## PORT ALBERNI RCMP DETACHMENT MONTHLY REPORT



This report represents the policing activities undertaken by the Port Alberni RCMP Detachment during October 2015. I have included an update on policing activities thus far in 2015 and a comparator to previous years.

The following represents some of the calls for services received, investigations undertaken and activities of the RCMP during the month.

- Officers received and responded to 860 calls for service.
- The most significant call for service was that of an explosive device that was found at a local residence. This matter is still under investigation.
- The crime type that has shown the largest increase over 2014 is that of property crime. An overall increase of 18% has been seen in this area.
- A crime type that has seen a decrease is that of persons violent crime. This category is down 8% over that of 2014.
- The overall Criminal Code complaints are up 5% over that of 2014, which is fairly consistent to what has been experienced on Vancouver Island as a whole.
- In November the Victim Services Unit assisted 27 new clients, 14 in relation to violence within relationships.
- Traffic and road safety is a policing priority for 2015/16 and a key to ensuring safe roadways for
  everyone. In November the Port Alberni Detachment increased focus and enforcement with respect to
  speeding and stop signs. Our enforcement efforts were furthered through the use and attendance of
  Speed Watch.
- On November 15 the Port Alberni RCMP and the Port Alberni Fire Department competed in the "Battle
  of the Badges Hockey Challenge". Once again a great opportunity to partner for a fantastic cause, the
  Port Alberni Association for Community Living.

Port Alberni RCMP's 2015/16 Annual Performance Plan will focus on:

- Crime Reduction: Reduce the impact and prevalence of crime
- Mental Health: Increase awareness and decrease the impact of mental health in calls for service
- Visibility/engagement: Engagement with community and patrols
- Traffic: Increased road safety through focus on Provincial traffic offences and impaired driving

## VANCOUVER ISLAND REGION 2016 PROPERTY ASSESSMENT NOTICES IN THE MAIL

VICTORIA – In the next few days, owners of more than 360,000 properties throughout the Vancouver Island Region can expect to receive their 2016 property assessment notices which reflect market value as of July 1, 2015.

"The majority of residential home assessments within the region are shifting between -5% to +10% compared to last year's assessments," says Regional Assessor Reuben Danakody. "Notably, a robust real estate market over the past year resulted in assessment increases for many properties in the Vancouver Island Region."

As B.C.'s trusted, go-to provider of property information, BC Assessment collects, monitors and analyzes property data throughout the year. The table below indicates the Vancouver Island Region's estimated typical percentage changes to 2016 assessment values by property type compared to 2015 (note that property assessments may vary by individual jurisdiction/municipality within the region).

Overall, the Vancouver Island Region's total assessments increased from \$163.96 billion in 2015 to \$170.15 billion this year. A total of almost \$2.24 billion of the region's updated assessments is from new construction, subdivisions and rezoning of properties. The Vancouver Island Region includes all communities located within Greater Victoria, South Island, Central Island, North Island, West Coast, Northern and Southern Gulf Islands and Powell River.

Of note, BC Assessment has launched a newly-enhanced website at <u>bcassessment.ca</u> that includes more details about 2016 assessments, property information and trends such as lists of 2016's top most valuable residential properties across the province. The website also provides self-service access to the free online *e*-value *BC* service that allows anyone to search, check and compare 2016 property assessments anywhere in the province.

"Property owners can access useful information on our website including answers to many assessment related questions. Those who feel that their property assessment does not reflect market value as of July 1, 2015 or see incorrect information on their notice, should contact BC Assessment as indicated on their notice as soon as possible in January," says Danakody.

"If a property owner is still concerned about their assessment after speaking to one of our appraisers, they may submit a Notice of Complaint (Appeal) by February 1, for an independent review by a Property Assessment Review Panel," adds Danakody.

The Property Assessment Review Panels, independent of BC Assessment, are appointed annually by the Ministry of Community, Sport and Cultural Development, and typically meet between February 1 and March 15 to hear formal complaints.

## MEDIA BACKGROUNDER January 4, 2016

#### Facts on B.C. Property Assessments and the 2016 Assessment Roll

- Total number of properties on the 2016 roll is 1,996,112, an approximate 1.06% increase from 2015.
- Total value of real estate on the 2016 roll is \$1,336,100,851,128 (\$1.34 trillion), an increase of 11.1% from 2015.
- Total amount of 'non-market change', including new construction and development: approximately \$20.36 billion, an increase of 8.9% from the 2015 roll of \$18.69 billion.
- In B.C., approx. 87.7% of all properties are classified with some residential (Class 1) component. This equates to over \$1.018 trillion (\$1,018,221,517,973) of the value on the total provincial roll.
- Over 98% of property owners typically accept their property assessment without proceeding to a formal, independent review of their assessment.
- Assessments are the estimate of a property's market value as of July 1, 2015 and physical condition as of October 31, 2015. This common valuation date ensures there is an equitable property assessment base for property taxation.
- Changes in property assessments reflect movement in the local real estate market
  and can vary greatly from property to property. When estimating a property's market
  value, BC Assessment's professional appraisers analyze current sales in the area, as
  well as considering other characteristics such as size, age, quality, condition, view
  and location.
- Real estate sales determine a property's value which is reported annually by BC
   Assessment. Local governments and other taxing authorities are responsible for
   property taxation and, after determining their own budget needs this spring, will
   calculate property tax rates based on the assessment roll for their jurisdiction.
- BC Assessment's assessment roll provides the foundation for local and provincial taxing authorities to raise approximately \$7 billion in property taxes each year. This revenue funds the many community services provided by local governments around the province, including the public school system.

### **General Funding Terms & Conditions**

The purpose of these Terms and Conditions is to provide basic information on the administration of Local Government Program Services (LGPS) grants. For specific information regarding the terms and conditions of each funding program, please refer to the Program & Application Guide.

#### 1. Definitions

- Approved Applicant In general, LGPS grants are awarded to local governments (regional districts and municipalities). However, under some programs, other organizations, such as First Nations and aboriginal organizations or boards of education, can be the approved applicant. The approved applicant is the primary contact for UBCM and is responsible for overall grant management.
- Approved Partner(s) Are organizations that contribute directly to the approved project, are identified in the application and are approved by UBCM. Possible partners include, but are not limited to, boards of education, health authorities, First Nations or aboriginal organizations, non-profit organizations and local governments (other than the applicant).
- Approved Project Is the activity or activities described in the application and approved by UBCM.
- Cash Expenditures Are direct costs properly and reasonably incurred and paid for with money by the
  approved applicant or approved project partners for the development or implementation of the approved
  project. For example, catering and consultant fees can be cash expenditures.
- **In-Kind Expenditures** Are the use of resources of the approved applicant or approved project partner for the development or implementation of the approved project. For example, the use of meeting rooms owned by the applicant or approved partner can be an in-kind expenditure.
- **Program & Application Guides** Are the application and program materials prepared by UBCM to describe the program and assist applicants in completing and submitting an application. All Program & Application Guides are available at www.ubcm.ca.

#### 2. Eligible & Ineligible Costs

Eligible costs, including cash and in-kind expenditures, are direct costs properly and reasonably incurred by the approved applicant or approved partners in the development or implementation of the approved project. To be eligible, these costs must be outlined in the detailed budget submitted by the approved applicant as part of the application process and be approved by UBCM. Requests to change the budget must be made to UBCM, in writing, by the approved applicant (see below). Please see the Program & Application Guide for specific notes regarding eligible and ineligible costs.

#### 3. Post-Approval Terms

#### **Notice of Approval**

UBCM will inform approved applicants by letter and a specified percentage of the approved grant amount will be forwarded upon approval. The balance will be paid on satisfactory completion of the project and receipt of all final reporting requirements.

### **Applicant Responsibilities**

LGPS grants are awarded to approved applicants. When collaborative projects are undertaken, the approved applicant remains the primary organization responsible for the grant. Due to this, the approved applicant is the primary contact for UBCM and is responsible for:

- Ensuring that approved activities are undertaken as outlined in the approved application and within the required timeline,
- Providing proper fiscal management of the grant and approved project (see below), and

 Submitting progress and/or final reports, using UBCM forms where available, as required by the Program & Application Guide (see below).

#### **Accounting Records**

Acceptable accounting records must be kept that clearly disclose the nature and amounts of cash and in-kind expenditures incurred during the development or implementation of the approved project. Financial summaries are required to be submitted as part of the final report and must be signed by a representative of the approved applicant (or as required in the Program & Application Guide). In all cases, the final project expenditure must be net of any rebates (such as HST) that the approved applicant or approved partner is eligible to receive.

### **Changes to or Cancellation of Approved Project**

Approved applicants need to advise UBCM, in writing, of any significant variation from the approved project as described in the approved application, including any major changes to:

- · Start or end dates
- Cash and in-kind expenditures or matching funds (when required)
- Project purpose, goals, outcomes or milestones
- Project partners

UBCM's approval may be required in advance for such changes. If an approved project is cancelled, the approved applicant is responsible for ensuring any grant monies that have been advanced are returned to UBCM within 30 days, or as outlined in the Program & Application Guide.

### 4. Reporting Requirements

#### **Submission of Reports**

Approved applicants are required to submit progress and final reports as outlined in the Program & Application Guide. When UBCM forms are available, they are required to be used. Please note the following when submitting a report:

- When completing a UBCM report form please ensure that each question is answered and that all attachments are complete. Follow any sample templates that UBCM provides.
- When a report form is not required, please ensure that each required component, as outlined in the Program & Application Guide, is addressed in your report and that all attachments are complete.
- Unless specifically requested, please do not bind reports or submit in binders or folders.
- When submitting electronically, submit all documents as Word or PDF files.
- All digital photos or images should be submitted, by e-mail or on CD, as JPEG files.

#### **Extensions and Outstanding Reports**

In order for an approved project to continue past the approved end date – or for a final report to be submitted after the established deadline – approved applicants must contact LGPS and request and be granted permission for an extension.

Approved applicants that do not request extensions and have outstanding reports may forfeit the final payment of their grant and may not be eligible to apply to future LGPS programs until reports are received.

RE: Transit challenges in active and growing communities

### Dear Minister Stone;

I am writing in response to your letter dated October 22, 2015 regarding an update on transit funding. While I appreciate the Province's efforts to fully utilize the 3-year investments in transit, the District of Squamish continues to be in a very challenging situation regarding transit growth.

As previously discussed with you at our meeting in Victoria on March 15, 2015, Squamish is growing quickly, which is presenting unique transportation challenges. According to the most recent census, Squamish's population increased by 14.6% between 2006 and 2011, making it one of the fastest growing municipalities in BC and that growth continues today. Housing starts and prices have also risen exponentially in the past 2 years in particular. Growth, coupled with a youthful, more urban population and an active seniors population has increased demand for transit and active transportation alternatives. Our population, below the provincial median age, is seeking transportation alternatives to meet their active lifestyles while decreasing their dependency on traditional motor vehicle transportation.

The "flat budget" for transit operations makes it impossible for us to make important expansions to service Squamish's new neighbourhood and tourism nodes. Our rapidly growing population has resulted in increased reliance, and demand on the public transportation service with transit ridership increasing by 23% between 2013 and 2014. The ridership increase represents the highest growth rate in BC, and service improvements are required simply to meet the growing needs of our community.

We ask that the Province, in conjunction with BC Transit, take into consideration the aggregate tax benefit generated by tourism in the Corridor, and reinvest into transit services. The Sea to Sky Corridor is a hub for outdoor recreation and offers a number of major tourism attractions. In partnership with BC Transit, the District of Squamish was working on implementing a pilot route to service the Stawamus

Chief and Shannon Falls Provincial Parks, as well as the Sea to Sky Gondola and the Squamish Nation's Totem Hall along Highway 99, a program that could not be realized due to the funding freeze.

At the UBCM conference in September 2015, we met with Minister de Jong to discuss implementing a local motor fuel tax to help fund local and intercity transit services. There is significant public engagement required before any such decision is made but a possible outcome is a Sea to Sky motor fuel tax similar to the Translink dedicated motor fuel tax in the Lower Mainland. The revenue generated would be extremely beneficial in supporting regional economic development and would help increase transit options essential to families, senior citizens and lower income individuals whom rely on the current service. Corridor Resident are essentially paying the same amount for gasoline as the lower Mainland without the added benefit of augmented transit services.

The total provincial tax applied to gasoline is 32.17 cents per liter in the Vancouver area (South Coast BC Transportation Service Region) compared to 21.17 cents in the Sea to Sky corridor; a difference of 11 cents per liter. This includes dedicated motor fuel taxes, provincial motor fuel tax, and carbon tax. Despite this, the gas price in Squamish is currently between \$122.9-123.9 per litre and in Pemberton the price of gas is \$117.9 per litre. The cost of gas in Metro Vancouver on December 1, 2015 is between \$115.9-120.9 per litre.

The District of Squamish's Sea to Sky Transit Future Plan is nearing completion and outlines the vision, goals, targets and Transit Future Network for Squamish and Regional Transit service to 2040. Implementation of this plan will require additional funding from the Province and the District of Squamish for operational costs, and should reflect the increase in ridership in the region.

Squamish Transit is a success story that we want to build on and continue to improve. This will take the support and collaboration of our provincial government to achieve.

### **Wood Stove Exchange Program benefits communities**

Victoria - As winter's cold embrace descends upon B.C., the Ministry of Environment is providing over \$190,000 to 13 communities and regional districts as part of the Provincial Wood Stove Exchange Program.

Since 2008, the B.C. government, in partnership with the BC Lung Association, has helped British Columbians replace their older model stoves with new cleaner burning models. Last year over 600 stoves were exchanged across the province and the goal is to have another 600 stoves exchanged again this coming year.

Smoke from older higher-polluting wood stoves, in combination with the cold still nights of winter, has a significant impact on air quality. This is one of the leading reasons why some areas of B.C. see more air quality advisories at this time of year.

The Wood Stove Exchange Program helps homeowners by providing a \$250 rebate when a new wood-burning, pellet or natural gas stove is purchased and an older model retired. New emissionscertified wood stoves burn one-third less wood; and reduce smoke and particulates entering the atmosphere by 70% or more.

The funding will also be put toward educational materials and workshops in communities to better inform residents on clean wood burning.

To date, the Province has put \$2.5 million toward the program, resulting in the purchase of over 6,600 cleaner-burning models.

There are close to 70,000 older-model wood stoves still in use around the province. Older wood stoves can affect the health of homeowners, neighbours and overall airshed health. Exchanging these wherever possible is highly recommended.

### **Quick Facts:**

- The Wood Stove Exchange Program has reduced particulate matter emissions by over 400 tonnes per year benefitting air quality in the 27 communities and regional districts that have participated.
- In B.C., all new wood stoves and inserts sold must meet U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) or Canadian Standards Association (CSA) emission standards.
- More than 6,600 wood-burning stoves and inserts have been replaced by cleaner burning models since the Provincial Wood Stove Exchange Program began eight years ago – this equates to an estimated reduction of 410 tonnes of particulate matter pumped into the air each year.
- Always use dry well-seasoned wood cut into pieces that are 10-15cm in diameter. Burning "green" or wet wood produces significantly more smoke.
- Firewood should be seasoned for at least six months. Burning seasoned wood also saves money by reducing wood consumption by 25%.

Dear Al Richmond:

I am writing to provide you with an update on the recent teleconference that was held with a group of British Columbia (BC) Mayors on December 4, 2015, regarding refugee settlement. The teleconference offered an opportunity for the Ministry of Jobs, Tourism and Skills Training to provide an update on the refugee resettlement process with Mayors whose communities are most likely to welcome a number of refugees.

During the call, I informed Mayors that the federal commitment to resettle 25,000 Syrian refugees by March 2015 will be supported by \$678 million over six years – \$377 million of which will go towards settlement services to address refugees' needs once they are in Canada. I further highlighted the fact that refugees are permanent residents and have access to all the provincial programs that other British Columbians have access to. Within government, we are actively planning for this and have set up an Assistant Deputy Minister level committee of all impacted ministries to exchange information and plan for readiness. I further notified Mayors that the province is working closely with the federal government (who have full jurisdiction over the refugee resettlement program) to identify which BC communities have the capacity to welcome and support refugees.

As part of our commitment to ensure community readiness, the province has launched a \$1 M Refugee Readiness Fund to develop province-wide refugee services and supports, as well as fund five Refugee Response Teams in regions across the province – including the Lower Mainland, Fraser Valley, Vancouver Island, Thompson-Okanagan and Cariboo. We have also developed a BC Plan for proposed refugee settlement locations, volumes, and flow rates. In refining this plan, we want to work closely with municipalities to better understand communities' capacity and willingness to accept government-assisted refugees.

I would like to take this opportunity to follow up on a few of the items that we discussed during the meeting. Enclosed is a contact list so that UBCM members know whom to contact should they have questions about the refugee process. In addition, enclosed is a document that outlines the federal and provincial supports already available to refugees as well as a profile of Syrian refugees prepared by Immigration, Refugees, and Citizenship Canada.

At the meeting we discussed housing registries, and I have confirmed that the federal government is not coordinating housing offers at a national level. Rather, settlement service agencies in various provinces are managing their own registry processes. In BC, a registry of private housing offers is being led by the Immigrant Services Society of BC. You can access their housing registry and direct individuals in your community to enter housing offers by following this link: http://issbc.org/prim-corp-nav/our-work-with-refugees/refugee-crisis/howcan-i-help-refugees.

Lastly, I will commit to providing you with summary notes from weekly calls between the provinces and the federal Government Operations Centre. I invite you to circulate these notes through UBCM so that Mayors can stay up-to-date on the latest information.

I know that municipalities would like to stay apprised of how many refugees will be arriving in their communities. The refugee numbers are continually evolving and the federal government has created a website to provide information on refugee volumes and settlement locations. The website is available at: www.cic.gc.ca/english/refugees/welcome/map.asp. As of December 10, 2015, there are between 228 and 232 privately sponsored refugees destined for 12 BC communities. The federal government plans to update the website weekly, and provincial staff will be using the website as their primary source of information on refugee volumes. I also encourage you and your staff to check the website regularly to stay up-to-date on the impact to your communities.

Please feel free to share this letter with your members as appropriate. Thank you again for your time and ongoing commitment to the refugee settlement process in BC. I look forward to our continued engagement on this matter.



# Population Profile: Syrian Refugees

### **Executive Summary**

The conflict in Syria, which began in 2011, has caused widespread displacement with more than 4 million Syrian refugees fleeing, mainly to neighbouring countries such as Lebanon, Turkey, Jordan and Iraq.

Conditions in asylum countries vary but overall are quite poor. Iraq, Jordan and Turkey are the only three countries that have formal refugee camps; however, the majority of Syrian refugees (85 percent) live in non-camp environments such as urban centers or makeshift dwellings. Syrian refugees resettled to Canada will come primarily from asylum countries such as Jordan and Lebanon where local integration is not possible due to the overwhelming number of refugees residing in those countries.

In order to prepare for the arrival of refugees, CIC compiled available information on demographics and health characteristics of Syrian refugees. Some of the most common medical conditions found include: hypertension, diabetes and visual or hearing impairment. In addition, mental illness and trauma are common given the experiences in Syria, in transit and in asylum countries. Symptoms may not appear right away and therefore, follow-up is crucial. In terms of languages, of the Syrian refugees resettled to Canada in 2014, 46 percent reported knowing at least one of Canada's official languages, making language skills training an important factor in integration.

It is essential that cultural considerations are given to Syrian refugees when providing services as there are a number of important aspects to consider such as providing culturally appropriate health care, understanding family dynamics, religious beliefs and food and dietary restrictions.

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### **Background**

### Introduction

Since early 2011, armed conflict in the Syrian Arab Republic has led more than 4 million Syrians to seek refuge in the neighbouring countries of Jordan, Lebanon, Iraq, Turkey and Egypt, resulting in significant humanitarian needs. According to the United Nations Refugee Agency (UNHCR), as of July 2015, an additional 7.6 million Syrians are internally displaced, with numbers increasing as the crisis continues unabated.

### Situational Overview

Syrian President Bashar al-Assad and the ruling Ba'ath Party have been in power since 2000. Protests began after many years of political repression and government corruption. Protestors called for democratic reforms, the release of political prisoners, multi-party elections and, in many cases, the end of the regime. The Syrian government responded to anti-regime activity with widespread arrests, beatings, interrogations, torture, and the use of live ammunition and snipers on protestors as well as barrel bombs and chlorine gas on areas viewed as anti-regime strongholds.

Since 2011, an estimated 1,500 armed rebel groups, with ever-changing alliances and factions—some secular and some Islamist—have become active in Syria.

Two notable Islamist groups also vying for territorial control in Syria are Jabhat al-Nusra, an arm of Al Qaeda, and the Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant (ISIL).

### Syrian Communities in Canada

According to the 2011 National Household Survey, there were 40,840 people in Canada reporting Syrian ethnic origin. The largest percentage of people of Syrian origin live in Quebec (44 percent), followed by Ontario (39 percent). The cities with the highest percentages of people of Syrian origin are Montréal (40 percent), Toronto (20 percent), Ottawa-Gatineau (7 percent), and London (3 percent). Similarly, the majority of Syrian refugees resettled to Canada reside in

Quebec and Ontario, particularly in Montreal and Toronto. These communities could be important sources of emotional support for newly arrived refugees.

### **Demographic Characteristics**

This section provides an overview of general characteristics and demographics of Syrians in their country of origin. In addition, Citizenship and Immigration Canada (CIC) has provided demographic information on Syrian refugees who have resettled to Canada.

### Age




Figure 2: Age distribution in Syria. Source: CIA, 2014.




Figure 3: Age distribution of Syrian refugees resettled to Canada in 2014.

As shown in Figure 2, 33 percent of people in Syria are under 15 years old, 20 percent are between 15 and 24 and 43 percent are between 25 and 64 years old. See Figure 2 for the age proportions in Syria. Comparatively, refugees who have resettled to Canada had similar numbers. Of the Syrian refugees resettled to Canada in 2014, 34 percent were under 15 years old, 15 percent were between 15 and 24 years old, and 48 percent were between 25 and 64 years old. See Figure 3 for the ages of resettled Syrian refugees.

### Languages

Languages spoken in Syria include Arabic (official language), Kurdish, Armenian, Aramaic, and Circassian (widely understood). French and English are somewhat understood. According to the Cultural Orientation Resource Center, an organization that has provided cultural backgrounders to the U.S. government, Arabic is the native language of 90 percent of the population.

Of the Syrian refugees resettled to Canada in 2014, approximately 46 percent spoke at least one of Canada's official languages.

### Literacy

Universal literacy was a major goal of the Syrian government before the conflict. As a result, 84 percent of the population is literate (90 percent of men and 77 percent of women).

### Ethnic Groups

Prior to the conflict, Syria's ethnic groups consisted of Arabs (90 percent) and Kurds, Armenians and others (10 percent).

### Urbanization

Approximately 56 percent of Syria's population resided in urban areas prior to the conflict, particularly in Damascus, Aleppo, Hama, and Homs, which are the country's four largest cities. Drought and demographic shifts resulting from a rural exodus have been identified as key reasons behind the start of protests and the onset of the crisis.

### Religion

The majority religion in Syria is Islam, which makes up 87 percent of the population, including 74 percent who are Sunni Muslim, and 13 percent who are Alawi, Ismaili and Shia Muslim. Approximately 10 percent practice Christianity, with individuals identifying as Orthodox, Uniate and Nestorian Christians. The remaining 3 percent are Druze. The conflict has taken on sectarian dimensions as political opinion has become ascribed based on religious affiliation. For example, individuals who are Alawi are assumed to be pro-Assad, which further exacerbates tensions between opposing groups.




Figure 4: Religions in Syria. Source: CIA, 2014.

### Access to Education

In pre-conflict Syria, high rates of primary school attendance were achieved due to free public education. However, rates of primary school attendance in rural areas were significantly lower than the national average, and there were high dropout rates at the secondary school level, especially among girls. Furthermore, the Ba'ath party used Syria's education system as a tool to indoctrinate children with party ideologies, and teachers were generally not permitted to express ideas that opposed government policy.

According to the Cultural Orientation Resource Center, 72 percent of Syrians of secondary school age were enrolled in school before the uprising. The current conflict situation has taken a severe toll on the education system, with school attendance rates down to 6 percent in some areas due to general insecurity, damaged buildings and a lack of teachers.

Prior to the conflict, a combination of public and private universities existed to provide higher education access to men and women in Syria. However, as with primary and secondary school, restrictions on academic and political freedom were largely present. According to the World Bank, post-secondary school enrollment steadily increased over the years prior to the conflict and in 2010, 26 percent of the population in the five-year age group following secondary school had enrolled in post-secondary education. It is highly likely that enrollment has dropped by a large percentage since then.

### **Countries of Asylum**

### Size and Demographics of the Refugee Population

In 2015, the number of registered Syrian refugees reached 4 million. The majority of refugees reside in the neighbouring countries of Iraq, Turkey, Lebanon, Jordan and Egypt. The number of refugees in neighbouring asylum countries is illustrated in Figure 5. These countries are most affected by the influx of Syrian refugees across their borders and are struggling to meet the needs of refugees in addition to those of their own populations.




Figure 6: Age and gender breakdown of Syrian refugees, Source: UNHCR

Figure 6 shows the percentage breakdown by age and gender of

Syrian refugees based on data from the United Nations Refugee Agency (UNHCR). This chart shows that 52 percent of Syrian refugees are under the age of 18 and are therefore especially vulnerable.

### Conditions in Asylum Countries

Living conditions in asylum countries vary greatly but overall are poor, particularly in Lebanon. For example, inadequate shelter during the winter of 2015 resulted in some refugees and their children freezing to death in camps. Iraq, Jordan and Turkey are the only three countries that have formal refugee camps; however, the majority of Syrian refugees (85 percent) live in non-camp environments such as urban centers or makeshift dwellings.

Syrian refugees often lack access to adequate shelter, clean water, health care, schools and income-generating activities. As the conflict continues and refugees deplete their own financial resources, their situation becomes increasingly precarious and tensions with refugee-hosting communities are rising. Access to education is a major challenge and the majority of Syrian children living outside of Syria continue to miss critical educational milestones. About 89 percent of children living in refugee camps are attending school; however, given that the majority of Syrian refugees do not live in camps, overall 68 percent of children living outside of Syria are not attending school.

### Lebanon

With a population of almost 6 million people and over 1 million Syrian refugees, Lebanon has the most refugees per capita in the world. Lebanon maintains a no-camp policy, so Syrians are dispersed among 1,700 localities in apartments or houses, abandoned buildings and informal

tented settlements. Adequate shelter, access to health care, and water and sanitation are the greatest challenges in the humanitarian response.

#### **Jordan**

Jordan is a country of 8 million people and is host to 628,000 Syrian refugees. Jordan has three official Syrian refugee camps in the northern areas (near the border with Syria): Za'atari Refugee Camp, Azraq Camp and Emirates Jordanian Camp. Within Jordan, 16 percent of refugees live in camps and 84 percent live outside of camps. Health care is available in clinics and hospitals in the largest camps. Outside of camps, it is reported that 38 percent of refugees live in substandard shelter. Adequate water, sanitation and hygiene facilities have been particularly challenging in Jordan especially in the congested Za'atari camp.

### **Turkey**

Turkey is a country of 82 million people and is host to 1.9 million Syrians, in addition to other asylum populations such as Iraqis and Afghans (as of August 2015). There are 23 camps across the south of Turkey that are home to approximately 260,000 refugees, while the remaining refugees live outside of camps in housing units such as rented houses or apartments. About 56 percent of the refugees in the camps often live four to six people per housing unit (e.g., a tent or container). Close to 30 percent of refugees in the Turkish camps live with seven people or more in a housing unit. Many refugees are living in insecure dwellings, and 75 percent of families are struggling to meet their basic food needs.

### Iraq

Iraq has a population of over 32 million people and is also host to 247,000 Syrian refugees. The majority of refugees live outside of camps (62 percent), mostly in urban centres with little access to assistance, while 38 percent live in camps. Refugees in Iraq receive free medical and educational services, but the country's infrastructure is overwhelmed by the needs of Syrians and Iraqis alike. Much like the other asylum countries, there is low school attendance for Syrian refugee children in Iraq.

### **Egypt**

There are 132,000 Syrian refugees residing in Egypt, while the population is close to 87 million people. Like Lebanon, Egypt does not have refugee camps. Syrians live in urban neighborhoods, renting and sharing accommodation. In general, refugees have access to Egyptian public health and education but face discrimination in accessing these services.

### **Health Characteristics**

The following section includes information from open-source reports on the prevalence of diseases, as well as other health issues impacting resettlement and integration (e.g. immunizations, mental health issues, injuries and disabilities, and sexual violence) among Syrian refugees mostly those living in Lebanon and Jordan. Following this general health section,

aggregate data on health conditions amongst Syrian refugees resettled to Canada is provided. This information is taken from the Department's immigration medical exam (IME).

### General Health Conditions among Syrian Refugees

#### **Communicable and Non-communicable Diseases**

In 2013, the UNHCR conducted health care consultations in Lebanon, Jordan and Iraq and produced a report outlining some of the most prevalent diseases among Syrian refugees. While the majority of diseases in this report are consistent with CIC's data on resettled refugees, some of the conditions mentioned are not identified in CIC's data but are worth noting. Medical conditions mentioned in the UNHCR research include respiratory tract infections, chronic respiratory diseases, diarrhea, skin infections, urinary tract infections and eye or ear infections.

#### **Vaccine-Preventable Diseases**

Vaccine-preventable diseases are particularly difficult to assess, as the majority of refugees will not have their personal documents, such as immunization and medical records. Mass vaccination campaigns for polio and measles were undertaken in Lebanon, Turkey, Iraq and Jordan in 2013; however, an exact estimate of how many Syrian refugees received these vaccines is not available. Therefore, health-care providers should be prepared to provide vaccinations to some refugees.

#### Trauma and Mental Illness

Mental health and psychosocial support services will be essential for many Syrians after arriving in Canada. Mental health is one of the most prevalent health concerns, as much of the Syrian refugee population has experienced some form of trauma, including losing family members, being subject to or witnessing violent acts, or suffering from conflict-induced physical disabilities due to the use of barrel bombs and torture. According to the UNHCR, 43 percent of Syrian refugees referred for resettlement were submitted under the Survivor of Violence and/or Torture category in 2013 and 2014.

The UNHCR reports a high prevalence of mental health conditions particularly among children and adolescents. The UNHCR (2013) found that mental health is the most prevalent health concern for people ages 5 to 17 in both Lebanon and Jordan. Mercy Corps conducted focus group discussions with adolescents in Jordan and Lebanon and found that trauma is causing high physical and social isolation of refugees, particularly amongst adolescent girls. As a result, 20 percent of the children and adolescents interviewed left their home once a week or less. Boys mentioned broken social networks and a growing sense of hopelessness. They also described their humiliation due to tension between Syrian refugees and the host community.

Syrian attitudes toward mental health have shifted a great deal according to the Cultural Orientation Resource Center. Prior to the crisis, receiving treatment for mental illness had a negative stigma, making people more reluctant to seek treatment or discuss issues. However, as

large numbers of Syrian men, women and children are in psychological distress, they are more open to receiving mental health support. The need for treatment is difficult to predict, as symptoms can arise several months after arrival in the country of resettlement. Therefore, follow-up on mental health issues is crucial.

### **Injuries and Disabilities**

UNHCR research also shows a large number of Syrian refugees with injuries. In 2013, 5 percent of health care consultations in Jordan and 1 percent in Lebanon were for injuries. In Jordan, 11 percent of those injuries were war-related. Some injuries may have caused a physical disability, which will need increased attention upon arrival in a resettlement country. With regard to disabilities, the UNHCR noted that one in 10 refugee households in Jordan have at least one family member who has a disability and that 41 percent of those with a disability are children.

#### **Sexual Violence**

Sexual violence and the threat of sexual violence was a concern for many women and girls in Syria before fleeing, if not one of the reasons for fleeing. Rape and other forms of violence affect women and girls as well as men and boys. It is often committed in detention facilities, in the context of household searches or military raids and checkpoints. Sexual violence is also a concern in asylum countries. According to the Cultural Orientation Resource Center, the fear of sexual violence in asylum countries from other refugees or host country nationals causes refugee women and girls to stay home, venturing outside only when accompanied by other family members. Delayed reporting and underreporting are common and, therefore, the magnitude and severity of the situation is unknown. While support, such as counselling, may be required, talking about the subject is often socially unacceptable, and women are unlikely to discuss the matter in front of male family members.

## Health Conditions Identified During the Immigration Medical Exam (IME) among Syrian Refugees Resettled to Canada

The IME is conducted prior to resettlement to Canada to screen and detect a limited set of medical conditions applicable to medical requirements. The purpose of the IME is to determine admissibility on the basis of public health/safety and demand on social/health services. It is a single health assessment at a specific point in time, and the data cannot be used to draw conclusions on the health status of a group of individuals nor be generalized to other refugees. Most conditions are not systematically assessed and data relies heavily on self-report. Many individuals may not have received treatment for – or even be aware of – a health condition. In addition, CIC might not be aware of conditions a refugee may have developed between the time of their medical assessment and their arrival in Canada. As well, certain conditions like mental health issues can arise several months after arrival in Canada.

Syrian refugees receive the same medical assessment as all other immigrant categories, which consists of a medical history, physical examination, age-specific laboratory tests and age-specific chest x-ray. Mandatory age-specific laboratory and radiologic tests include:

- 1. Urinalysis for clients over five years of age
- 2. Chest x-ray (posterior-anterior view) for clients over 11 years of age
- 3. Syphilis test for clients over 15 years of age
- 4. HIV test for clients over 15 years of age

The tables provided below describe aggregate health-related data on a specific group of Syrian refugees who underwent the IME prior to being resettled in Canada. CIC makes every effort to safeguard personal information while also complying with privacy legislation.

Of the Syrian refugees assessed overseas (total=1,439), a little over 16 percent had at least one health condition detected during the IME (see Table 1). Among them, 55 percent were male. The highest proportion of health conditions is found in those 65 years and older – 80 percent of people in that age group had at least one health condition.

The most prevalent health conditions detected during the IME were hypertension, diabetes, visual or hearing impairments and cardiovascular disease (see Table 2). Hypertension had the highest frequency and mostly affected Syrians between 25 and 65 years of age. In addition, the majority of those with a cardiovascular disease were aged 65 years and over. Other chronic health conditions detected among Syrians 45 years and over included diabetes, osteoarthritis and cancer.

Three main communicable diseases are screened during the IME: tuberculosis (TB), syphilis and HIV, with lower proportions of communicable diseases reported than non communicable diseases (or chronic health conditions) (see Table 2).

Although information on the severity of a disease is not systematically collected at the time of the IME, each of the health conditions presented here requires various levels of clinical management and follow-up care. However, certain health issues are worth noting due to their

impact on integration and settlement, either because they require access to specialized care or because they can affect daily living if not managed in a timely manner. These include those with mental health illnesses/mood disorders, vision and hearing impairments, dental conditions and intellectual deficiencies categories. Ten percent of the overall group were represented in this category.

### **Cultural Considerations**

### Food and Dietary Restrictions

Syrian food consists of a wide range of grains, meat and fruits and vegetables. Common dishes include pita and hummus (chickpea dip), baba ganoush (eggplant spread), mahshe (stuffed grape leaves, zucchini and bell peppers), shawarma (gyro), and salads such as tabouleh and fattoush. Lunch is usually the largest meal of the day, often eaten at 2:00 pm. Syrian Muslims have dietary restrictions that do not allow them to eat pork; additionally, some will not consume alcohol or eat shellfish.

### **Families**

As mentioned, the majority of resettled Syrian refugees who have arrived in Canada are family units consisting of a couple with three or more children. Families are quite extended in Syria; they include not only parents and children but also grandparents, aunts, uncles and cousins. It is

not uncommon for extended and immediate family members to live together in a single dwelling. In general, Syrian society is patriarchal, with the family under the authority of the oldest man.

### Religion

In Syria, devout Muslims pray five times a day, in private and at scheduled times. Syrian Muslims may fast during the lunar month of Ramadan, during which eating, drinking and smoking is prohibited from sunrise to sunset. At the end of Ramadan, Muslims celebrate Eid by feasting with family. Devout Christians wear crosses around their necks and attend church regularly. All Muslim and Christian holidays are official holidays in Syria.

### Health Care

Health care providers should consider religious and cultural beliefs when providing services. This includes practices such as providing long hospital gowns that cover the lower legs and same-sex health-care providers. This is especially important for women's reproductive health, as it would be more culturally appropriate for female gynecologists and nurses to provide care for Syrian refugee women.

### **Employment**

The Agency for Technical Cooperation and Development (ACTED) recently conducted a labour market analysis on Syrian refugees in Lebanon. ACTED's research provides other resettlement countries with a general idea of job opportunities and challenges for Syrian refugees.

This ACTED study determined that the majority of Syrians worked in the construction and agriculture sectors in Syria. The study found that 70 percent of the Syrian refugees interviewed were working in construction before leaving Syria and were able to find construction jobs in Lebanon. Research conducted by the International Labour Organization (ILO) in 2013 found that the occupational distribution among Syrian refugees residing in Lebanon included domestic/personal services such as driving or housekeeping (27 percent), agricultural activities (24 percent), and construction (12 percent). In addition, Syrians with previous jobs that require higher qualifications such as engineering, finance or education were either not employed or had found jobs in other sectors while living in Lebanon.

ACTED asked interviewees why they could not find employment. The responses varied but included a disability/injury or the reluctance of employers to hire Syrians. When asked which skills would help them find a job, or a better job, improved communication skills (including language, communication and computer skills) were mentioned the most.

### FORD COVE RECEIVES ICET FUNDING FOR HARBOUR REDEVELOPMENT

COURTENAY – Ford Cove is a busy harbour near the southern tip of Hornby Island. Originally built for commercial fishing vessels, the decline of fish stocks in the Salish Sea has shifted use of the harbour to both commercial and recreational boats, with recreational use growing each year. The demand for moorage during the summer months greatly exceeds capacity, and shoulder season traffic is on the rise.

The Ford Cove Harbour Authority, in collaboration with Hornby Island Community Economic Enhancement Corporation, has embarked upon a strategic plan to accommodate increased demand for recreational services, provide improved infrastructure for commercial users and encourage visitors to explore the island with additional transportation options.

"Ford Cove is a scenic and popular destination on Hornby Island," said Don McRae, Comox Valley MLA. "Increasing harbour capacity and amenities is vital to supporting the community's small businesses serving recreational boaters visiting the area. Through the Island Coastal Economic Trust, the Province is pleased to provide this beautiful community with the opportunity to grow and flourish."

Ford Cove's multi-year development project includes almost double the moorage capacity, better wave protection, upgrading the off-loading wharf, improved navigational aids and upland facilities. Phase 1 of this project will address improving wave attenuation and adding new transient moorage.

These marine tourism improvements support the Province of BC's "Gaining the Edge" strategy by developing world class visitor services and experiences on Hornby Island.

"Almost doubling the number of berths means that visiting yacht clubs and recreational groups will have the opportunity to disembark and explore the community," said ICET Chair Phil Kent. "This increased moorage will support peak season activity and boost shoulder season visitors. Combined with Hornby Island's Community Economic Enhancement Corporation's plan to increase transportation options for marine visitors these infrastructure upgrades will positively impact the sustainability of the local economy."

The Island Coastal Economic Trust is contributing \$300,000 to the \$1,065,068 Ford Cove Harbour Marina Expansion Project, with over \$500,000 coming from the Department of Fisheries and Oceans Small Craft Harbors and more than \$200,000 from Ford Cove Harbour Authority's equity.

"We are excited to get started with Phase 1 of the Ford Cove Harbour Marina Expansion project that will meet the needs of visiting boaters as well as support local business development," said Glen Hadden, Secretary/Treasurer, Ford Cove Harbour Authority. "By working together with our community we have a strong plan to grow long-term sustainability and this is a great first step toward achieving that vision."

The harbour redevelopment project will begin in 2016 with completion in early 2017.

**Subject:** Anticipated Property Assessment Changes in 2016

On behalf of the City of Burnaby, I am writing to express our serious concerns regarding the significant property assessment changes anticipated for 2016. Early notification to property owners whose properties have experienced an above average increase has not eased the minds of our citizens. The City of Burnaby Tax Office has received numerous calls from distressed property owners requesting that the City take action to mitigate the risk that they will have to pay considerably higher taxes in 2016.

By our calculations, the average increase in assessments for properties across Burnaby for 2016 will be approximately 12%. To address or respond to our citizens' concerns, the City has investigated options for mitigating the negative impacts of such a dramatic increase, but find ourselves limited by provisions in the Community Charter (Division 3, Section 197, 4, a). The City does not have the ability to vary rates within a Class, therefore those residential properties that have experienced an increase above the average will pay higher taxes in comparison to the average property. The City of Burnaby is committed to taking whatever action it can and challenges the Provincial Government to do the same.

The City of Burnaby calls upon the Provincial Government to address the negative repercussions of such a substantial assessment value increase by freezing property value assessments at 2014 levels. Further, the City of Burnaby requests that the Provincial Government consider amending/updating the Home Owner Grant program as many Burnaby homeowners will no longer qualify for the grant under the outdated program threshold.

The Province, led by the Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations (FLNR), is developing Implementation Plans for two priority species at risk on the coast of British Columbia: Northern Goshawks, *laingi* sub-species (NOGO) and Marbled Murrelets (MAMU). These Implementation Plans will represent a provincial government commitment that prioritizes management actions that are informed by science and also consider socioeconomic factors.

The intent of the Implementation Plans are to meet the Province's commitment for these species at risk under the Accord for the Protection of Species at Risk in Canada, and the Canada - British Columbia Agreement on Species at Risk. Implementation Plans are developed when existing management and protection does not meet species at risk recovery objectives and where meeting those recovery objectives may have significant socio-economic implications. Please refer to the attached information packages for more information regarding the development of Implementation Plans for NOGO and MAMU.

A portion of the proposed NOGO and MAMU conservation regions, where further management actions may occur, is located within your Regional District. Please see the maps in the information packages. As such, the Province would like to provide the opportunity for local governments within your Regional District to provide input into the proposed management approaches. The results of this engagement will play an important role in the development of the Implementation Plans.

As an efficient means to distribute this information to local governments we respectfully request you to distribute to the local governments within your Regional District as soon as possible. If this is not possible, please let us know so we can make alternate arrangements. Between January and February, 2016, engagement sessions will be held at several provincial government offices across coastal British Columbia (see Table 1 for locations and dates).

The Province will also be seeking input from First Nations, environmental organizations and the forest sector to provide an opportunity to discuss the details and implications of the proposed management approaches and provide a forum for asking questions and providing input.

Engagement sessions will include:

- Information on the proposed provincial management approach including:
  - proposed population and distribution objectives;
  - other proposed management actions; and
  - supporting rationales.
- Background information on NOGO and MAMU;
- A summary of the species recovery planning to date;
- Information on existing management and protection; and
- Useful links providing additional information.

Input received from the engagement sessions will inform recommendations for the Implementation Plans to be presented to Senior Government in May, 2016. It is expected that the plans will be finalized prior to the end of 2016. Once the Implementation Plans are finalized, statutory decisions will need to be made as a result of these plans. These decisions are expected to be made in 2017, and will be subject to formal consultation as directed by existing legislation and agreements.


NOGO and MAMU Information Packages



### **Background**






**Figure 1.** Conservation Region and Range map for Northern Goshawk, *Accipiter gentilis laingi* (Northern Goshawk *Accipiter gentilis laingi* Recovery Strategy 2008)

- Northern Goshawks, *laingi* sub-species (NOGO) are raven-sized raptors (birds of prey) that live in mature and old-growth forests in coastal B.C., including on Vancouver Island, Haida Gwaii and the mainland coast (Figure 1).
- A NOGO home range consists of a breeding area where they nest and rear young and a larger surrounding foraging area where they hunt for prey (Figure 2).
- NOGO are a species at risk and are listed as Threatened under the federal Species at Risk Act (SARA) (COSEWIC 2013), and are provincially Red listed. Their at-risk status is due mainly to their small population size and the loss and fragmentation of their nesting and foraging habitat.

### **Recovery Planning**


- The provincial NOGO recovery strategy was posted in 2008 and the Management Plan was posted in 2013.
- Several drafts of the federal NOGO recovery strategy have been released, but a final version has not yet been posted to the SARA public registry.
- The federal recovery strategy sets an overall population objective to maintain 444 NOGO home ranges across British Columbia and sets home range targets for the four Conservation Regions (see Table 1).
- The federal strategy identifies Critical Habitat for breeding and foraging habitat for 108 known home ranges without
  consideration of socio-economic implications, and implies additional Critical Habitat will be identified as new home
  ranges are discovered.
- Federal Critical Habitat for breeding areas is described as an approximately 200 hectare reserve, which includes all known nests at least 252 m away from (potential) edges.
- Federal Critical Habitat for foraging habitat is described as maintaining between 45% and 61% suitable foraging habitat within a home range (depending on the Conservation Region).
- Under SARA, the federal government expects the province to demonstrate effective protection of NOGO Critical Habitat.

### **Existing Protection**

- There are currently an estimated 680 780 potential Northern goshawk laingi subspecies home ranges in B.C.
- Although not all specific nesting locations are known, existing protection for NOGO in British Columbia (Figure 3) was
  determined by estimating the number of home ranges that are likely to be protected under the following
  circumstances: 1) in existing Parks and Protected Areas and other conservation designations and, 2) when existing land
  use planning is fully implemented (e.g. Landscape Reserves in the Great Bear Rainforest).
- A NOGO territory model developed by the provincial Northern Goshawk Recovery Team that projects theoretical home ranges consisting of both breeding and foraging habitat was overlaid with protected areas to estimate existing protection.

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### **Proposed Provincial Management Approach**

- The goals of the provincial management approach are to:
  - Maximize conservation benefit and likelihood of meeting recovery objectives;
  - Minimize socio-economic impacts; and
  - Maximize the likelihood of meeting SARA expectations

### **Population and Distribution Objectives**

- Table 1 shows the proposed provincial population and distribution objective for NOGO in British Columbia.
- With the exception of Haida Gwaii, the province is proposing to establish B.C. population and distribution targets that are largely consistent with the federal targets.
- In Haida Gwaii, the province considers the federal target of 58 home ranges to be unrealistic as it exceeds the estimated current number of 19 home ranges in the Conservation Region.

### **Breeding Area Management**

- The proposed B.C. management approach for breeding areas is to, by 2020, protect 95 new NOGO breeding areas around occupied nests:
  - 30 new breeding area Wildlife Habitat Areas in each of the North Coast, South Coast and Vancouver Island Conservation Regions, and 5 new breeding area reserves in Haida Gwaii (95 total).
- The proposed management approach for breeding areas is similar to the current provincial design standards for establishing NOGO wildlife habitat areas under the *Identified Wildlife Management Strategy* (McClaren E.L. 2004).
- Currently in Haida Gwaii, all newly discovered NOGO nests on Crown land receive a 200 ha breeding area reserve under the Haida Gwaii Land Use Objectives Order.
- Longer-term, options will be assessed regarding implementation of measures to achieve the proposed population and distribution objectives outlined in Table 1.

### **Foraging Habitat Management**

- The science to support foraging habitat management requires further investigation.
- NOGO home range size and foraging habitat requirements vary across the species range.
- Foraging habitat management requires maintaining a proportion of a home range in a suitable foraging condition to support NOGO prey species in order to provide adequate hunting opportunities to sustain local populations.
- Managing NOGO foraging habitat may have significant socio-economic implications.
- The proposed provincial approach is to facilitate additional research on NOGO foraging habitat requirements and, by 2020, develop provincial foraging habitat management recommendations.



### **Additional Proposed Actions in 2016**

- Develop research partnerships to investigate the genetic basis of NOGO sub-species designations and their range.
- Engage with private land holders to encourage shared stewardship of Northern Goshawks on non-Crown land, particularly in the Vancouver Island Conservation Region.

### Key work required to develop the Implementation Plan

 The proposed population objective and home range targets are less than the estimated number of home ranges that currently exist (approximately 730 home ranges coast wide). A key aspect of the Implementation Plan will be to determine which home ranges are protected.

### **Background**




Figure 1. Marbled Murrelet Conservation Regions in British Columbia

- Marbled Murrelets (*Brachyramphus marmoratus*) are small seabirds that typically nest in old-growth forests within 30km of the coast including on Vancouver Island, Haida Gwaii, and the mainland coast of B.C. (see figure 1).
- Marbled Murrelets (MAMU) are a species at risk listed as Threatened under the federal Species at Risk Act (SARA)
  (COSEWIC 2012) and are provincially Blue listed. Their at-risk status is due mainly to the loss and fragmentation of their old-growth nesting habitat and due to threats in the marine habitats where they feed (e.g. oil spills, fisheries by-catch).

### **Recovery Planning**

- In 2002, the Canadian Marbled Murrelet Recovery Team (CMMRT) released a conservation assessment of MAMU in B.C. (Burger A.E. 2002)
- In 2003, the CMMRT released a scientific advisory document regarding conservation and management of MAMU in B.C. (CMMRT 2003).
- Environment Canada posted a draft recovery strategy for MAMU in Canada on January 7, 2014 and a revised strategy on June 3, 2014. It is anticipated that the federal recovery strategy will be amended in the future.
- The federal recovery strategy will be differed in the rature.

   The federal recovery strategy sets a short term overall population objective that requires retention of MAMU nesting habitat at 70% or greater of 2002 levels coast-wide, and a long term objective to stabilize MAMU nesting habitat at 70% or greater of 2002 levels.
- The federal recovery strategy identifies potential terrestrial Critical Habitat that is described by biophysical attributes related to nesting habitat and is to be retained as minimum amounts within six Conservation Regions<sup>1</sup>. It is recognized these amounts are likely to change as better habitat mapping and other information becomes available.
- Critical Habitat is identified in federal recovery strategies without consideration of socio-economic implications.
- Under SARA, the federal government expects the province to demonstrate effective protection of MAMU Critical Habitat.

### **Existing Protection**

- Through various types of conservation designations (e.g., Parks and Protected Areas, Land Act Reserves, legal Old Growth Management Areas (OGMAs), Wildlife Habitat Areas and Ungulate Winter Ranges) B.C. has considerable protection of MAMU habitat already in place.
- Additional MAMU habitat will be maintained in B.C. when existing land use planning is fully implemented (e.g.
  Landscape Reserves in the Great Bear Rainforest and OGMA planning on the coast) and boundaries of reserves are
  legalized. The contribution of these future designations to MAMU habitat conservation is included in the existing
  protection in Figure 2.
- Figure 2 shows in six Conservation Regions: the amount (area in Hectares) of protected MAMU habitat in B.C.; the amount of MAMU habitat on Crown land that does not contribute to timber harvesting; the amount of MAMU habitat on Crown land that is part of the Timber Harvesting Land Base (THLB); and the federal minimum habitat threshold 1) applied to all lands and 2) applied to Crown land only.
- Figure 2 also shows the remaining THLB that is not considered suitable MAMU habitat in the six Conservation Regions.
- MAMU habitat in Figure 2 is represented by several methods of habitat mapping ranging from what is considered to be
  most accurate to least accurate: low-level aerial survey, air photo interpretation, CMMRT model and baseline thematic
  mapping.
- In most Conservation Regions, B.C. meets or comes close to meeting the federal minimum habitat threshold applied to
  provincial Crown land only through existing protection and MAMU habitat on Crown land that is not part of the Timber
  Harvesting Land Base (THLB).

• It is estimated that an additional 210,000 hectares of MAMU habitat would have to be protected in order to achieve the federal minimum habitat thresholds applied to provincial Crown land only.

### **Proposed Provincial Management Approach**

- The goals of the provincial management approach are to:
  - o Maximize conservation benefit and the likelihood of meeting recovery objectives;
  - o Minimize socio-economic impacts; and
  - Maximize the likelihood of achieving general expectations under SARA
- The proposed provincial management approach for MAMU is to:
  - Engage with First Nations and stakeholders on the development of a habitat management approach for MAMU that meets the expectations of the federal recovery strategy for provincial Crown land.
  - Complete existing land use planning, including implementing legal landscape reserves in the Great Bear
     Rainforest and legalization of Old Growth Management Areas and priority Wildlife Habitat Areas on the coast.
  - o By 2017, issue a Land Use Objectives Regulation Order under the provincial *Land Act* to protect specified amounts of MAMU habitat in a suitable condition for Crown land for the six Conservation Regions (see Table 1).
  - o Employ both spatial and aspatial management approaches.

### **Population and Distribution Objectives**

- Minimum habitat thresholds for each Conservation Region have been calculated using the methodology in the federal recovery strategy and applied proportionately to all lands and to provincial Crown land only (Table 1).
- Table 1 shows the federal minimum habitat thresholds for MAMU on all lands and applied only to Crown land. These amounts are likely to change as better habitat mapping and other information becomes available.
- The difference between the threshold for all land and for crown land only is due to MAMU habitat on non-crown land (First Nations treaty lands, other government lands and private lands).
- In the East Vancouver Island Conservation Region, the province considers the minimum habitat threshold to be unachievable in the short term due to habitat loss.



### **Additional Proposed Actions in 2016**

- Improve habitat mapping in areas where MAMU habitat is characterized using the CMMRT model or baseline thematic mapping. This will affect total habitat amounts, the location of habitat and regional minimum habitat thresholds.
- Conduct inventories to confirm MAMU nesting in the Interior Cedar Hemlock (ICH) biogeoclimatic zone in the Northern Mainland Coast Conservation Region.
- Engage with private land holders to encourage shared stewardship of Marbled Murrelet habitat on non-Crown land, particularly in the East Vancouver Island Conservation Region.

### Key work required to develop the Implementation Plan

- Collate results of First Nations and stakeholder engagement sessions to inform the provincial management approaches.
- Clarify to what extent, and at what scale, mapped spatial reserves will be defined in the Implementation Plan.
- Determine how to manage and track habitat targets that apply across large areas (such as a resource district or Conservation Region).
- Clarify how recruitment of MAMU habitat will contribute to meeting long-term recovery objectives, especially in the East Vancouver Island Conservation Region.

- **Nuttall's Cottontail** *nuttallii* **subspecies** (Special Concern) a rabbit found in the Okanagan and Similkameen valleys of south-central B.C.
- Sonora Skipper (Special Concern) a butterfly found in the southern interior of B.C.
- **Spotted Bat** (Special Concern) a bat found in the Fraser valley and the central and southern interior of B.C.
- Vancouver Island Beggarticks (Special Concern) a plant found in the lower Fraser valley, southern Vancouver Island, and possibly the central coast of B.C.
- Warty Jumping-slug (Special Concern) a slug found on southern Vancouver Island.

Re: Trans Mountain Expansion Project – December 2015 Update

We would like to provide you with an update on key events, recent changes in the schedule and next steps for the proposed Trans Mountain Expansion Project (TMEP).

#### **NEB UPDATED REGULATORY SCHEDULE**

On December 16, 2013 Trans Mountain applied to the National Energy Board (NEB) to expand the existing Trans Mountain Pipeline system. The Application, if approved, would increase the pipeline's capacity from 300,000 barrels a day to 890,000 barrels per day. As part of the regulatory review, Trans Mountain and participants in the review process have provided information to the NEB and exchanged information through several rounds of information requests (some 18,000 questions), motions, evidence and responses, technical reports and consultation updates. On December 17, 2015 we will present our Final Argument marking two years almost to the day from our initial Application submission.

On September 24, 2015, the NEB issued a revised procedural schedule for reviewing the TMEP Application. Previously, the NEB had scheduled dates to hear oral summary arguments from Intervenors in September 2015. Those hearing dates have now been delayed until January and February, 2016. In addition, the NEB has revised the date for issuing its recommendation to the Governor in Council (i.e., the Federal Cabinet) on the proposed Project, moving it from January 25, 2016 to May 20, 2016.

Following the receipt of the NEB recommendation, the Federal Cabinet has up to three months to consider the NEB's report and decide whether or not to direct the NEB to issue a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity (CPCN). A CPCN is the principal approval required by Trans Mountain to proceed with the proposed Project, though other ancillary approvals are also required before construction could begin (including detailed routing and confirmation of condition compliance).

Key dates in the current regulatory schedule as set out by NEB include:

- January 19 to 29, 2016 Intervenors to present Oral Summary Arguments in Burnaby
- February 2 to 5, 2016 Intervenors to present Oral Summary Arguments in Calgary



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- May 20, 2016 (or before) NEB will deliver its recommendation to the Governor in Council
- August 2016 (or before) Decision due from Governor in Council (CPCN)

Details of the revised hearing schedule can be found on the NEB website at: transmountain.com/NEB-hearing-schedule.

Should TMEP be approved, Trans Mountain proposes to commence construction in Q2/Q3 2017, with an in-service date between late 2018 and October 2019. As part of TMEP, Trans Mountain has also sought approval under NEB Section 58 for early works (e.g. site preparation). If approved by the NEB, these early works (pre-construction) activities could commence as early as fall 2016.

#### INPUT REFLECTED IN TMEP

Open, extensive and thorough engagement along the proposed pipeline and marine corridors has been, and will continue to be, an important part of the proposed expansion project. Since our team began our discussions with Aboriginal groups, Landowners, communities and those interested in the proposed Project, we have held over 159 open houses and workshops along the proposed pipeline and marine corridors; and this has involved more than 24,000 points of engagement. Based on information gathered through our engagement activities, we have improved and optimized planning and mitigation measures for the proposed Project to address concerns, wherever feasible.

The input and feedback we have gathered has created a stronger, safer and more responsive Project. The following are some of the examples of how we have optimized the proposed Project as a result of stakeholder feedback:

- A proposed increase in isolation valves on the pipeline, from 94 to 126; resulting in a significant reduction of potential spill volumes
- An increase in pipeline wall thickness in high consequence areas, such as urban locations and at river crossings
- Routing of the pipeline to avoid 22 river crossings at significant fish bearing rivers such as the Fraser River, upper North Thompson, Albreda, Coldwater and Coquihalla River
- · Routing to avoid environmentally sensitive areas such as Cheam Wetlands
- Burnaby Mountain tunnel route option to avoid adjacent neighbourhoods and minimize community impact
- Following our public consultations and open houses in late 2012 the environmental socioeconomic assessment for marine shipping was extended beyond Burrard Inlet to the 12 nautical mile limit off the west coast.
- As result of engagement with the marine industry, additional measures were proposed by Trans Mountain that will further improve marine safety through accident prevention and reduction of consequences in the unlikely event one should occur. These recommendations include:
  - Laden tanker tug escort will be expanded to cover the entire tanker shipping route, and
  - Marine pilot disembarkation will take place near Race Rocks and not at Victoria (pilots have already initiated training to disembark by helicopter).



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- A Review of Marine Vessel Traffic Activities in Burrard Inlet, has resulted in new engagement
  with the recreational boating community on navigational safety. This will include support for the
  Safe Boating in Deep Sea Shipping Navigation Areas which is an awareness program led by
  Pacific Pilotage Authority to provide safety tips to smaller vessels operating near large deep
  sea shipping vessels.
- As a result of the Trans Mountain Expansion Project there will be \$100 million invested in WCMRC for spill response enhancement along the tanker route. This investment will result in double the mandated response capacity, half the response time of Federal planning standards for the southern BC shipping route, the addition of five new response bases and up to 100 new jobs to be created.

#### **NEXT STEPS**

We know as elected officials, you continue to have questions and are seeking specific information about how the proposed Project will affect your communities. We will continue to engage with you as well as your constituency stakeholders so they can obtain information directly from us. As we have additional information to share we will provide it through a variety of methods such as online, in-person, and through digital channels.

Engagement topics in the coming year could include:

- Tanker traffic increase and navigational safety
- Emergency Management Program enhancement for pipeline system (including Westridge Marine Terminal) and Western Canada Marine Response Corporation plans to enhance spill response program for BC's south coast.

We greatly value the relationships we have developed in communities over the past 60 years of Trans Mountain Pipeline operations and we endeavour to further strengthen those relationships going forward. # **West Coast of Vancouver Island - Nuu-chah-nulth Territory Information for community members**

### At a Glance

Ocean Networks Canada operates the world-leading NEPTUNE observatory located off the West Coast of Vancouver Island, British Columbia within Nuu-chah-nulth Territory. The subsea infrastructure, an 812 km loop of fibre optic cable connected to instruments, enables scientists to access continuous long-term, high resolution ocean observations not afforded by traditional ship-based methods. Ocean Networks Canada has a new proposed small scale Community Observatory with ocean monitoring equipment for the Alberni Inlet. All data collected are currently, and will continue to be, freely-available over the Internet. Community input is welcome at all stages of the project and opportunities for collaborative education and science programs will be fostered. Further information is provided in the remainder of this document.

### **Background**

Ocean Networks Canada (ONC), an initiative of the University of Victoria, develops, operates, and maintains cabled ocean observatory systems. The world-leading NEPTUNE and VENUS cabled observatories supply continuous power and Internet connectivity to a broad suite of subsea instruments from the coast to the deep sea, supporting research on complex ocean and earth processes.

By co-locating instruments of different types on the NEPTUNE observatory, researchers can study interactions among geological, chemical, physical, and biological processes that drive earth and ocean systems. The shore station at Port Alberni on Vancouver Island sends the collected data via fibre optic cable to the University of Victoria. The collection of data began in 2009 and now, over 190 instruments on the NEPTUNE observatory are sending real-time data over the Internet.

Building on the successful technology and data delivery of the NEPTUNE and VENUS (Salish Sea) observatories, ONC is proposing the installation of five community observatories along the coast of British Columbia. As coastal communities face a wide range of rapid environmental changes, real-time data from cabled observatories can be used by community members when making informed decisions about their coastal and marine resources.

After further discussions with key stakeholders, community members, municipal leaders, and decision-makers within the Nuu-chah-nulth Nations, ONC proposes to design, provide, install, and maintain these scientific instruments. Currently, ONC is in the planning phase for developing a Community Observatory in the Alberni Inlet and hopes to install the instrumentation in spring 2016 with community support, subject to funding and permit approvals.

The proposed equipment will support applications in several areas:

- **Marine safety:** by monitoring and providing information to support assessments of sea state, ship tracking, and incident response.
- **Public safety:** through natural hazard research in the areas of earthquake ground-shaking, underwater landslides and near-field tsunamis.
- **Environmental monitoring:** by building a baseline of environmental parameters and being able to continuously monitor changing conditions.
- Science-based decision-making: by enabling the use of observatory data to support decision-making.
- **Education and outreach:** by providing students, teachers and community members access to locally relevant data and support in analyzing and utilizing the data.

### **Project Locations**

Sites are being proposed for long-term deployment of observatories in five regional areas:

- 1. Prince Rupert Ts'msyen Territory
- 2. Douglas Channel Ts'msyen Territory
- 3. Kitamaat Village Haisla Territory
- 4. Campbell River Kwakwaka'wakw / Coast Salish Territory
- 5. West Coast of Vancouver Island Nuu-chah-nulth Territory

### Existing Instrumentation on the West Coast of Vancouver Island — Nuu-chah-nulth Territory

NEPTUNE subsea infrastructure spans diverse environments with six main nodes:

- **Folger Passage** depths: 23-100 m located on the continental shelf; examining ocean-land interactions, coastal processes, plankton, fish, marine mammals and other organisms.
- **Clayoquot Slope** depth: 1250 m located on the continental slope; examining gas hydrates, seafloor fluids and gases, Cascadia margin, earthquakes, deep-sea organisms.
- **Middle Valley** Node not yet instrumented depth: 2400 m located on the seismically active area on the northern end of the Juan de Fuca ridge; will examine plate tectonics, seismicity, hydrothermal vent systems and ecosystems, mid-ocean ridges.
- **Endeavour** depth: 2200-2400 m located at the mid-ocean ridge; examining plate tectonics, seismicity, volcanism, flow over rough topography, plume dynamics, hydrothermal vent systems, and ecosystems.
- **Cascadia Basin** depth: 2660 m located on the abyssal plain; examining ocean crust, hydrology, geochemistry, tsunamis, abyssal plain, benthic ecosystems.
- **Barkley Canyon** depth: 400-985 m located at the shelf/slope break and submarine canyon; examining gas hydrates, sediment dynamics, upwelling, plankton, productivity.

Although there is currently no known means to reliably predict earthquakes, ONC's sensor technology is advanced enough to rapidly detect an earthquake as it begins to happen. ONC is currently researching technology which could be used in the future to send alerts to appropriate organizations in surrounding areas before the shaking hits. This is called earthquake early warning and ONC has recently installed earthquake sensors in the communities of Zeballos, Kyuquot, Tahsis, Woss Lake and Port Alice.

ONC has installed an experimental high-frequency ocean monitoring system at the Tofino airport which is being tested for its potential to contribute to real-time tsunami detection. Information from this system will augment the data from bottom pressure sensors already in place off the coast on the NEPTUNE observatory. In addition to the potential for the system to detect an incoming near field tsunami, it can also measure *sea state* using surface currents, ocean waves and wind speed, which is important information for improving day-to-day safety of small vessel operators, coastal visitors and community members.

### New Proposed Instrumentation for the West Coast of Vancouver Island – Nuu-chahnulth Territory: A Community Observatory

The number and size of vessels in Alberni Inlet may increase in the coming years if proposed development projects proceed. It is important to have a baseline of the local marine environment before additional development begins. The publicly available scientific data from ONC observatories will contribute to the assessment of any long term, cumulative, and accident-related impacts.

ONC proposes to install a Community Observatory in Alberni Inlet.

This observatory would be equipped with a shore camera and weather station, which will be connected to an on shore component. The on shore component would be cabled to subsurface instruments that track and record local water quality, the underwater sound of the marine environment including vessels, and live-stream video from an underwater camera. In addition, depending on location suitability and funding allocation an Automatic Identification System (AIS) antenna could be installed to track the movement of large vessels in the area. Potential locations for the community observatory include the Centennial Pier, the harbour area, or near Canal Beach Park cabled to the existing NEPTUNE observatory, or another feasible location that is equipped with power and Internet. The final location will be selected with input from community members and stakeholders, and subject to engineering feasibility.

#### **Onshore instruments:**

• Shore camera, AIS, weather station, earthquake sensor (seismometer).

#### **Underwater instruments:**

 Underwater camera, hydrophone, water quality sensors to measure: temperature, conductivity (salinity), depth, oxygen concentration, chlorophyll-A (a proxy for phytoplankton abundance), turbidity (how murky the water is).

The projected duration of the operation and maintenance of the systems are 20 years or more. Once the instruments are operational, real-time and archived data will be made freely available over the Internet for the lifetime of the equipment. These data can provide independent and unbiased observations of changes to the West Coast marine ecosystem, while offering the community a new window into their local marine resources.

### **Indigenous Community Engagement**

A community engagement and education plan will be developed through a collaborative process involving the creation of working groups, face-to-face meetings, and workshops held in each of the regional areas. Community involvement is critical at all stages of the project, including planning deployment locations, development of educational programs, and long-term planning. It is essential that the data being collected by ONC instruments is relevant to community members and can contribute to priorities identified within the community.

### **Educational Opportunities**

- Local Observations. Global Connections: Ocean Sense is an educational program based on students analyzing, understanding and sharing ocean data collected by their local community observatory.
- Educators and students will be invited to participate in the Ocean Sense program which links their community to other coastal communities through a web portal, video conferencing, face to face events, and social media tools.
- Other formal and informal educational materials and programs can be developed depending on community interests and needs.

### **Indigenous Knowledge**

ONC would like to incorporate relevant Indigenous knowledge into the Ocean Sense program through a collaborative process with the guidance and oversight of Indigenous community educators from the five regional areas. With the advice from community knowledge holders, Indigenous knowledge and language will be included into materials for educators and students, and where appropriate, shared with other communities in online materials and resources.

### Community Observatories — What can they do?



Community observatories provide essential information to assess the local marine conditions. The instruments on the community observatory collect scientific data which are available for anyone to download over the Internet.

### **Underwater Equipment**



#### Video camera

Video is recorded and streamed live to the Internet. Can be used to monitor sea life, examine the sea bottom, and monitor turbidity (cloudiness).



### **Hydrophone**

Underwater sound is recorded and streamed live to the Internet. Can be used to study marine mammals, monitor vessels, and detect earthquakes and landslides.



### Water quality monitor

Used to monitor basic ocean conditions. Measures: temperature, conductivity (salinity), depth, oxygen concentration, chlorophyll-A (a proxy for phytoplankton abundance), turbidity (how murky the water is).

### **Above-Water Equipment**



#### **Weather station**

Used to monitor basic weather conditions. Measures air temperature, wind speed and direction, relative humidity, barometric pressure, and solar radiation.



#### Shore camera

Time-lapse video is recorded and streamed to the Internet. Can be used to monitor weather conditions and vessel traffic.



Depending on a ship's voyage route, size, and cargo, large vessels are often required to be fitted with an AIS transmitter which broadcast identification, position, course and speed. Some community observatories may include this antenna to track and record the routes and volume of vessel traffic in the local area. This is useful to understand the volume of vessel traffic over time and can also be instrumental in search and rescue operations.



### **Seismometers**

Used to record and measure the intensity of seismic events. When combined with arrays of multiple seismometers separated by tens of kilometers, or across the province, it can help scientists better determine the nature, effects, and location of earthquakes.



### **WERA High Frequency Radar**

This experimental instrument is installed at the Tofino-Long Beach Airport, and is used to measure properties of the surface waves of the water. The information on surface currents and wave height could be useful for boaters, coastal visitors, search and rescue, and agencies with mandates for marine and public safety. It is currently being tested to determine if information about ocean surface currents and wave height can be used for tsunami detection.

Other specialized equipment can be added for specific sites as needed.

On June 15, 2015, the Honourable Mary Polak, Minister of Environment, announced that British Columbia will be creating a world class spill response regime to address a wide range of potential land and marine-based spills. We intend to build that new regime collaboratively with First Nations, communities, local governments, industry and other regulators.

I am sending this letter to provide you with an update on the regime progress and notice of our upcoming engagement efforts. We will be engaging a broad range of First Nations, industry organizations, communities, stakeholders and regulators on a new report which will set out the details of our proposed new spill response regime.

I encourage your organization to provide detailed comments on the new report through our online information portal on the ministry's Land Based Spill Preparedness and Response in British Columbia website at <a href="www.gov.bc.ca/spillresponse">www.gov.bc.ca/spillresponse</a>. From this webpage, you can subscribe to receive updates which will notify you when new content is posted, including the new report. As noted, we anticipate the new report being available mid-January 2016 and we will provide you with another notice just prior the commencement of our formal engagement.

In the meantime, we invite you to review the previously published intentions papers and the results of a past Spill Response Symposium posted on the portal.

### **Summary:**

Staff issued a call for tenders for the LBA Lighting Project which closed at 2:00 pm on Monday, December 7<sup>th</sup>, 2015. Four compliant tenders were submitted. A fifth tender was submitted but arrived after the closing deadline. A total of five submissions were received and reviewed by Tetra Tech EBA. Four submissions were deemed compliant by Tetra Tech, while the Houle Electric Ltd.'s submission arrived after the 2:00 pm deadline on December 7, 2015, and was not considered due to noncompliance.

There is a very minor difference in the submitted versus the correct price from Raylec Power LP (Raylec) which is likely due to rounding errors. During completion of the final contract documents, these mathematical errors will be clarified, corrected and agreed to, in advance of contract execution.

Raylec's submitted tender price is lower than the Engineer's Estimate by approximately 6%.

Tetra Tech has experience working with Raylec, and is currently working on a project at Victoria

International Airport for which they are the contractor. The work they are doing there has been satisfactory and they have completed similar airports projects in the past.

### **Background:**

In June of 2015, staff submitted an application for funding to the BC Air Access Program. The funding application was successful and the ACRD will receive a maximum of \$1,273,140 or 75% of total eligible project costs, whichever is less, towards the Long Beach Airport Runway Lighting project.

### <u>Time Requirements – Staff & Elected Officials:</u>

There will be modest time requirements for Administration staff to complete this project. Airport staff will require a high level of attention to manage the process.

### Financial:

The BC Air Access Program (BCAAP) provided the ACRD a grant of 75% of to a maximum of 1.7 million for the Long Beach Airport lighting project. The combined cost of the successful tender and the engineering fees total \$1,550,860.58 and would provide the Long Beach Airport the 75% grant of \$1,163,145.44 and the Long Beach Airport Capital reserve would require \$387,715.15 to complete this project. Based on these costs the project will be under budget.

Staff has been advised that there will be an ability to submit interim funding requests as the project is being completed. The ability to submit in the interim provides a reduced in the expected interest costs.

### 1.0 INTRODUCTION

Quotations were solicited from contractors to provide general contracting services for the Long Beach (Tofino) Airport Lighting Project, on behalf of the Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District (ACRD). The tender period was from November 23, 2015 to 2:00 pm, December 7, 2015. This letter presents a review of the tender submissions received; a summary of our findings; and, a recommendation for award based on these findings.

### 2.0 TENDERS RECEIVED

A total of five submissions were received by the ACRD and reviewed by Tetra Tech EBA Inc. (Tetra Tech). Four submissions were deemed compliant by Tetra Tech, while the Houle Electric Ltd. submission arrived after the 2:00 p.m. deadline on December 7, 2015 and was not considered due to non-compliance.

There is a very minor difference in the submitted versus the corrected price from Raylec Power LP (Raylec), which is likely due to rounding errors. During completion of the final contract documents, these mathematical errors will need to be clarified, corrected, and agreed to in advance of contract execution.



Raylec's submitted price compared to the corrected price is as follows:

Raylec's submitted tender price is lower than the Engineer's Estimate by approximately 6%.

# 3.0 LOW BIDDER EVALUATION - RAYLEC POWER LP

Raylec Power LP (Raylec) submitted the lowest compliant bid on this tender call. They included all of the mandatory documentation and bonding instruments to satisfy this tender requirements.

The mathematical errors in the tender submission are likely due to rounding errors, and we recommend that the calculated unit rates for each line item be reviewed and confirmed with Raylec prior to the execution of the final contract documents.

Tetra Tech has experience working with Raylec, and are currently working on a project at Victoria International Airport for which they are contractor. The work they are doing there has been satisfactory, and they have completed similar airport projects in the past. We are unaware of any quality of work or legal issues associated with Raylec at this time.

# 4.0 DISCUSSION ON LATE SUBMISSION FROM HOULE ELECTRIC LTD.

During review of the Houle Electric Ltd. tender submission it was determined that they submitted their printed copy in person to the ACRD office at 2:15 p.m. on December 7, 2015. They did submit the tender via fax at 1:59 p.m. and sent an emailed copy to a Tetra Tech office at 1:45 p.m.; however, the tender instructions clearly state that only revisions will be accepted via fax, and not tender packages. The Houle Electric Ltd. tender package was, therefore, not compliant with the tender instructions.

### 5.0 SUMMARY

Tetra Tech recommends the Tender provided by Raylec Power LP be accepted for completion of the Long Beach (Tofino) Airport Lighting Project, and that the contract be awarded for a total value of \$1,479,870.60 (including GST).

#### **Recommendation:**

THAT the ACRD Board of Directors enter into a three year agreement with the City of Port Alberni in the amount of \$20,000 per year for the City to develop and maintain a Comprehensive Reception Centre Management Plan for the Alberni Valley.

### **Desired Outcome:**

To secure the services of the City of Port Alberni to develop and maintain Reception Centre resources throughout the Alberni Valley.

### Background:

At the November 25<sup>th</sup> Board of Directors meeting the attached report was deferred and staff were requested to bring back further information on the proposed agreement with the City of Port Alberni to develop and maintain a comprehensive reception centre management plan for the Alberni Valley.

The following is from the provinces guidebook with respect to the ESS program:

Under the Emergency Program Act, local authorities in BC, including regional districts, are legislated to be responsible for planning and managing emergency response operations within their jurisdiction.

An ESS Director, either volunteer or local authority staff, is appointed by the local Emergency Program Coordinator (EPC) to manage ESS in each community.

It is the role of the Emergency Services Coordinator to appoint the director of the ESS program. There is no expectation in the contract for services with Dan Holder that he perform the function of Director. For the last four years the ACRD through the current and past coordinator has attempted to support and build capacity in the ESS, without success. These challenges are not uncommon for other jurisdictions.

Electoral Areas "A" (Bamfield), "B" (Beaufort), "C" (Long Beach), "D" (Sproat Lake), "E" (Beaver Creek) and "F" (Cherry Creek)

ESS and reception centre support has been a budgeted item (\$30,000) for the last two years - commencing in 2014. Mr. Holder has been instrumental in putting these resources into place.

There are three levels of ESS Response.

Level one is a small localized event, for instance structure fires where there is immediate need for shelter, clothing and food. It may impact one or two households and up to 12 people. No EOC is established, first responders help to connect those in need with ESS volunteers who process and support. Generally three days of service is funded by the province. The ACRD has contracted the Red Cross to provide level one service and support capacity for subsequent levels. The advantage of the Red Cross is their organization may support those affected beyond the 3 days, with a seamless transition.

Level two is a significant event such as an apartment fire affecting more than 12 people. A reception centre is established and an EOC may be activated. It is proposed that the CPA build the capacity for reception centre operations through the use of volunteers (including Red Cross) and the City and ACRD employees. Reception centres may include city facilities and appropriate community buildings throughout the Alberni Valley.

Level three are major events typical of mass flooding, wild fires or earthquakes. An EOC is established and reception centres are required for evacuations. Again, the contract with the City is critical to have these resources and procedures in place and the Red Cross volunteers among others will be part of the plan.

The proposal is to complement the Red Cross service with a contract for the CPA to provide reception centre planning and support. There are other options for the ACRD, if the directors wish those to be explored further. However, the proposal to contract with the CPA recognizes they are partners in the ACRD service and will provide facility capacity in the event of a major event. The service that the City performs will build capacity across the Alberni Valley and will help coordinate and support the role of local community centres and other places of gathering.

### **Recommendation:**

THAT the ACRD Board of Directors enter into a three year agreement with the City of Port Alberni in the amount of \$20,000 per year for the City to develop and maintain a Comprehensive Reception Centre Management Plan for the Alberni Valley.

### **Desired Outcome:**

To secure the services of the City of Port Alberni to develop and maintain Reception Centre resources throughout the Alberni Valley.

### **Background:**

Under the Emergency Program Act, regional districts are responsible for responding to emergencies, including providing emergency social services (ESS). ESS programs often depend on volunteers who provide the following services to communities: identify locations for reception centres and group lodging; recruiting other volunteers; working with local businesses, service organizations and government agencies; housing and feeding people forced from their homes; providing services to people who are unable to leave their homes and supporting other emergency responders.

The ACRD has entered in to a one year agreement with the Canadian Red Cross Society to recruit and train local volunteers for the basic ESS program in the Alberni Valley. They will cover all small events requiring support services for those relocated. The next step in developing the program is to identify facilities in the Alberni Valley that may be used for reception centre functions in the event of a medium to large scale disaster. This includes the development and maintenance of a record of identified facilities with contacts and potential uses in the event of a disaster and the training of volunteers and staff to operate such facilities.

The Red Cross and City proposals are complimentary, they do not conflict.

### <u>Time Requirements – Staff & Elected Officials:</u>

Oversight of the contract will be the responsibility of the Emergency Program Coordinator – Dan Holder.

### **Financial:**

Funds coming from the Alberni Valley Emergency Planning annual budget. A total of \$30,000 was allocated in the 2015 budget and this covers the costs for both the Red Cross and City contracts.



### **Background:**

A revenue anticipation borrowing bylaw is created each January to ensure that the Regional District has authority to borrow money for expenditures that must be made before the related revenues are received. In essence, this bylaw is a tool for managing cash flow and is created annually whether it is believed to be required or not. Once received, the revenues are used to cancel the debt. The Regional District did utilize the overdraft in June and July of 2015 and the interest was \$193.44, but did not in 2014. It is not known at this time whether borrowing will be needed in 2016.

This bylaw is required by the Regional District's Bank as well as the Municipal Finance Authority.

### <u>Time Requirements – Staff & Elected Officials:</u>

Minimal.

### Financial:

If overdraft or temporary borrowing are used then interest charges will be applied, otherwise there are no financial implications.

Section 821 of the Local Government Act provides the authority for revenue anticipation borrowing.

# Bylaw F1124

# A BYLAW TO PROVIDE FOR THE BORROWING OF MONEY IN ANTICIPATION OF REVENUE FOR THE YEAR 2016

**WHEREAS** the Regional District does not have sufficient money on hand to meet the current lawful expenditures of the Regional District;

**AND WHEREAS** it is provided by Section 821 of the Local Government Act that the Regional Board may, without the assent of the electors or the approval of the Inspector of Municipalities, provide for the borrowing of such sums of the money as may be necessary to meet the current lawful expenditures of the Regional District;

AND WHEREAS there are no liabilities outstanding under Section 821;

**NOW THEREFORE** the Regional Board of the Regional District of Alberni-Clayoquot, in open meeting assembled, enacts as follows:

- 1. The Regional Board shall be and is hereby empowered and authorized to borrow upon the credit of the Regional District an amount or amounts not exceeding the sum of \$2.0 million dollars (\$2,000,000.00).
- 2. The form of obligation to be given as acknowledgment of the liability shall be a promissory note or notes bearing the corporate seal and signed by the Chairperson and the Financial Administration Officer.
- 3. All anticipated revenue of the current year or so much thereof as may be necessary shall, when collected, be used to repay the money so borrowed.
- 4. This Bylaw may be cited as "Revenue Anticipation Borrowing Bylaw No. F1124, 2016".

A Public Hearing for Bylaws P1331 and P1332 was held on Thursday, December 17<sup>st</sup>, 2015 in the Board Room at the Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District office. The hearing was chaired by Penny Cote, Director for Sproat Lake, and attended by ACRD planning staff members Mike Irg and Heather Adair, applicants/property owner Elmer Daneliuk, agent Helen Sims, and two members of the public.

No written submissions from the public were received. Referral agency comments were received from Island Health, Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure (MoTI), Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations (FLNR), and the Alberni Clayoquot Regional District building inspector.

Biologist from FLNR recommended that detailed bio-inventory be undertaken by an appropriately qualified professional with the report including specific short and long term direction to the landowner to avoid impacts to the ecology and wildlife use patterns on the subject property. The biologist also recommended a single dock to service the four properties so that impacts are minimized and indicated that permission for a dock must be attained by the owner of the lakebed (the Crown). The biologist also recommended that landowner involve a certified arborist to identify any hazard trees.

The ACRD building inspector indicated "Interest Unaffected by Bylaw". MoTI indicated that "approval recommended, but not to be construed as subdivision approval". FLNR Land Officer indicated "there is a need for a Crown land authorization prior to the construction of a common dock". Island Health indicated "the applicants need to confirm the soil capability for on-site sewage disposal meets Island Health's Subdivision Standards, concern regarding slopes >30%, no test pits were made, and soils conditions are only known at the observed [exposed] locations".

Copies of all documents were available at the hearing and are attached to the minutes of the hearing.

- 4. Director Cote explains the purpose of the public hearing and asks staff to read out any correspondence received ahead of the public hearing.
- 5. M. Irg states that no letters were received from members of the public and that agency referral comments (Appendix 'A'), including a three separate correspondence from the Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations (FLNR), referral response from Luc Stefani, Building Inspector from the Alberni Clayoquot Regional District, referral response from Anika Johal, Development Technician from the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure (MoTI), referral response from Jade Yehia, Environment Consultant from Island Health, and a referral response from Glenn Gibson, Environmental Health Officer from Island Health with printed copies available.
- 6. Director Cote asks the applicants if they would like to speak to their proposal.
- 7. H. Sims (consultant) described the rezoning application to allow for a four lot subdivision with one seasonal residence per lot. Access to the area is by water only. Site has been inspected by an Engineer and a Biologist. The Biologist recommended that the 15m riparian area be protected with no vegetation removal with the exception of an access path to the water that would be used by all lot owners. H. Sims indicated that the Engineer and Biologist both updated their reports after the Dog Mountain fire in the summer of 2015. H. Sims indicated that both reports stated that the site was safe for the intended use, and that the Biologist report indicated that there may be additional danger trees that need to be removed post fire.
- 8. M. Irg indicated that Tom Millard from the Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations didn't have additional concerns post Dog Mountain Fire.
- 9. Director Cote asked for an explanation regarding the four lot layout and why the applicants had not considered a cluster.
- 10. H. Sims explained that the applicant had wanted four lots that all had close access to the water. H. Sims explained that another option would be to consider strata but they would rather avoid strata.
- 11. E. Daneliuk indicated that all lot owners will want access to the water, and that another option would be take make shorter lots, with a fifth lot in the back that would have a narrow access down to the lake.
- 12. Director Cote asked if this property will ever have road access.
- 13. E. Daneliuk indicated that there are forestry roads that are close by, not currently connected, but could be in the future.
- 14. Director Cote asked about the plan to have one shared dock and had they considered having one dock per lot instead.
- 15. H. Sims stated that they are agreeable to consider changes to the dock configuration and indicated that any changes would require a new Biologist report.

We are in receipt of the above rezoning proposal for a property known as Lot 364, Clayoquot District, to accommodate a proposed four lot subdivision of an 8.8 Ha parcel on the Two Rivers Arm of Sproat Lake. A short environmental report was prepared by Toth and Associates Environmental Services in June 2015, and subsequently updated in September, 2015 following a wildfire at Dog Mountain, which has apparently affected this property. The original report identified generalized concerns related to potential development impacts to the shoreline and watercourse setbacks as identified in the ACRD Sproat Lake Official Community Plan. The Toth report did not provide a fulsome site description of this large, complex property as has been recommended by *Develop with Care: Environmental Guidelines for Urban and Rural Development in British Columbia* and the Terms of Reference for a Detailed Bio-Inventory found in Appendix B of that document. In consideration of the potential for wildlife and plant species and red-listed biogeoclimatic ecosystem variants on this remote forested parcel and, consistent with *Develop with Care* we recommend that a detailed bio-inventory be undertaken by an appropriately qualified professional, with experience in identifying and describing fish, wildlife and ecosystem features on the parcel. The report should include specific short and long term direction to the landowner to avoid impacts to the ecology and wildlife use patterns on the subject property.

Lakeshore development typically results in the proliferation of docks and wharves such as has occurred on the point north of the subject property and elsewhere on Sproat Lake. The landowner should be encouraged to establish a single dock to service the four properties, such that multiple shoreline impacts to the littoral zone and fish habitat can be minimized. They should also be advised that any work below the high water mark of the lake, including the construction of docks and wharves, may only be undertaken with an authorization under the BC *Water Act* and with the permission of the owner of the bed of the lake.

With respect to tree management, we strongly recommend that the landowners involve an ISA certified arborist to identify any hazard trees and provide recommendations for the placement of road and habitable area of the lots such that damage to the old growth forests and sensitive ecosystems will be avoided to the greatest extent possible. The proposal is for the creation of four very narrow (40m) lots abutting the shoreline. This configuration, in an old growth forest, will likely result in the identification and removal of more hazard trees from the parcel than if wider lots were created. Note that topping trees is to be discouraged due to the additional hazards that are created using this management approach. Tree topping is not recommended by *Develop with Care* or by the International Society of Arboriculture. An ISA arborist will be able to recommend more effective and longer term solutions to managing possible hazard trees.
