads" so the potential pedestrian crossing being presented at council January 12th will be a timely topic for conversation at this time.






The grant in aid will be used to cover the costs of fuel and maintenance for the society van. The van for this project is used Saturday evenings to distribute basic and urgent need items (clothing and household items) along with food to those in need.

Approximately 70 km is driven between collecting food items from grocery pick-ups in the morning to distributing these items and more in the evening.

Approximately 3600- 3800 km are used each year. The society is requesting \$2,500.00 to help cover these costs (fuel, maintenance). Maintenance is done on the vehicle twice a year to keep its longevity. The remaining funds will be to purchase identifiable Jackets (that will also include ACRD as the sponsor on them)and lanterns or battery powered type of spotlights so the parking lot areas are better lit when they are on site.

Insurance and other project expenses will be covered by other sources like the AV Community Foundation, Fundraising and INKIND support for the helpers of this project.

Financial support from the Alberni Clayoquot Regional District will result in media promotion as well as vehicle detailing to include this support being recognized on our mobile outreach van.

Application for ACRD Grant-in-Aid

PROPOSED USE OF GRANT FUNDS

The Port Alberni Maritime Heritage Society budget for 2015 attached to this application shows that with donations, assistance from gaming funds and Summer Student Employment grants we are able to maintain a balanced *operational* budget. In an attempt to manage our facilities in a responsible manner, that budget includes a small annual contribution to a reserve fund for long term maintenance items such as roof repairs to our galleries and other occasional but expensive items. This reserve policy has not been in place for long and the accumulated funds will not meet this year's major maintenance needs.

Several necessary maintenance items exceed our reserve capabilities and will need us either to delay them or use operational funds to complete them. This in turn would lead to an unbalanced budget and consequent medium term danger of our not meeting our program and services to youth and tourism. Delay will simply mean more expensive work in a later year.

The principle items needed this year are:

- 1. A major refurbishment or more likely a replacement of our main Hutcheson Gallery heat pump cost estimate between \$5,000 and \$8,000
- 2. Repainting of the Lighthouse Gallery tower where the paint is currently starting to deteriorate and if not attended to will cause much more expensive work later. The cost estimate for this is approximately \$6,000
- 3. Replacement of the Maritime Discovery Centre sign on the Lighthouse Gallery which has serious UV damage. The cost estimate for this item is \$2,000
- 4. Required maintenance to the Banfield Lifeboat heritage vessel on the quay cost of approximately \$500

The ACRD Grant-in-Aid, if granted, will be applied to one or more of these necessary projects in 2015.

Description of Project

In order to have horizontal surfaces for display of artefacts and for presentation of oral and video exhibits in the Tofino-Clayoquot Heritage Museum, we plan to build 12, 4-feet long, enclosed display benches, and 2, 8-feet long, open display benches. Each of the enclosed benches will have 2 doors, and will be used for storage of artefacts and other museum equipment. The open benches will be placed along the right wall of the museum over the two baseboard heaters that are along this wall. We will use cedar for the bench tops, doors and frame, because of the strong correlation of the local Nuu-chah-nulth people and cedar; the interior of the enclosed benches will be plywood.

We are also closing one of the existing washrooms and will convert this space to storage. We will build a double-decker storage unit that will sit on top of the present vanity unit.



Please accept our application for the 2015 Grant-in-Aid program. The 2014 Financial Statement and 2015 Budget provided with this application have not yet been approved by the board. Both items will be presented to the board at the next board meeting (February 17).

January 31, 2015

It is expected that the board will run a deficit budget for 2015. In 2015 our cash reserves will be used to bridge the gap between expenses and income. We are also seeking grant money from the District of Ucluelet and the Coastal Community Credit Union. Those two grant applications have focused on raising money to purchase emergency preparedness supplies.

The Ucluelet Children's Centre is the largest children's centre in the Ucluelet area and is a licensed Childcare Facility with Island Health. There are four licensed facilities in the area: a District of Ucluelet run playschool that operates several mornings a week, a home-based family daycare centre (capacity 8) and a daycare located in the nearby community of Ittatsoo (capacity 20). Island Health lists our capacity at 44 children. The Ucluelet Children's Centre offers the community a valuable service, providing exceptional care for children aged 30 months and older.

The Ucluelet & Area Childcare Society requests \$2000.00 that will help fund our basic operating costs. Specifically the grant will be used to purchase daycare supplies. These supplies benefit all of our programs, including the all-day Summer & Spring Break Camp for School Aged children.


Daycare Supplies - \$1000: Our ECE staff have requested literacy materials/programming, educational table toys, theme materials (Example: Easter, Chinese New Year) books and puppets for story telling. One of the literacy programs that our centre would benefit from is "Moe the Mouse" Speech and Language Development Program. Moe the Mouse is a program of the BC Aboriginal Child Care Society. The cost of the Moe the Mouse program is \$500, with the remaining \$500 going towards the above mentioned supplies.

Art and Craft Supplies - \$1000: The art & craft budget includes the purchase of all paper, paint, glue, crayons, chalk and other basic craft materials. All of our programs include daily art and craft projects which are especially important during the rainy months. Our ECE staff develop fun and educational programing, such as learning about the solar system. They would use stories and songs to teach the children about the solar system as well as craft and art projects relating to the theme.

Subject: Grant-in-Aid Update - Island Corridor Foundation (ICF)

In 2013 the Board of Directors approved the following motion:

THAT Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District approve a one-time grant-in-aid to the Island Corridor Foundation in the amount of \$89,853.00 over a two year period between 2013 and 2014 with the City of Port Alberni, the District of Ucluelet, Electoral Area "A" (Bamfield), Electoral Area "D" (Sproat Lake), Electoral Area "E" (Beaver Creek), and Electoral Area "F" (Cherry Creek) participating in the grant in aid subject to the following:

- a. Exploring alternative funding sources in lieu of property taxes and in the event alternate funds become available, the ACRD be reimbursed by the Island Corridor Foundation;
- b. The commitment of the Island Corridor Foundation partners to their share of the current contribution; and
- c. Commitment by the Island Corridor Foundation and other regional partners to submit a budget and plan for the Alberni Sub within 30 months with a letter from the Island Corridor Foundation Board confirming the next upgrade is the Alberni sub.

In 2013 \$44,929 was requisitioned but because the above conditions had not been met the other half of the grant was not requisitioned in 2014. For 2015, staff have still not included the other half of the requisition as it is not know at this time if ICF has fulfilled the conditions of the grant. If the Directors would like the other half of the grant to be funded in 2015 the following motion would be required:

THAT Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District requisition the second half of the one-time grant-in-aid to the Island Corridor Foundation in the amount of \$44,924.00 with the City of Port Alberni, the District of Ucluelet, Electoral Area "A"

(Bamfield), Electoral Area "D" (Sproat Lake), Electoral Area "E" (Beaver Creek), and Electoral Area "F" (Cherry Creek) participating in the grant in aid.

Recommendation:

That the Committee of the Whole consider approving an Alberni Valley grant-in-aid for \$10,000 to the Beaver Creek Community Club to include in the first reading of the 2015-2019 Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District Financial Plan.

Background:

The Beaver Creek Community Club hall sustained significant flooding damage in the basement due to the December 9, 2014 rain event. This facility is listed as a reception center in the Alberni Valley Emergency plan and is an important asset to the area. Staff has worked with David Horst, the representative of the Beaver Creek Community Club, and Emergency Management BC but it has been determined because the loss is insured through their property insurance policy that it is not eligible for Provincial funding as EMBC covers only non-insurable losses. The repair is estimated to be between \$15,000 and \$20,000. The issue for the hall is that the deductible for the insurance policy is \$10,000 which is in excess of their ability to pay.
