2016 Kitsuksis Watershed / LTT Project

The goal of this project is to improve user accessibility & safety, as well as the overall condition & experience of the Log Train trail. With our partners, these improvements also serve to minimize & repair environmental destruction of terrestrial and freshwater ecosystems (fish & fish habitat) by addressing trail & stream erosion, & vegetation loss due to off trail detours.

The primary focus of this project is:

- To improve fish habitat by preventing trail and riparian flooding, improving fish migration as well as spawning and rearing success, and prevent stranding of eggs and fry.
- Trail upgrade/improvement and rehabilitation that includes bridge and water crossing construction, upgrades and rehabilitation.





The Hupačasath ҺаҺууҺи [ha-houl-thee] (traditional territory) is approximately 229,000 hectares, which engulfs the whole Alberni Valley. The boundaries for this territory are basically the mountain peaks from the Alberni Valley, which start from the north at Mt. Chief Frank, from the south at 5040 Peak and Hannah Mountain, from the east at Mt. Arrowsmith and Mt Spencer, and from the west from Big Interior Mountain. This territory contains some of the most valuable forest, fish and marine resources in the world.

Ը՛ՏԻԻԻԻԻԻԻ (Tseshaht) First Nation has over 1200 registered members whose ҺаҺууҺи [ha-houl-thee] (Chief's territory) includes from the Somass watershed including the entire Alberni Valley (including Sproat Lake), the western portions of both Horne Lake and Cameron Lake, the Alberni Inlet and surrounding lands and watersheds to the Broken Group Islands of central Barkley Sound, and out to the Pacific Ocean. Tseshaht possesses Aboriginal Rights within the ҺаҺууҺи [ha-houl-thee] (Chief's territory) owned by our tayii Һա՛՛՛՛՛՛ [ty-ee ha-wil-th], including Aboriginal Title.


