#### **Background**

# Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District POLICY

Title: Grant-in-Aid Policy	Number: A-1
Authority: Local Government Act – Sections: 181, 182, 176 (1) (c), 804 (g)	Date Adopted: December 7, 2012
Historical Changes: Rescinds current Grant-in-Aid Policy dated October 28, 2009	Cross Reference: Finance Department

The Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District provides Grant-in-Aid assistance once a year in order to assist local non-profit organizations that provide a benefit to one or more electoral areas in the Region or the entire Regional District.

The purpose of this Policy is to establish a consistent and accountable process for dealing with Grant-in-Aid Applications in the Alberni-Clayoquot Region.

#### Part 1 – Definitions

The following definitions apply to this policy:

*Applicant* means the organization applying for a Grant-in-Aid.

*Board* means the Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District Board of Directors.

*Grant-in-Aid* means financial assistance or in-kind assistance from the Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District.

Region means the Alberni-Clayoquot Region.

Regional District means Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District.

#### Part 2 – Eligibility

- 1. Organizations must meet the following criteria in order to be in consideration for a *Grant-in-Aid*:
  - a) Must be a non-profit organization;
  - b) Must be local in nature, in that the *Grant-in-Aid* requested is for a specific service to the residents of the *Region*;

Members: Port Alberni, Ucluelet, Tofino, Electoral Areas

<sup>&</sup>quot;A" (Bamfield), "B" (Beaufort), "C" (Long Beach), "D" (Sproat Lake), "E" (Beaver Creek) and "F" (Cherry Creek)



- c) Must provide a social enrichment service to the entire *Regional District* or a specific area in the *Regional District*;
- d) Must demonstrate that the service provided fills a need in the community, and that there is no overlapping with services already existing; and;
- e) The organization must have sound financial and administrative management.
- 2. The *Regional District* will not provide a *Grant-in-Aid* to an industrial, commercial or business organization.
- 3. A *Regional District* will not provide a *Grant-in-Aid* to subsidize activities that are the responsibility of senior levels of government.
- 4. No double dipping. Organizations that have applied for a *Grant-in-Aid* from the City of Port Alberni, District of Tofino or District of Ucluelet will not be eligible for a *Grant-in-Aid* through the *Regional District*.

#### Part 3 – Grant-in-Aid Application Process

- 1. At the beginning of January each year, staff will advertise the process for organizations to submit a *Grant-in-Aid* application to the *Regional District* for consideration in the current year.
- 2. Organizations must submit the following documentation as part of their application process:
  - a. *Grant-in-Aid* Application Form (Appendix A);
  - b. Annual Report for the organization;
  - c. Current years budget and latest financial statement for the organization, noting any other sources of funding; and;
  - d. Brief report outlining what the *Grant-in-Aid* will be used for.
- 3. *Grant-in-Aid* applications must be submitted to the Manager of Finance at the *Regional District* Office no later than January 31<sup>st</sup> of each year.
- 4. Late applications will not be accepted and will be returned to the *Applicant*.




#### Part 4 – Approval Process

- 1. The Manager of Finance reviews each application to ensure the organization is eligible and the correct documentation has been submitted.
- 2. All eligible applications will be presented at a special Committee of the Whole meeting providing an opportunity to review applications and make recommendations to the Board of Directors. If requested, the applications will be presented to the applicable area committee.
- 3. The *Board* will consider the recommendations from the Committee of the Whole and will decide whether to approve *Grant-in-Aid* applications prior to adoption of the *Regional District's* financial plan at the end of March, each year.
- 4. The *Board* may request organizations to make a presentation on their *Grant-in-Aid* Application, prior to the *Board* making their final decision.

#### Part 5 – Release of Grant-in-Aid

- 1. In April of each year, the Manager of Finance will advise the *Applicants* in writing as to whether or not they have been awarded a *Grant-in-Aid*, and if awarded, the amount of financial assistance. Where the *Grant-in-Aid* awarded is for in-kind assistance, the *Applicant* will be advised in writing, the details of their in-kind *Grant-in-Aid*.
- 2. Organizations awarded *Grant-in-Aid* assistance will receive their funding on August 1<sup>st</sup>, each year.
- 3. If the organization requires their *Grant-in-Aid* funding before August 1<sup>st</sup>, they must submit in writing, to the Manager of Finance, a request for early release of their *Grant-in-Aid*.
- 4. Organizations awarded a *Grant-in-Aid* must submit a final report to the Manager of Finance no later than December 31<sup>st</sup> of the current year. The report must include how the funds were expended.
- 5. Grant-in-Aids are not guaranteed from year to year.
- 6. Organizations are encouraged to work toward financial independence.

### Grant in Aid Application 2016 – Alberni Valley Chamber of Commerce

3. Please describe the services and benefits that your organization provides to the Alberni-Clayoquot region.

Our Mandate within the Visitor Centre operations is to promote attractions and services that are currently available in the area. We do this through a combination of well- trained year round staff complemented by Youth and Students who we attract to our environment during the higher volume season.

We maintain a relationship with Destination BC and work closely with all other Tourism Operations particularly those nearby us such as Tourism Tofino and Tourism Ucluelet. The VC Operations of the Chamber of Commerce recognizes that we are vital to the Economic Success of the area through our first impressions that we garner with Visitors to the area.

We maintain a strong Ambassador program consisting of more than 50 volunteers who join us in various locations to assist in Visitor Connections. As well, we utilize the creativity of a Mobile Visitor Centre to further our reach and we leverage the value of Local and External Fam Tours in order to provide best possible training for our employees and volunteers.

#### **Mobile Visitor Centre**

In 2014 we launched our Mobile Visitor Centre (MVC). The MVC goes to several areas of interest throughout the Alberni Clayoquot Regional District, including regional areas such as Sproat Lake, China Creek and Stamp Falls. The Mobile Visitor Centre is also in attendance at local community events, including minor hockey tournaments, the Toy Run, Salmon Festival, Thunder in the Valley and more. Through 2015 the MVC connected with nearly 20000 people thus improving the likelihood of additional revenues for the local business community AND improving odds of visits by them to some of our key Tourism sites.

### Volunteer Ambassador Program

Our Ambassador Program is comprised of a pool of volunteers that actively greet visitors to our community. They frequent such places as Cathedral Grove, McLean Mill, Steam Train and the MV Frances Barkley. These venues see an abundance of travelers, who are keen to learn more about the Alberni Valley. Our Ambassadors can also be seen at local community events, such as Canada Day, Sunset Market, the Toy Run, Salmon Festival etc., and of course they are often seen in our MVC.

Our Ambassador program is one of a kind within the Visitor Centre network. We are very fortunate to have a team of more than 50 people who readily jump into action for

the good of the community. Our Ambassadors are happy to take shifts where scheduled to do so. Through their commitment and pride of our community, they recommend hotels, motels, B & B's, restaurants, retail stores, tourism operations and things to do and see within the Alberni Valley to the travelling public.

The current Ambassador Program through its success is leading us to consider an expansion of the program to develop a 'Champions of Alberni' concept whereby many more people get trained on local attractions.

### **Adventure Map**

Through our VC we also developed the very successful Adventure Map that helps promote our Business and Event community through fun style graphics. Our map produced initially in 2014 was so popular that we had to re-produce in early 2015 so as to ensure product supply. It contains over 125 graphics of both local businesses and local attractions and serves as a very good way of promoting activity in the area.

#### **The Sunset Market**

The Sunset Market is another very successful initiative that was started by the AVCOC. The AVCOC now partners with the Hupacasath First Nation and hosts the Sunset Market every Wednesday at Victoria Quay from June – August. The Victoria Quay location is a desirable venue as it has the ability to attract residents, visitors and people travelling en route to the West Coast. The vendors vary from artisans, crafters, jewelers, non-profits and general retailers. Food and entertainment are also part of the Market.

The market is planned for 2016 under the primary lead of Hupacasath First Nation.

### **Tourism Tofino**

We expanded our reach by partnering with Tourism Tofino. This enhanced the interaction between the staff, the ambassadors and the visitors, thus enabling us to develop a better rapport with our visitors; translating to additional opportunities for our small businesses.

### Fam Tours (Familiarization)

We see FAM Tours as a critical component to the overall training for our employees. We therefore send our team of employees to various local facilities including the hotels, motels, B&B's and all Campgrounds. Additionally we tour them through the available restaurants and we ensure that they are very familiar with the geographic of the area. We also create short quizzes aimed at helping them understand some of the many questions that they may receive.

In 2014 we started to bring our staff to the outside areas of Tofino/Ucluelet as a means of improving their knowledge of those areas. That expanded significantly in 2015 and it is clear to us that the results were very positive. For 2016 we are learning of renewed interest from our partners in those communities who now want to bring their staff to us.

#### **Business Support**

As well we support and promote our members and the business community at large. We are tasked with improving the business climate in the Alberni Valley. Dinner meetings are held monthly and provide networking and training opportunities for the small business owner. Annual Business Excellence Awards are held in April, which recognize deserving individuals and business organizations in the community. The 'Try Home First' initiative of 2015 was a tremendous success generating \$6000.00 in Gift Cards awarded by surprise to local shoppers through December of 2015. The Chamber of Commerce has many other ongoing projects, each of which are directly related to business development, growth, education and transition. These include for 2015: Food Services Guide in partnership with ADSS, No. 7 Challenge which we've taken the lead role on for the 10 km run vs. the Steam Train. We are also leading the charge on the Tri-Conic Challenge an event designed to really impact the many features of the area for 2017. Another area that we are working on is the development of the 'Champions of Alberni' which we hope to get off the ground in 2016.

# 5. Please describe how the services provided by your organization fill a need in the community.

Visitor Services are crucial for each and every community. In our case we are well-positioned to offer exceptional services due in part to our location at the entrance to the area. Visitors do stop more often than people realize. They are looking for information, for places to stay, to eat and to shop. Additionally they are often travelling through but are available to stay for a period of time. Our staff and volunteer teams are keen to jump at those opportunities so that we can help create additional revenues for the local business community.

Our Mobile Visitor Centre is a key part of our program in that it provides opportunity for us to reach visitors by going to them. This is a unique approach to visitor services that is being considered by many other Visitor Service Operations.

Our Adventure Map version two is widely utilized by Visitors and it clearly presents opportunities for additional sales and visits to our many facilities.

Our Way-Finding Signs are well used and are supported by many local businesses who each recognize the value to providing this sort of quality and professional information.

Our Ambassador Program is top notch and is widely recognized through Tourism BC as a model to follow. With more than 50 volunteers the program offers us significant opportunity to put our best foot forward.

#### Year in Review

The Alberni Valley Rescue Squad has had one of the busiest years ever in 2015. We had call outs all over the valley as well as mutual aids over most of the island. We were busy helping with the fire on Dog Mountain keeping space for the firefighting as well as serving notices to land owners. We also were on site for the unfortunate death of the boater and helped out with the Regatta and a Search for missing boaters on Great Central Lake. With all of the need on the Regional District's waterways we have purchased a new boat and our working on fitting the boat communication, radar and lighting systems and need all of the help we can get.

#### **Community Support**

The squad has received a Grant-in-Aid from the Alberni Clayoquot Regional District each year upon application and currently receives a permissive tax exemption from the City of Port Alberni and a gaming grant from the Provincial Government.

The squad also receives 'donations-in-kind' from local business in the form of discounted purchases on equipment and services.

The squad membership volunteers between 1500-2000 hours annually in training, missions and community sponsored events.

#### Request

The Alberni Valley Rescue Squad is seeking funding in the amount of \$8,000 that we can use to cover the costs of a communications system for our new boat that will service Sproat Lake, Great Central Lake and the Somass River

#### Need

The Alberni Valley Rescue Squad has one of the busiest swiftwater rescue teams in the Province of British Columbia. Our proximity to world class waterways attracts sports fisherman and recreationalist in great numbers. Every year we receive a number of calls for both rescues and body recoveries in local rivers and lakes that require access and communication with our marine craft.

Food Hub Proposal - January 29th, 2016 Submitted by Marcus Lobb For AVTTS - Food Group

#### Food Hub Goals and Outputs

#### Background

As an active member of the network of Vancouver Island Health Authority Food Hubs, AVTTS are committed to supporting our community in its capacity to source healthy food options for all members of the community. We do this by being a leader in education, kickstarting projects and volunteer recruitment. One concern that we have been faced with is that, unlike other hubs, we are currently splitting our funding with the Clayoquot Region (Tofino/Ucluelet). Their food hub is fortunate to have financial support via the Clayoquot Biosphere Trust, which helps boost their capacity for action. Unfortunately we have been operating our Food Hub at half capacity, something our community cannot afford. The statistics have shown the state of poverty and healthy food access in the Alberni Valley, and now is the time to take action. We are the only active hub currently on the island that does not have a Food Security Action Plan.

#### Goals

To establish a Food Security network of working groups that will collaborate in funding and innovational ideas with the purpose of alleviating the effects of poor health that is related to unhealthy food options/access. This network will put into action the framework that will be drafted following the Food Security Round Table which is currently being organized for February 17th with 40 invites. It is our goal to improve our food insecurity status and bring us up to (at the very least) the normal standards of food security on Vancouver Island. We are also looking forward to supporting our relationship with the Bamfield / Anacla region, who are currently receiving very little support from our Food Hubs in the region. We will accomplish this only through increased collaboration and educational activity.

#### Objective #1 - Creation of Three Food Security Working Groups and year-long facilitation of meetings

We will be creating three working groups that have been identified as needs of our community following our Food Security Workshop this past spring. These working groups will meet monthly starting in early summer under the coordination of our Food Hub Coordinator. The group will share ideas, create new projects and support one another in funding opportunities. Through meetings with leaders of these groups, the need for more collaboration and partnerships has been identified as a missing link.

#### Objective #2 - Planning and hosting of Local Food Demonstration Table at Fall Fair

To showcase our local food producers to those who attend the fall fair. This table will highlight the diversity of growers and artisinal creators that our Valley has to offer, but preparing locally made healthy food at an otherwise unhealthy food event. Our Food Hub coordinator will organize with members in the community to host this event.





# Port Alberni Marine Rescue Society 2016 Grant-in-Aid Information

The Port Alberni Marine Rescue Society is requesting the funds to assist in paying for the transport (towing) of a new boat house from Sooke to Port Alberni.

In 2015, the Port Alberni Marine Rescue Society received a donation of a boathouse which will be used to house the Alberni Responder. The boat house, which is of newer construction, measures 62' x 28' and we have been working with the Port Alberni Port Authority to find a suitable location to place the structure. Photographs of the structure are attached. Once in place, the interior of the boat house will be modified to include an equipment storage room as well as a training room. Although the Alberni Responder is of marine grade aluminum construction, keeping the vessel inside will extend its useful life expectancy by 10 years.

The Alberni Responder is a Falkins Class Type II rescue vessel, the replacement value of which is in excess of \$600,000. The vessel was purchased new in 2011 and all funds to acquire the vessel were raised locally and through grant applications prepared by our volunteers.

Since we acquired the boat house, we have solicited quotes to tow the structure from Sooke to Port Alberni. The successful bid, from a local company, was \$19,500 and bids were as high as \$26,000. Thus far, we have received a \$500 donation from the A V Lions Club, \$6000 from two corporate donors and permission to re-direct \$7000 from our gaming grant towards the project. That leaves an outstanding amount of \$6000.

Members form the Port Alberni marine Rescue Society would be pleased to meet with representatives of the Alberni-Clayoquot regional District to answer any questions concerning this worthwhile project.

## Application for ACRD Grant-in-Aid – January 2016 PROPOSED USE OF GRANT FUNDS



**Project goal:** To design and construct an open sided building, next to the Maritime Gallery on the Lighthouse pier, to protect and display the 36-foot heritage wooden steamboat "*The Swan*".

## **Project Summary:**

Port Alberni Maritime Heritage Society preserves, promotes and presents the maritime heritage of the Alberni Inlet and Barkley Sound. We are a registered Canadian Charity (CRA # 892082884RP0001). In November of 2015 we acquired the historic wooden steamboat "*The Swan*" which spent almost all its over 100 years of life in the ACRD area both on the Alberni Inlet and on Sproat Lake. This is a unique vessel which is probably not equalled anywhere in Canada. It is essential to preserve this vessel on land as it would be to expensive to keep it afloat.

An open sided building is required in order to both preserve it from the worst of the elements and to allow the vessel to be restored and displayed to the public. It will become a major tourist attraction, both during restoration and on display afterwards.

This project will enable us to build the structure that has already been designed by a qualified volunteer designer. We will pursue the necessary board approval of the design and obtain all regulatory permits. Materials for the building are estimated to cost \$10,000 As far as is possible the lumber will be sourced at the McLean Mill. Other costs are for site preparation, electrical and safety features. We expect to use significant volunteer labour to construct the building, but professional assistance will be required for some heavy lifting and roofing. The project time frame is May 1, to June 30, 2016. If a grant is approved, early disbursement of some of the funds would be helpful.

**Partners:** The display of "*The Swan*" along with the other heritage vessel on the same site (our Boomboat "*Tatoosh*", a dugout canoe, and a planned wooden double-ender troller) is only possible with the help of our partners: The AV Museum; The Port Authority; the McLean Mill; and, we hope, the ACRD

Use of ACRD funds: The funds requested from the ACRD will be applied to the overall cost of the project.

**Recognition:** The contribution of ACRD will be prominently recognised on the building.

## RE: 2015 Year End Report - 2016 Request for Financial Support

To the Chair and Board of Directors.

Vancouver Island North Film Commission is pleased to submit our 2015 Year End Report, the 5 year Business Plan. Include is our 2016 grant in aid application for continued financial support for 2016. Our 2015 financials are currently being prepared by our accounting firm and will be forwarded once they are complete.

We are in the process of gathering economic impact surveys from the productions who filmed in our region in 2015. The numbers will be calculated and shared with Creative BC as-per our contract with the Provincial Government. The Province will calculate the aggregate spend and announce the numbers shortly before they announce the 2016 budget.

Our Year End Review does list the productions we worked with throughout our catchment area and we have included information on the projects we worked on in your community.

In the 2015 Year End report is a forecast 2016 budget, it is very similar to last years budget which we provided in the 2014 Year End Review. 2015 revenue comes from our community grants in aid and service agreements. Although we request support from all area's of the service region we do not know our final budget until each community or regional district completes its budget process. This means we must be very aware of our bottom line in order to make our funding stretch to the end of the year.

#### See chart below:

IN 2015 we applied and budgeted for \$147,500 but operated on \$128,000. We were not able to complete some items like the upgrades to the website and replace aging equipment or cost of living increases to the staff wages as some of our funding requests were not approved or were reduced. Staff wages have stayed the same for the last 5 years.

## Breakdown on how we use the funding:

Our 2015 financials are currently being reviewed by the accounting firm, Deborah Ewart Inc. We will provide you with a copy of the reviewed year end as soon as it is completed.

In 2015 our final working budget was \$128,000. The human factor is critical to servicing this sector, our success is built on relationships and quality service. Our staff is on a salary we do not pay overtime, we have 2 full time employees in the budget at \$99,500 which also includes the organizations portion to the receiver general for CPP and EI. In 2015 this left us with an operating budget of \$28,500 from which we paid for location scouts, location surveys, vehicle lease, fuels, accommodation, market, travel to events, website, membership, telephone, cellphones, supplies membership dues and insurance. For comparison purposes Island South Film Commissions ( Greater Victoria) budget of \$180,000 for 2 FTE. They are currently requesting an increase to \$200,000 for 2016.

INfilm service's over 22,000 square miles of land mass including portions of the mainland which, extends from Nanaimo to the borders of the Cariboo Chilcotin versus Island South Film Commissions boundaries of the Capitol Regional District. We are obligated to be out in each community, photographing, location scouting and conducting production surveys with clients. With such an large region we lease a vehicle and pay the fuels costs versus paying for mileage, this works out to a very big savings for the organization.

## **Digital Locations Library**

Our most important tool is our ability to quickly respond to a location request by providing an digital photo file. As part of our contract with the Province we must export all of our location images to their master library. In 2015 Creative BC transitioned from using Macsol as their digital image database manager to ReelScout, our staff had to repopulate their data base with our images. This required a review of each of the 1950 locations which translates to 37,562 individual images. Tanya Price our staff member who mangers our digital image library retagged and reloaded all of these images.

Currently we have 515 locations tagged to the Nanaimo Regional District this is 10,300 images which we have shot, optimized, tagged with search codes and loaded to 2 different image libraries. Our locations library is a huge asset, compare this to our tourism partners who pay steep fees for photographs. We have accumulated and continue to add to this system which represents the entire region.

## Local Crew

INfilm is working on the development of a local crew base. This will allow us to land more production. Currently the crew must be brought in from Vancouver. We will lay out our current plan to the Nanaimo Ec Dev Board during our presentation on January 21st. We have been meeting with Vancouver Island University, North Island College and an accredited production company to create a new training program that will see the students being trained while working on a slate of production over a course of 2 or 3 years. Within this initiate is a tourism attraction component. There are many partners in this exciting new initiative that will see the movie of the week, lower budget sector of the industry grow dramatically over the course of several years.

#### 2016

<u>Production</u> - With the low Canadian dollar 2016 is forecasted to be another busy year. We currently have several productions ongoing in different stages of development.

Marketing - We will attend the AFCI Locations Trade Show in LA as a partner with Creative BC.

<u>Training Crew</u> - We have partnered with Clairwood Capitol and Trilight Entertainment on a slate of production and a crew training initiative.

<u>Digital Library</u> - We will continue to scout and load new images from around the region.

<u>Website</u> - We hope 2016 will be the year we can upgrade and refresh our website, this will depend on meeting the goal of our funding applications.

The outlook for 2016 appears bright, as a weak Canadian dollars continues to drive the US productions north.

We have a confirmation from one production we have been working on, Fox Studios will return in the spring with yet another feature film. They are returning to many of the locations they used last year on Hidden Fortress. They are expecting to begin construction of a set in April and May going to camera in early June.

We would be happy to meet with the board, please let us know if you would like us to attend a board meeting.

Film and new media are global industries. They are mobile and work in a very completive business environment. INfilm's service region has a long history as a resource industry based and we have all experienced the highs and the lows of those sectors. Central and Northern Vancouver Island communities are working to diversify. Like the other regions of BC, film and new media production has been identified as one of the key sectors to go after. You can not afford to sit and wait with the film industry. You need to stay in the loop, find out what projects are gearing up and if they fit the locations in your region. This is the role of the regional film commission. Whether we land the project or not we want to always be in the game. We have access to industry information through the relationships we have developed over many years of providing reliable and respected service.

When production comes to town they spend alot of money very quickly, they prep, they film and then they go away. While they are here, they hire and rent locally, fill hotels and motels, shop in the local stores and eat in local restaurants. They have a very light environmental footprint and in-general leave locations in better shape then they found them.

The second economic bump comes through film induced tourism. INfilm is presently working with Senior Tourism Development officers from the Ministry of Jobs, Tourism and Skills Training on a pilot film tourism program.

Please find attached our application for a Grant-In-Aid for 2016. The Westcoast Inland Search and Rescue Society (WISAR) would like to thank you for your donations in previous years. Donations like yours have allowed us to continue to develop our capacity to provide an effective emergency response service to our communities.

Over the last thirteen years WISAR has grown to be a significant participant in the emergency management community on the west coast. We feel that we have recovered well from the 2013 hall fire and have now directed our energy into making our team stronger. At the moment we are training 20 new community members by providing an 80 hour in-house SAR course. While it is always exciting to bring in new members, it costs the society money.

We have also started phase two of our vehicle response capability plan and have begun to source funding for a smaller initial response vehicle. Our new command vehicle has proved to be very effective streamlining our responses in the sense of incident command. Now it is time to acquire something smaller that will allow hasty searches of logging roads, provide a vehicle to assist in mutual aid call on the island, and serve as a very important tool for rapid intervention if one of our members is in distress or injured.

We are asking for the Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District for a Grant in Aid of \$6,000 to be split between:

- 1. Personal Protective Equipment for the new members;
- 2. The purchase of an initial response vehicle;

While continuing to build our capacity we still respond regularly to emergency tasks in our region. We are also maintaining our trained and certified membership with regular exercises and training programs to maintain readiness and maintain and continually increase the level of skills in the team.

We are requesting \$6,000 from the Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District.

## Who will it serve?

The target population benefiting from WISAR Society activities consists of the residents of the region and visitors. The resident population of the Clayoquot Sound Region is approximately 6,000 spread between the villages of Tofino, Ucluelet, Toquaht, Opitsit, Ahousaht, Hot Springs (Hesquiaht) and a number of small settlements, float homes, etc. Tourist numbers in the region vary widely but can be as high as 20 000 on a peak summer day. Other visitors to the region include mushroom pickers who range through forested areas. Many tourists travel by kayak but may become lost on land requiring the searching of exposed coastal shoreline. Some tourists stop to walk along the rapids of the fast flowing Kennedy River (beside Highway 4 between Port Alberni and Tofino), increasing the need for a fast response to a river incident. Highway 4 is a relatively high hazard highway and we have been involved in a number of response tasks to search for missing travelers and to respond to motor vehicle accidents.

WISAR has received support from a wide range of agencies in the region including municipal governments, RCMP, Coastguard, forest companies, National Parks and others.

In addition to its core area WISAR also provides mutual support to other agencies from Nootka Island to Port Renfrew and the Port Alberni area. We have been included as a resource in a number of recent industrial safety plans in the region. We are an important resource in the West Coast communities.




Figure #1: Shows the Westcoast Inland Search and Rescue Society Operational Area.

## How many will be directly involved?

Certified WISAR Membership actively able to respond immediately to emergency callouts is currently 20. These members provide substantial in-kind contributions in terms of training time, operational callouts and participation in other emergency planning and management activities in the region. At the moment we are training 20 new community members by providing an 80 hour in-house SAR course.

The trained individuals in the WISAR Society represent an important resource for search and rescue operations in particular but for all emergency management related activities including disaster response. WISAR has provided support and active membership to the Emergency Management Committees in both Tofino, Ucluelet, and the Area C emergency management committee when requested.

## What is the economic benefit to the area?

## 1. Prevention of Loss of Life:

The climate on the West Coast of Vancouver Island receives over 3 metres of rain per year, and is inhospitable to anyone who is lost or injured. The Society can increase its chances of finding someone in the crucial first few hours or days as it provides more adequately trained and equipped volunteers. Loss of life has obvious impacts to the owner, but also affects family, friends, and is disruptive to the economy of a community.

## 2. Mitigation of Injuries:

The earlier someone is found, the less severe his or her injuries are likely to be. Serious injuries put a drain on health care resources and cause economic hardship. One or two cases of advanced hypothermia could cost the taxpayer more money than is requested in this proposal.

## 3. Reduced Cost to Taxpayer:

Volunteer searchers do work that would otherwise have to be done by public servants or private companies. In the past, searches in Clayoquot Sound have been carried out by groups from other areas. This has resulted in higher travel and support costs compared with a locally based group.

## 4. A Safety Resource for Industry in the Region

We are increasingly being asked to provide details of our capabilities to groups writing safety plans for operations in remote areas of the region. We can be an important adjunct to other resources for difficult and technical evacuations.

#### 5. Value to Tourism Economies:

Having local search and rescue capability makes the West Coast of Vancouver Island a safer place to visit. This may give a competitive advantage to British Columbia over other rugged travel destinations. Clayoquot Sound is in a UNESCO Biosphere Reserve and it is expected that the level of tourism, including wilderness based tourism, will increase in the coming years.

### **Overview of Attached Financial Statements**

Summary financial statements for 2014 are attached – the financials for 2015 have not been completed yet.

A key feature of the WISAR organization is that with the donation of relatively small amounts of money from local governments and organizations we have been able to leverage very large in-kind contributions and grant funding from external agencies. While we have been able to get provincial and federal grant funding this would not be possible without the monies that we receive from local governments.

Grants from the Regional District of Alberni Clayoquot have allowed us to address targeted projects including the acquisition of safety equipment for road searches and training and equipment for shoreline search and rescue activities as well as critical help to complete our SAR building.

## Society Background

The Westcoast Inland Search and Rescue (WISAR) Society is based in the communities of Tofino and Ucluelet and provides Ground and Inland Water Search and Rescue services to local police authorities (RCMP and National Park Wardens) for Clayoquot Sound, and parts of Barkley Sound. The Society currently has 30 volunteer members with a new intake just being trained.

The geography of the WISAR operational area includes hundreds of kilometers of coastline in the traditional territories of several First Nations. In the course of various SAR responses, WISAR interacts with more than 16 other agencies: two RCMP detachments; several neighboring GSAR Groups; two volunteer fire departments, national and provincial parks; Canadian Coast Guard and Coast Guard Auxiliary; BC Ambulance Service; emergency coordinators in two municipalities and five First Nations Bands; and the Department of National Defense.

## **Project Description**

At the moment we are training 20 new community members by providing an 80 hour in-house SAR course. While it is always exciting to bring in new members, it costs the society money to train new recruits to the appropriate standards, as it also does to have the equipment they need to be effective and safe.

We have also started phase two of our vehicle response capability plan and have begun to source funding for a smaller initial response vehicle. Our new command vehicle has proved to be very effective in streamlining our responses in the sense of incident command. Now it is time to acquire something smaller that will allow hasty searches of logging roads, provide a vehicle to assist in mutual aid call on the island, and serve as a very important tool for rapid intervention if one of our members is in distress or injured.

We are asking for the Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District for a Grant in Aid of \$6,000 to be split between:

- 1. Personal Protective Equipment for the new members;
- 2. The purchase of an initial response vehicle;

Dear Mayors, Directors, and Corporate Secretary:

West Coast Aquatic is proud to contribute towards the economic and environmental health of the region by:

- Creating employment within ACRD communities
- Hosting and supporting local events
- · Procuring local goods and services
- Contributing to the local tax base
- Producing decision support tools for use by local government staff and directors
- Advancing the area's ecological and recreational values
- Raising the profile of the ACRD area internationally.

We acknowledge the value of the grants-in-aid that the ACRD makes available. As with our past grants received, our priority is to create tangible benefits for the communities, and leverage additional funds to expand those benefits. As a demonstration of our commitment to sustainable development, we would like to highlight some of the strong returns on investment created for the ACRD in this past year:

- For every \$1 you invested in WCA, we brought \$79 dollars into this region.
- We employed 3 permanent and 8 temporary residents of the region.
- We are investing over \$350k (spent largely on regional contractors and locally procured goods) on the building of a Stewardship Centre that will attract visitors and provide environmental education to locals and visitors alike.
- We have raised over \$850k towards fisheries habitat restoration and enhancement.
- We are nearing adoption of a Marine Spatial Plan built upon over 200 map layers that will assist local, regional, provincial and national decision makers with the management of marine resources in the WCVI area.
- We are designing an ecological and social monitoring program that will gather baseline data to be used in future marine environment management.



- We began implementing the recommendations from two regional salmon risk assessments that will guide future stewardship projects, and continued to facilitate three regional salmon roundtables that involve local people in consensus based fisheries management.
- We facilitated the research phase of an Education Tourism initiative that has now been handed over to the Clayoquot Biosphere Trust for implementation.
- We have maintained a multi-sector forum for all levels of government, Nuu-chah-nulth First Nations, all fishing sectors, aquaculture, environment, labour processing, marine transportation and forestry to jointly discuss issues that affect our coastal communities and environment.

As part of our grant-in-aid application for 2016-2017, we would like to familiarize you with our intended products over the next year, as well as review how the grant in aid was used last year.

#### The Year in Review: 2015-2016

This past year, WCA put the ACRD's investment towards numerous strategic initiatives. A few highlights include:

- We conducted sector reviews of the draft Marine Spatial Plans for Barkley Sound and Clayoquot Sound. These plans contain the most comprehensive collection of data available on the ecological values and human uses in the WCVI area. The plans are adaptive in nature, and provide recommendations on which uses are best situated in which areas. An ArcView based online tool is under development, which will enable governments, First Nations, industry and the public to access this data in an interactive way, thus informing and helping to streamline decision making and engagement processes.
- We convened, facilitated, and administered the Barkley Sound Salmon Initiative and:
  - Began implementation of BC's first local integrated salmon management strategy, which was collaboratively developed by First Nations, government and fishing sector representatives
  - o Began implementation of the risk assessment recommendations for Barkley Chinook
  - Raised over \$270,000 cash, and leveraged an additional \$604,000 for salmon related projects. This translated into significant local spending and employment.
- We convened, facilitated, and administered the Clayoquot Salmon Round Table and:
  - o Began implementation of the risk assessment recommendations for Clayoquot Chinook
  - Designed an ecological monitoring program that will produce necessary baseline data.
- We submitted proposals and raised funds for tangible projects such youth mentoring and habitat restoration work.
- We have provided work and training to Nuu-chah-nulth youth and university students.



- We are near to opening the Stewardship Centre, which will be an attraction to tourists and promote local acts of stewardship. The construction of the centre yielded significant local spending, and once open, will provide additional local jobs.
- Through a building lease, we contribute over \$24,000 a year to the local tax base.

#### The Year Ahead: 2016-2017

In 2016-2017 we will continue to implement the direction you set out in the Coastal Strategy, focusing on the themes of collaborative governance, ecosystem approach, access to resources and stewardship, through activities including:

- Facilitating and coordinating the Barkley and Clayoquot wild salmon initiatives.
- Facilitating the WCA Governance Board.
- Hosting events to explore expanded opportunities for collaborative governance.
- Harmonizing the Marine Spatial Plan with government advisory processes.
- Implementing the Marine Spatial Plan by making an Adaptive Planning Tool (and associated data layers) available to decision makers.
- Confirming the values in identified ecologically sensitive areas, working towards protection measures for ESAs, and developing associated restoration Master Plans.
- Monitoring key ecological and social indicators to assess the impacts of human uses and management.
- Exploring support for, and interest in, the development of an outer shore marine plan.
- Expanding the roundtables beyond salmon to other species of interest.
- Identifying gaps in the economy, and facilitating economic development projects.
- Opening the stewardship centre in Port Alberni that will provide education to tourists and locals, and promote other local attractions and businesses.

These activities, and the Coastal Strategy, fill an important role in the community: we are an internationally unique organization that includes diverse governments, communities, and businesses working together around a coastal ecosystem approach.

The ACRD is a core member and funder within WCA's Terms of Reference. Local government's investment has been of key importance in enabling us to leverage other funding. We use the grant-in-aid to cover part of our core costs and meet diversification requirements of funding sources.

In order to be mindful of your many budget demands, we are requesting \$17,000 for this fiscal year, which is the same as we received last year. Your contribution is especially significant this year as we are in the final few years of our main grantor contribution and will be focusing on fundraising and



business development. For each dollar that local communities invest, we will continue to help you show strong returns and benefits to communities.

We wish to thank you for your continued support for West Coast Aquatic and our shared vision of making the west coast the best coast. By supporting this work, you will be recognized at home and abroad as leaders in creating ocean health and wealth for your communities.

#3. The fundamental intent of the Alberni Valley Drag Race Association for having the annual "Thunder in the Valley" drag races is to provide a safe venue for car enthusiasts to race their cars legally, not on the streets or the highways. This goal was met when the Regional District allowed us to lease the aerodrome once per year for 1/4 mile drag races. Hopefully, the Regional District will renew our lease after the runway expansion is completed. The financial benefits to the region are estimated to be approximately one million dollars for the once per year event.

This event benefits such groups as the Alberni Valley Wrestling Club, the Toy Run, the Alberni Valley Track Club, Sproat Lake and Alberni Fire Departments, the Kinsmen and Fall Fair Association, North Island College, the Alberni Flying Club and the Island Off Road Racing Association. We are the major source of income for some of these groups. We also make donations to the Cancer Society, the Charity Golf Classic, Alberni Valley Minor Hockey and the Hospice Society.

It is not unusual for most of the hotels, motels, B&B's and campgrounds to be fully booked during this weekend. Gas stations, restaurants and grocery stores all benefit from the influx of visitors.

We have provided improvements to the aerodrome over the years benefiting both the Regional District and the Drag Race Association. Some of them are as follows:

- Two large parking areas adjacent to the Airport Road (one of which is being advertised as available for a commercial lease)
- -Concrete return road for the races and used mainly by the Glider business.
- -Help with the flooding and beaver control.
- -Assistance with the "Fishermen's" access road.

#5. This event is "something different" for family's to do in the Alberni Valley as it is the only 1/4 mile drag race on Vancouver Island since 1973. Port Alberni and district has been labelled "Car Town B.C." for many years. "Thunder in the Valley" helps to maintain that image, bringing more and more visitors to the Valley.

The officials of the City of Port Alberni, by asking us to run an 1/8th mile drag race on Stamp Avenue and providing us with a venue and all kinds of help while the runway expansion takes place, acknowledge that the financial and publicity benefits to the Valley are very real and important.

If we were to receive the Grant in Aid we would be able to pay two outstanding invoices that we have been unable to pay that total \$14,327.57. In 2014 we purchased a tire dragger in order to put rubber down on the runway for better traction and more safety for the faster cars. The amount of \$6,400.00 was paid by a member of the AVDRA with the reassurance that they would be reimbursed after our event.

We are also not able to pay the Alberni Clayoquot Regional District the money we owe them for 2015 in the amount of \$7,927.57.

Due to the total rainout on Saturday, August 8th, 2015 our spectator revenue was down about \$30,000.00 for the weekend.


## ACRD GRANT IN AID APPLICATION CENTRAL WESTCOAST FOREST SOCIETY

Central Westcoast Forest Society (CWFS), at the request of Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure, has assessed the culverts, stream crossings and habitat conditions within the English Cove Watershed on the west coast of Vancouver Island, BC. Specifically along Highway 4 between Maltby Road and the northern entrance of Pacific Rim National Park near Tofino, BC. The objective of this project was to identify potential fish bearing streams, assess habitat conditions, assess culvert conditions and prioritize the need for replacement of these culverts. This assessment identified significant barriers to fish passage, poor water quality and substandard instream and riparian habitat conditions in several creeks.

The English Cove Watershed is a regionally important watershed that supports a diversity of wildlife, rare and endangered ecosystems, and over 5 species of freshwater / anadromous fish. The watershed encompasses area within Pacific Rim National Park Reserve, the District of Tofino, the Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District and BC Parks. Although, much of the watershed is pristine old-growth forest; historic logging, urban development and road construction did occur and was carried out prior to the land being set aside for park purposes. At that time, little consideration was given to riparian areas, wildlife and fish habitat. Today the riparian forest lacks healthy vegetation and trees that moderate water temperature and improve water quality. Development and road construction has increased runoff, and sediment delivery to these streams. Collapsed, undersized or buried culverts are acting as barriers to fish movement. Historic spawning and rearing grounds for wild Pacific salmon are no longer accessible due to culvert conditions. Undersized culverts are restricting water flow and causing extensive areas of erosion. Natural gravels and benthic invertebrate habitat is buried in sediment. The purpose of this project is to improve water quality, restore freshwater habitat, increase species richness and biodiversity, remove barriers to fish passage, restore the ecological integrity of this watershed, engage volunteers and inspire habitat stewardship.

In 2015, CWFS, in partnership with the Ministry of Transportation, replaced an undersized culvert on Maltby Creek within the English Cove Watershed. This year, CWFS aims to replace the collapsed woodbox culvert on Creek 6, approximately 500m south of Maltby Creek. CWFS will use the Grant in Aid funding from ACRD to help replace the Creek 6 culvert with a fish-passable culvert and restore fish passage to ensure connectivity and productivity of the entire English Cove Watershed. We will be applying to the DFO – Recreational Fisheries Conservation Partnership when applications open; this application will request approximately \$100,000 for this project. We are currently in discussion with the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure; the English Cove Watershed is a priority for them and will be worked into the 2016 budget.

Please help us improve spawning and rearing habitat in order to increase many species populations, including salmon and trout, which contribute greatly to the environmental and economic success of the Alberni, Clayoquot Sound and Barkley Sound region.

SIMRS has developed a program that allows us to monitor the marine environment on an ongoing, daily, year round basis. Since 1991, we have been working closely with the marine community recording marine and terrestrial wildlife sightings and observations from whale watching operators, water taxis, tour boats, fish farms, airlines, tug boats and waterfront residents. The information reported is entered into a species specific database that allows us to efficiently collect in-depth and immeasurable fine-scale information. This comprehensive and systematic approach to monitoring has enabled us to identify areas of importance to different species in Clayoquot Sound. We are a continuing member of the BC Marine Mammal Response Network working in conjunction with DFO to help sick, stranded, and entangled marine mammals. Our data contributes to population studies carried out by the Department of Fisheries and Oceans Canada (DFO). SIMRS acts as an information collection centre for receiving, distributing, and forwarding information on the marine environment to the proper authority while keeping the community involved and up-to-date on our monitoring efforts.

#### **Funding Outline:**

With the support of the Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District's Grant-in-Aid funding we will be able to fund the re-printing and promotion of our Killer Whale Identification Catalogue and continue our monitoring efforts. The catalogue is a culmination of nearly 25 years of monitoring Bigg's (Transient) Killer Whales in Clayoquot Sound. This research is important because Killer whales (*Orcinus orca*) are a threatened species in British Columbia. Furthermore they are a species of regional, cultural, and ecological importance. The three ecotypes of killer off BC's coast: Residents, Bigg's (Transient), and Offshores, are considered threatened due to small population sizes; low reproductive rates and human-caused changes in the marine environment.

Strawberry Isle Marine Research Society (SIMRS) has been using citizen science for almost 25 years to collect data on the Bigg's Killer Whales in Clayoquot Sound as this ecotype is the most commonly seen in our area. This data contributes to the Department of Fisheries and Oceans Canada's study of these animals but is also compiled into a locally-made identification catalogue. Our identification catalogue is a unique and user-friendly tool designed to share our findings with the one million visitors to our area about the Bigg's Killer Whales that frequent the waters of Clayoquot Sound through local stories; information on the distinct ecotypes, threats to the population; as well as an in depth guide to identifying individuals. Since the last printing in 2010, we have recorded over 80 new animals to the area and we have had a record of 85 days of killer whale visitation to the area in 2014. Updating this book is an important part of giving back to our community and all the incredible work they have contributed to our research.

Our goal is that that the catalogue and stories will be enjoyed by those with an interest in marine life, inspire and educate readers and encourage responsible environmental stewardship and conservation efforts for Bigg's Killer Whales. The proceeds from this book will go back into SIMRS to allow us to continue this important research.

To promote our conservation message and the catalogue we will be taking our Build-A-Whale to various venues including the Nanaimo Science and Sustainability Society, the Ucluelet Elementary School, and the Pacific Rim Whale Festival.

While we are currently working around the clock to ensure that the catalogue will be ready to launch for the Pacific Rim Whale Festival in 2016 we are still looking for funding for the work to compile, print, and promote the new release.

Crime affects people financially, emotionally and physically. Victim service workers strive to help victims of crime and trauma in our community deal with these needs.

Workers and volunteers provide in person and telephone support to any victim of crime or trauma in need of assistance. This service may take the form of emotional crisis support at the scene of a crime or traumatic incident, practical assistance as needs arise in the days and weeks following an incident and ongoing court support as the file goes through the justice system. We provide a unique service as we are able to provide up to date police and court information that can assist with a victim's safety plans and sense of empowerment within the justice system.

  - support and therefore increase the effectiveness of victims acting as witnesses in court proceedings.





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#### Attachment A

Arrowsmith Amateur Radio Club provides backup communications for the Alberni-Clayoquat Regional District and inter communications from the Emergency Operations Center to other supporting agencies both during and after an emergency and/or disaster.

AARC is a group of likeminded individuals with a commonality of a background in communications electronics and computers. Amateur radio operators must pass a federal government exam covering extensive electronics, radio theory, regulations, both Canadian and International governing communications.

AARC has a 35 member strong membership of dedicated amateur radio operators of all ages and background. A number of our members are employed or have been employed in the communications electronic field, as well some have been doctors, lawyers and even farmers to labourers. But they all share the same interest in this great hobby and have a dedication to supply our communities with their resources and skills to assist in any emergency or disaster.

Amateur radio is known the world over for providing communications during and after events like Katrina hurricane, Mexico City earthquake, Japan tsunami and even 911 New York City.

Amateur radio is a community resource where our training and skills are second to none in the commercial field of communications. Each of our members has a mobile, a portable and a HF base transceiver which are used on a daily basis to make contacts all over the globe.

The club also operates four repeaters, strategically located for the best coverage of the ACRD even out to Ucluelet and Tofino.

We also have an emergency communications trailer, EMCOM Trailer, which is out fitted with the identical equipment that is in the radio room at the EOC, with the exception of the commercial radios.

The EMCOM Trailer will also be outfitted with four vhf commercial radios programmed with supporting agencies such as BC Ambulance, Fire, RCMP, Search & Rescue and even Canadian Coast Guard.

#### Attachment B

The first thing that is lost during a large scale emergency or disaster is the breakdown of infrastructure, communications and power are the first ones to lose. Telephone both landline and cellular are overloaded almost immediately and further to this, power is lost primarily during an earthquake, tsunami and even a large scale forest fire. The confusion that follows is primarily caused by not knowing or understanding what has happened.

Without the very basics of communications, help or assistance is almost impossible, the most critical information to a speedy recovery is having communications.

AARC has the ability to provide immediate communications out of the valley with both voice and digital communications, but the need to coordinate the local communications for the Emergency Operations Center is a must. This gives the governing body the ability to know what has happened in the field and what steps are needed to alleviate further loose of life or property damage.

AARC has the ability to provide this interagency communications with Fire, Ambulance Police and Search & Rescue; and to have it available to the ACRD's Emergency Operations Center or in the field where ever it is needed. But we are in need to update our present equipment to meet today and tomorrows standards in order to continue this valuable service to our community.

With this grant it will enable us to update our aging equipment to meet the requirements set out by Industry Canada and Emergency Management BC and to continue to provide this service to our community.



<u>Where will it be produced?</u> June 17, 2016 as part of the Solstice Art's Festival at the Capitol Theatre, at Harbour Quay in August, 2016 in cooperation with Spirit Square Farmer's Market with a plan to tour local and district schools in the Fall, 2016 and possibly Spring 2017.

<u>Who Is involved:</u> Art Matters Society, Solstice involves, Art Matters, Art Rave, Portal Players and the Art's Council, Spirit Square is hosting a tent at harbour Quay and Art Matters is providing some entertainment for the summer-long event (arts and crafts on Saturday mornings)

<u>The Play:</u> there is a youtube video produced by Only Organics (we have asked permission to use this song). The play is written by Artistic Director Gwynne Hunt.

The play begins with the children singing Old MacDonald had a farm, with a pesticide here, poison spray there, etc.; stuffed chickens in tiny cages are brought on the stage, the stage fills with smog and they run off coughing. There is a skit that runs about ten minutes with children from the ages of 6 to 11 talking about how in Port Alberni we can have chickens, how to save the honey bees by planting flowers, what labels to look for in the grocery store (non gmo & organic) and how not to eat fast food, etc.; the end is New MacDonald Had A Farm and the kids come out singing "using non gmo feed, no pesticides, etc.

<u>The author:</u> Gwynne has been producing children's theatre for twenty years, Fringe Festivals and on the edge community theatre. She has been in Port Alberni for almost four years and in that time has brought a number of shows to the area including her own children's plays, MacBethie, Simmer in the City and The Box.

The children will come to an audition but all of them will get a part; they build sets, make props, costumes and rehearse. It is an enjoyable 6 weeks for them. The most exciting part is the on stage events which are June 17 and the date in August. At least 4 school shows in the fall.

<u>The idea:</u> Art Matters Society would like to take this into the schools in the Fall and/or next Spring This could be extended to include Tofino and Bamfield in the following year.

<u>The Costs</u>: We need about \$200 for sets/props. We usually charge 6 to 8 children \$80 for the 6 week workshops but want to sponsor them this time, so a further \$600 is required to subsidize 8 children and perhaps give us the chance to have a larger cast. We need another \$200 for rehearsal space. There would be minimal costs to produce each show on stage, at the Quay and in the schools; based on six performances we would require \$100 per show for a total of \$1,600.

- Our Backpack Program, now at Dunn Elementary School, operates very simply, effectively and informally. We do not have formal meetings.
- Meetings happen as the need arises. We had a meeting Monday January 25<sup>th</sup> to discuss a move of location and distribution of food to families
- The vice principal, Megan Girard, and Jean Thomas, the First Nations
   Support Worker, along with the teachers have chosen the families they
   deem most in need for support. They used lists from Eighth Avenue School
   to start with adding those they recognized where struggling financially.
- Olive O'Dywer and Linda Taylor are Program Coordinators who do the fundraising and buy the groceries required.
- Six volunteers now meet to pack 31 bags of groceries for our needy family each week
- Funding comes from caring service organizations in the valley. Each week
  we receive salvageable foods from Costco from Wes Hewitt at the Shelter.
  We also receive goods monthly from the St. Vincent de Paul. The food we
  buy comes from charitable donations mentioned on the application forms.
- Each bag of food costs approximately \$10-12 per bag weekly. We feed 141 family members weekly. To run our program effectively we need to raise approximately \$8000 a year.
- When we receive a donation it goes immediately to Cathy Cross at the Community School who has a bank account in our name. If we require funds we phone Cathy who writes us a cheque. She also keeps all our grocery receipts and logs our spending
- Whatever funds we receive goes 100% towards food for our needy families.
- If you support our program you can be assured that all the money you give
  us goes to our own kids in Port Alberni who will hopefully one day be
  productive contributors to our community. You would have made a
  difference

#### Project Title: Chamaapilth - Coming to Age - Youth Engagement Pilot Project

Aeriosa is requesting funding to assist with workshops and performances bringing together professional aboriginal dance artists with Tla-o-qui-aht artists, children and youth, facilitating the creation of songs, dances and regalia for a community celebration.

This is a collaborative pilot project, programmed by Aeriosa, designed and led by Tla-o-qui-aht artists and teachers, for the purpose of expressing Nuu-chah-nulth culture in a supportive environment, nurturing Tla-o-qui-aht children and youth as the artists of tomorrow.

Aeriosa's role is to connect all the artists from different communities and to support these artists and young participants with project management, production services and performing arts expertise to help facilitate success.

A series of workshops will culminate in a showcase celebration, bringing together generations from across their community. The event will present the participants' creativity and knowledge through songs, dances, regalia and other traditional expressions.

Tla-o-qui-aht artists from the community have helped develop this project through meetings and have committed to act as leaders through the process. Joe and Gisele Martin have provided support letters attached to this application. Their expertise, guidance and respected roles will help ensure the success of this undertaking. The funding received from this Grant-in-Aid will help make this multi-faceted and culturally significant project come to reality.

#### Additional Planning Notes:

This proposal has been designed to create a safe space for sharing and teaching Tla-o-qui-aht culture. Tla-o-qui-aht teachers will include different families and both sexes to welcome everyone and bring people together. Names suggested at this point include: Gisele Martin, Dwayne Martin, Tsimka Martin, Gene Antoine, Marika Swan, Grace David and Joe Martin. We expect more artists to join in as word spreads. All artists will be compensated at professional rate standards. We have budgeted to provide materials to accommodate 50-100 children and youth for the duration of the project timetable. Aeriosa is committed to the safety and well being of all young people participating in the project. In addition to adhering to our responsibilities under the Criminal Records Review Act, Aeriosa will also implement procedures that ensure the emotional, educational and developmental needs of our participants. These steps shall all lead to the fostering of a safe environment for learning, exploration and expression.



## Chaamapilth - Coming to Age - Proposed Timeline

#### **Early June 2016 - Setting the Project up for Success**

- Tla-o-qui-aht lead artists Dwayne Martin and Gisele Martin travel to Vancouver to meet with dance group leaders Bob (S7aplek) Baker (spokesperson for Spakwus Slulem, Eagle Song Dancers), Mique'l and Mike Dangeli (Git Hayetsk Dancers). The artists create a blueprint for sharing their culture and traditions properly, respecting protocol.
- Tla-o-qui-aht artist Joe Martin travels to Northern Vancouver Island to consult with Kwakwaka'wakw dancers Adam Dyck and Doug Cramner to prepare for the workshops.
- Team leaders publicize upcoming guest performances and participant workshops, recruiting children youth and families and guest teachers.
- Aeriosa produces marketing materials and carries out pre-production planning for performances, manages registration and artist contracts the youth workshops.

Mid-June - Summer Solstice - Visiting Vancouver Dance Groups Tour the Clayoquot Region Dwayne & Gisele introduce the guests to surrounding Nuu-chah-nulth communities and host talking circles. Aeriosa assists the professional dance groups with public performances in Tofino, Ucluelet and Ahousaht.

#### Early July to Autumnal Equinox - 10 Tla-o-qui-aht Youth/Children's Workshops

Each workshop is a full day of multidisciplinary creation led by Tla-o-qui-aht artists.

Teaching focus consists of:

Sharing traditional songs and dances,

Creating new songs and dances,

Making drums, rattles and other instruments,

Drawing and painting techniques, creating the Tla-o-qui-aht Family Tree,

Making a dance group backdrop,

Traditional spiritual methods,

Resource harvesting techniques: feathers, skins, down,

Weaving with cedar, working with textiles and traditional resources,

Making shawls, blankets, aprons, hats, headbands, necklaces

Making and using carving tools, gathering wood, bark, grass for headdresses and masks

#### Mid-November - Winter Solstice - Living off the Land Workshop

Tla-o-qui-aht teachers lead youth participants in traditional dugout canoes teaching them to how to properly harvest resources and live off the land with respect. Preparation continues for a community celebration to give youth the skills they need to host their own potlatches at the right time in their future.

#### Late winter - Vernal Equinox - Chamaapilth Coming to Age - Community Celebration

Workshop leaders help youth with their dance practices and preparations for a youth-led Chaamapilth Community Celebration. Youth present the gifts they would like to share with the community.

#### **Recommendation:**

THAT the Committee-of-the-Whole include a grant-in-aid in the amount of \$5,000.00 to the West Coast Multiplex Society with the District of Tofino, District of Ucluelet and Area "C" (Long Beach) participating in the grant-in-aid and include in first reading of the 2016 – 2020 Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District Financial Plan;

AND FURTHER the proposal for an allocation of \$20,000 for resources in order for the Regional District to support multiplex planning and programming be referred for consideration by the West Coast Committee at the February  $18^{th}$  Financial Plan Meeting.

#### **Desired Outcome:**

To provide the West Coast Multiplex Society with a grant-in-aid in order to assist with the development of a business case for the West Coast Multiplex facility and to consider resources required by the Regional District to support the project.

#### **Background:**

Staff met with the West Coast Multiplex Society to discuss next steps for the realization of the facility at the Long Beach Airport. The Society wishes to revise the proposal and undertake a business plan to help facilitate the fundraising.

There is a long history of this project and both the society and ACRD have been engaged for many years. A memorandum of understanding confirms the interest of all West Coast communities and their commitment to cooperation.

The Society is responsible for raising 100% of capital costs. The Regional Districts service is for establishment and operation of a recreation service including multiplex. An agreement needs to be established to clearly outline the rolls of each organization to outline how the transition will occur and who takes responsibility for construction. Further any fundraising for a regional district asset needs to have accountability procedures in place. This can be addressed during the business case process.

The society is concerned about the overall cost for a conventional bricks and mortar structure (estimated to be \$12 million in 2012) and are proposing an acceptable cost for the first phase of the facility would be \$6 million. Changes to the facility will have impact on operating and maintenance and

such decisions need to be made in consultation with the ACRD with full impacts outlined.

There are two needs in order to move this project forward in 2016:

- 1. The ACRD needs time and resources to participate in the decision process to protect its interest as the owner and operator of the facility. It is proposed that the service area fund \$20,000 for this purpose, it will be applied to staff time and contract resources as needed.
- 2. A business case / planning process needs to be developed, it is proposed that the ACRD provide \$5,000 to the Society as a Grant-in-Aid for development of a business plan. This process will:
  - confirm the fundraising strategy and processes for accountability
  - define the specific roles of the society and ACRD and how the transition proceeds from fundraising, through construction to operation
  - Provide for public engagement to confirm acceptance of costing and proposed programming.
  - Engagement and definition of the roles of the communities on the West Coast that are part of the service.

Substantial ACRD resources will be required.

#### 2015 Background (from original memo)

The Beaver Creek Community Club (BCCC) hall sustained significant flooding damage in the basement due to the December 9, 2014 rain event. This facility is listed as a reception center in the Alberni Valley Emergency plan and is an important asset to the area. Staff has worked with David Horst, the representative of the Beaver Creek Community Club, and Emergency Management BC but it has been determined because the loss is insured through their property insurance policy that it is not eligible for Provincial funding as EMBC covers only non-insurable losses. The repair is estimated to be between \$15,000 and \$20,000. The issue for the hall is that the deductible for the insurance policy is \$10,000 which is in excess of their ability to pay.

#### 2016 additional Background

After investigation of the options available to the BCCC they have deemed that the repair to the original condition through an insurance claim would not be the best long term solution. To improve the basement area and lessen the possibility of mould in the future other materials and vapour barriers will be installed. The contributors to this grant in aid were as follows:

- 1. Area "B" \$4,000
- 2. Area "C" \$1,000
- 3. Area "E" \$5,000

Each director would be required to recommit their area's Grant in Aid contribution to the BCCC as the intent of the funds has changed. The quotes for the repairs have come in under the total grant provided and surplus from the Grant in Aid would be surplus prorated back to each area.
