Subject: Alberni Valley Sort'nGo Centre Green Haul Organics Program – Pilot Analytics and Program Continuation

Recommendation:

THAT the Alberni Valley and Bamfield Services Committee recommend to the Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District Board of Directors that the Green Haul Organics \$25 punch pass program continue in its current form, without pilot-specific program enhancements.

Desired Outcome:

To continue the Green Haul Organics \$25 punch pass program in order to maintain an affordable and flexible composting option for residents while supporting waste diversion and environmental objectives. The program would continue as authorized under Bylaw No. R1029, without the addition of participant surveys, compost incentives, or other supplementary components that were pilot-specific.

Summary:

The Green Haul Organics Pilot Program was delivered over a six-month period to provide an organics diversion option for residents without access to Sort'nGo curbside collection. Nineteen households participated in the pilot program, resulting in approximately 120 organics drop-offs and diversion of approximately 1.2 tonnes of organic food waste from the landfill. Survey feedback indicated the program was successful in reducing household garbage with 77% of participants reporting decreased garbage volumes and 83% indicating they would continue using the program if it were extended. Overall, the pilot demonstrated that a self-haul organics program can be an effective diversion option for residents outside the curbside collection service area while increasing awareness and participation in organics diversion initiatives. A complete overview of the pilot survey results are attached to this report.

Background:

The Green Haul Organics Pilot Program was developed to evaluate whether a self-haul organics collection model could provide an effective diversion option for residents who do not have access to Sort'nGo curbside organics collection. This pilot was intended to address service gaps in rural communities and multi-family residences, support landfill diversion goals and increase access to organics recycling opportunities throughout the Alberni Valley and Bamfield region. Target communities

included Cherry Creek, Beaver Creek, Sproat Lake, Bamfield, Beaufort, local First Nations communities, and multi-family residents in Port Alberni.

Participants paid a \$25 registration fee and received:

- One five-gallon Sort'nGo bucket
- One punch pass for 15 drop-offs
- Program information
- Compost reward upon completion for the punch pass and participant survey

The six-month pilot included participant recruitment and registration, promotional outreach, participant tracking, and final program evaluation. The program was designed to assess participation levels, diversion outcomes, operational requirements, and overall community interest in a long-term self-haul organics diversion option.

Pilot Promotion:

Promotion of the Green Haul Organics Pilot Program included media releases, newspaper coverage, social media campaigns, website updates, community bulletin board postings, newsletters, and printed promotional materials. Landfill and administrative staff supported outreach efforts and participant inquiries, while the ACRD's online engagement platform was used to share program information, updates, and surveys. These activities helped raise awareness, encourage participation, and educate residents on the benefits of organics diversion.

Time Requirements – Staff & Elected Officials:

Day-to-day administration of the program at the current rate of participation can be absorbed into existing staff workloads under a reduced program scope that eliminates pilot-specific tasks such as

tracking of analytics, coordination of surveys and compost reward incentives, and expanded outreach and engagement.

Financial:

The table below shows a breakout of costs associated with the six-month pilot. Staff time to develop and run the pilot was absorbed within existing budgets.

The total cost for the Green Haul Organics Pilot Program was \$583. This amount was offset by the \$25 participant registration fee which collected a total of \$475. The total pilot program cost after registration fee offset was \$108.

Continuation of the Green Haul Organics Program would occur under a reduced scope that would not include Pilot-specific enhancements such as buckets, extended program promotion, surveys, nor compost incentives. The Green Haul Organics Program would continue to include a \$25 fee for a punch pass that covers 15 organics drop-offs in up to a 5-gallon bucket. Based on pilot program analytics the average organics drop-off weighs 10kgs, therefore each punch pass will generate a total of 150kgs of organics, or 0.15 tonnes. At the current organics processing rate of \$97.85 per tonne, each punch pass that is fully expended will generate organics that will cost approximately \$14.68 to process into compost.

Continuation of the program will enable reduced-cost organics drop-off at the Sortn'Go Centre at \$25 for 15 drop-offs which is \$1.66 per drop-off versus \$5 per drop-off without the punch pass, while still collecting monies to cover costs related to processing of organics into compost as described above, organics handling at the Sortn'Go Centre, promotion to maintain public awareness and participation in the program (printing, ads, design, etc. as-needed), and special program initiatives.

The 6-month Pilot Program contributed to an extended landfill life by saving approximately 4- to 6 m³ of valuable landfill airspace, and also contributed to landfill methane gas reductions which is important to delay and/or avoid the requirement for very expensive landfill gas management infrastructure and programs.

Strategic Plan Implications:

The Green Haul Organics Program aligns with:

Strategy 1.0 – Building Strong Relationships and Communities by improving equitable access to regional services, supporting service delivery across diverse communities and providing partnership opportunities for underserved residents.

Strategy 2.0 – Managing our Assets and Infrastructure by maximizing the lifespan of existing landfill infrastructure through increased diversion of organic materials from landfill disposal and reducing use of airspace.

Policy or Legislation:

As per Bylaw R1029 Alberni Valley Landfill Tipping Fees, \$25 punch pass established.

Options Considered:

The Alberni Valley and Bamfield Services Committee could recommend discontinuation of the punch pass model and require residents without curbside collection to self-haul organics to designated facilities at a rate of \$5.00 per load, in accordance with Bylaw No. 1029. This alternative would disincentivize household organics diversion and would likely increase landfilled waste volumes.

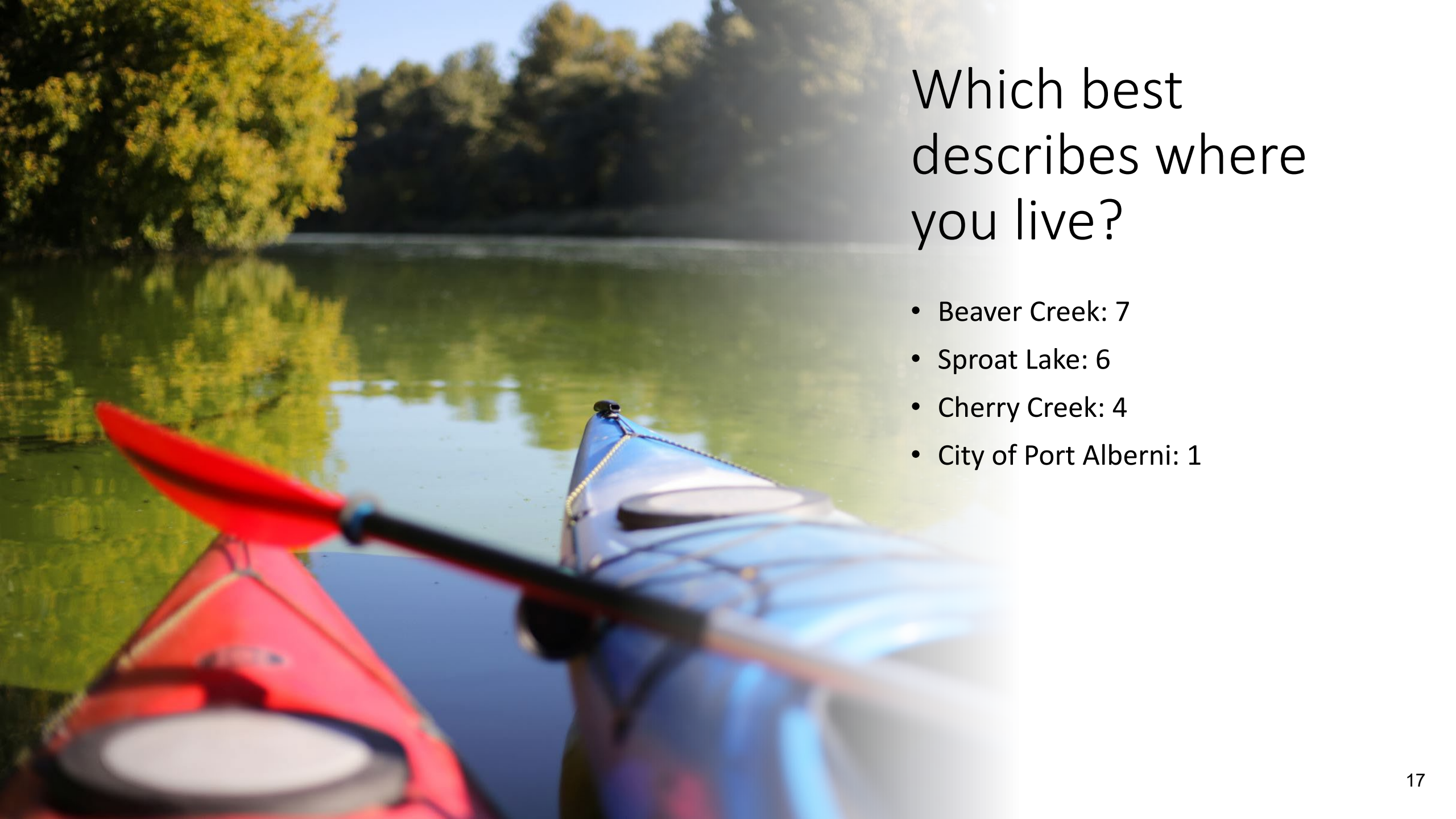

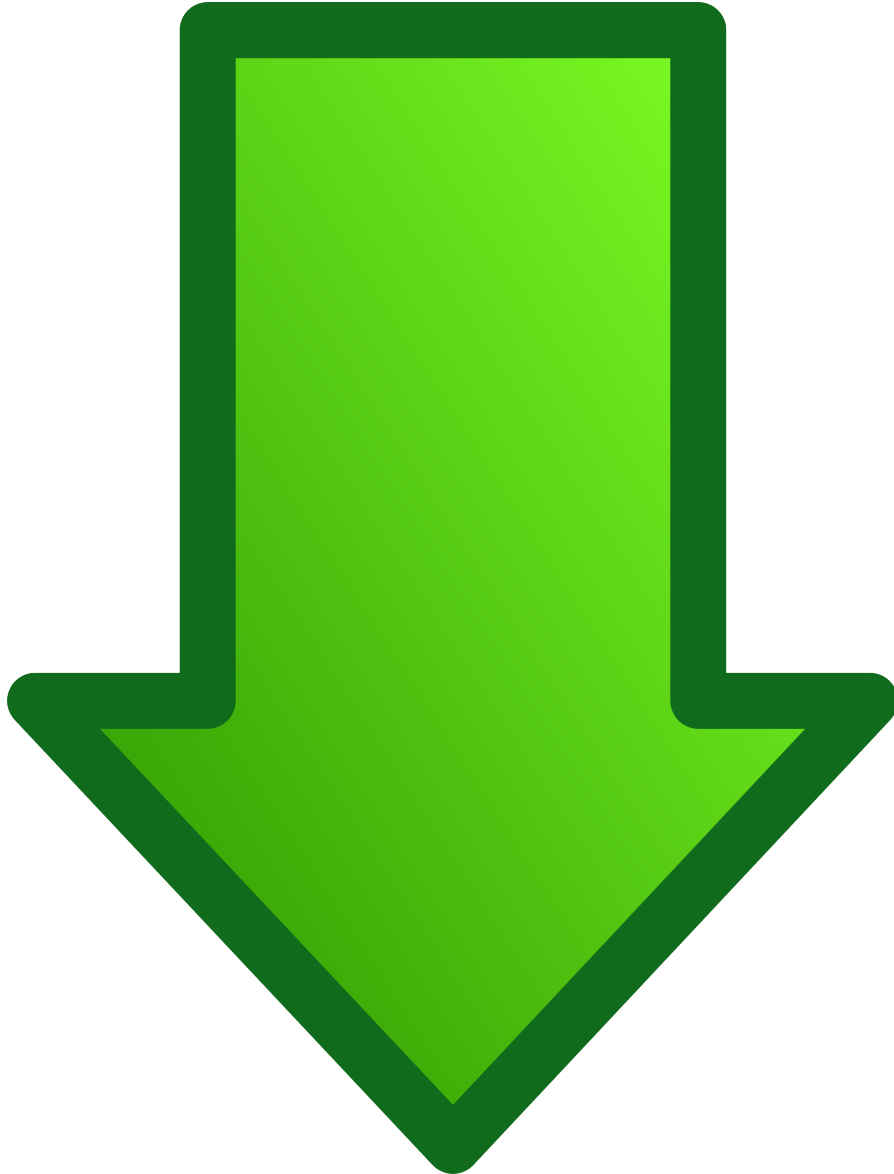

Sort'nGrow Lifecycle

DIVERTED & SET ASIDE

Food scraps are collected by residents and businesses - these materials are set aside along with yard waste including small branches, grass clippings and fallen leaves.

COLLECTED & TRANSPORTED

Organic materials are placed into bear-resistant curbside collection carts which are picked up weekly by collection trucks and transported to local compost processing facilities.

MIXED & COMPOSTED

Visible contaminants are removed at the processing facilities and woody debris is added. The mixture is then piled in long aerated rows and turned regularly by machine. Liquid leachate is collected for reuse.

CURED & REDISTRIBUTED

Compost is sifted to remove debris and allowed to cure - a process which kills weeds and pathogens while making it nutrient-rich. Cured compost adheres to a Certified Grade A[®] standard and is ready for direct garden application.

- More food waste diverted from garbage
- Turned waste into a useful resource
- Learned about compostable materials
